

Carterton Events

August

Winter Warmers reading programme culminated in a finale of craft activities and a presentation by Stonehenge Aotearoa.

Author talk – Emma Stevens.

Pilot for a Minecraft Club – it was proved very popular and it was decided to hold regular meetings.

Plunket was supplied with 50 book bags containing 50 board books, a library membership form and a Toy Library membership form.

September

The library has been successful in obtaining the services of Catherine Cooper as writer in residence. She holds workshops for members of the community who are interested in writing to discuss ideas. This is held every Tuesday; every session is full, and the workshops are booked up in advance.

The library is assisting in preparations to hold regular Minecraft Club meetings in the new school term.

October

Maths is Fun: this was a one-week programme designed and delivered by REAP to support numeracy and was attended by 16 children. The theme this year was 'Shapeshifters'.

Library staff held craft workshops to support the week of the council school holiday programme.

Space Week: two astrobiologists from the New Zealand Astrobiological Society gave a talk to 21 adults and 19 children about international space programmes and research. This was followed by an exploration of the night sky by telescope.

The Events Centre provided complimentary tickets to the "Paper Shaper Show' and they were hidden around the library for customers to find. Tickets were also provided to the other three libraries for competitions.

November

Minecraft Club has proved to be a very popular Saturday club.

The Library Book Club continues to attract new members. It is held once a month.

December

Carterton Library's Writer-In-Residence, Catherine Cooper had final session guiding budding authors. During her time working with the library she had 29 one-hour sessions. There are six people on a waiting list, hoping the programme will run again in 2020. The Minecraft Club met twice in December. There were up to 11 children in each session.

A craft session for children was held 23 December 2019. 130 people attended and made Christmas decorations and gifts.

Decorations for the Reading Programme proved highly popular.

January

Registration numbers and plaques were received from The Little Free Libraries organisation in America. These will be fixed to two Little Libraries in two locations in Carterton; outside Gladstone School and outside Hurunui o Rangi Marae (locations to be confirmed).

Free books will be made available for the community and books may be donated as well as taken/borrowed. The two locations will be registered on the world map of Little Free Libraries. The two libraries are in the process of being created, one is being adapted from the now defunct and unused old library drop box. The library will work with the stewards (to be appointed) to ensure a steady supply of books using donations or good quality withdrawals.

Library staff signed up for Chinese Language Week '5 phrases 5 days' and enjoyed practising their greetings.

Thursday nights continue to average six customers accessing the library.

November

We welcomed Betsy Laybourn as our Summer Reading Co-ordinator.

The Library has donated two gift boxes to the Wairarapa Shoebox Christmas. Our boxes have gone to the foodbank.

Our Annual Christmas Mystery Bundles went on sale this month which was welcomed by many members of the public that give these bundles to family at Christmas.

December

The Great Reading Carnival kicked off with 105 enrolments

The library hosted the BookBugs Christmas Party and children from St Teresa's School performed.

Whitcoulls donated Teddy Bears for needy children which the library passed on to Women's Refuge.

Martinborough Events

August

The popular monthly Book Club is held in the library. The meetings frequently generate recommendations and suggestions for new books.

Book Babies continues to be well attended.

September

A packet of wildflower seeds was given away to the child who won the Punny Joke Q & A competition.

New permanent signage in the Junior section was erected at the beginning of Te Wiki ō te Reo Māori.

The Plunket enrolment form has been updated and is included in the Welcome Pack for new parents. Funding has been obtained to purchase first books to be added to the pack.

The library worked with the Martinborough Museum in preparation for their 125th anniversary in October.

October

A successful week of Maths is Fun took place.

November

World Kindness was on 13 November – Library staff provided "Sending Love" cards for customers, and everybody enjoyed sending messages of aroha to others - 28 cards were received to be sent to those alone at Christmas.

Bell Street Childcare Centre came to the Library to make the cards, and Knucklebone Café kindly let the library set up a mini craft station in the café.

December

The Library held an "Elf on the Shelf" competition, where customers had to guess a book name and author, based on the daily tableau we set up. For the 17 tableaux, 89 entries were received.

The Library introduced a new #BoringBookdropNoWay to our collection.



4. CONSIDERATIONS

Climate change

Kotui now offers the option for customers to decline a printed receipt, and that option, together with libraries using reusable date stamp labels, results in reduced cost and waste.

Tāngata whenua

The libraries continue to improve and expand Te Reo Māori signage and to grow Māori language and information collections.

Financial impact

All matters in this report are covered within existing budgets.

Community engagement requirements

It is hoped to find Stewards for the Little Libraries, either from the Marae and School or nearby neighbours. Although contact has not yet been made officially with either as the libraries are still being constructed, it is also hoped that children from the school and artists from the Marae will decorate the libraries.
