WAIRARAPA WASTE MINIMISATION SURVEY REPORT

Purpose of Report

To inform councillors of the community feedback on waste minimisation within the Wairarapa and gauge residents interest in waste streams – kerbside recycling, food waste, E-waste, recycling/recovery centres.

Recommendations

Officers recommend that the Council:

1. *Receives the Wairarapa Waste Minimisation Survey Report.*
2. *Agrees in principle to support the four waste streams proposal.*
3. *Recommends that the following are included in the Long Term Plan 2018-28 consultation document for community consultation:*
 - a. *To further investigate costs of kerbside food waste collections, including how the ratepayers would utilise the service.*
 - b. *To consider kerbside recycling with 240 litre wheelie bins for co-mingled recycling and yet still utilise the crates, for example, for glass on alternate weeks.*
 - c. *To consider an e-waste service at transfer station or an advertised collection service scheduled throughout the year.*
 - d. *To consider a recycling/recovery centre at a transfer station where the general public can dispose their useable goods for resale, to divert from landfill.*

1. Background

The councils of the Wellington region are working together to reduce waste. Following a review of their waste management practices, the councils have developed a new draft Wellington Region Waste Management and Minimisation Plan (WMMP).

After reviewing the plan, three Wairarapa Councils have set a primary target for minimising waste to aim for a reduction in the total of waste sent to landfill from 600 kg per person per annum to 400 kg, the three Wairarapa councils set to consider how to further protect the environment,

reduce waste and improve services. To do so the following waste streams were to be investigated and consulted with the community.

- Kerbside recycling
- Food waste
- E-waste
- Recycle/Recovery Centres

To ensure that there was an appetite within the community to support these waste streams, and to seek further feedback on how council could manage their waste, and minimise waste to landfill, a survey was distributed throughout the region via various methods.

2. The Survey

2.1 Survey Content

The survey asked how residents currently managed their waste; would they utilise new services suggested by the proposed waste streams; and what else did the three Wairarapa Councils need to consider when aiming to reduce waste. The survey is used for pre consultation and not intended for decision making purposes.

2.2 Data Summary

- 519 people responded, of which 44% were Masterton residents, 35.5% were Carterton residents, and 20% were South Wairarapa residents.
- 70% of respondents would utilise a kerbside food collection service if available
- 81% of respondents currently utilise kerbside recycling. 79% of total respondents use 2 or more recycling crates.
- 50% of total respondents selected a wheelie bin as their preferred option, with 25% of total respondents preferring both recycling wheelie bin and crates.
- 89% of respondents would utilise an e-waste service
- 90% would utilise a Resource/Recovery Centre

2.3 Survey Summary

Although 70% of respondents would utilise a kerbside food collection service, the results also suggest that as a region there is a strong consideration towards food waste, with 65% of total respondents already currently doing their own composting.

81% of respondents currently utilise kerbside recycling which shows a keen interest to sort and recycle appropriate materials. Of the total respondents surveyed 79% are using 2 or more crates. The comments regarding recycling options resulted in more people preferring the wheelie bin option, not only due to its larger capacity, but also easier to manage on wheels and the prevention of wind blowing recycling into the streets.

Although only 25% of total respondents would like to see a combination of both wheelie bins and crates; utilising both would still be of benefit to offer increased options for separated materials.

It is also important to note that there was a general opinion that there should be a 3 wheelie bin option (for general waste, green waste & recycling).

A strong 89% supported an E-Waste collection of some level. General comments were for it to be based at either a transfer station, or a drop off/scheduled collections to be advertised throughout the year.

There was a general support for a recycling/recovery centre at a transfer station. This did not have a multiple choice option (which it could have), however it was to give respondents an idea of the reusable items they could dispose of. Therefore respondents chose 'other' option and comments were noted as 'all of the above'.

It is acknowledged that a small percentage of respondents commented that they did not want councils to support the changes by way of a rates increase.

3. Conclusion

It can be concluded that generally there is strong support, indicated throughout the survey, for all four proposed waste streams.

The comment sections throughout the survey indicate the passionate views of Wairarapa residents across the region when considering waste minimisation, and offers detailed information of how residents see these waste streams utilised if adopted.

On the basis of that support, the Councils should consider the changes to these 4 waste streams to minimise our waste to landfill, as stated in the WMMP of reducing waste from 600 k to 400 kg per person per annum from 2017-2023.

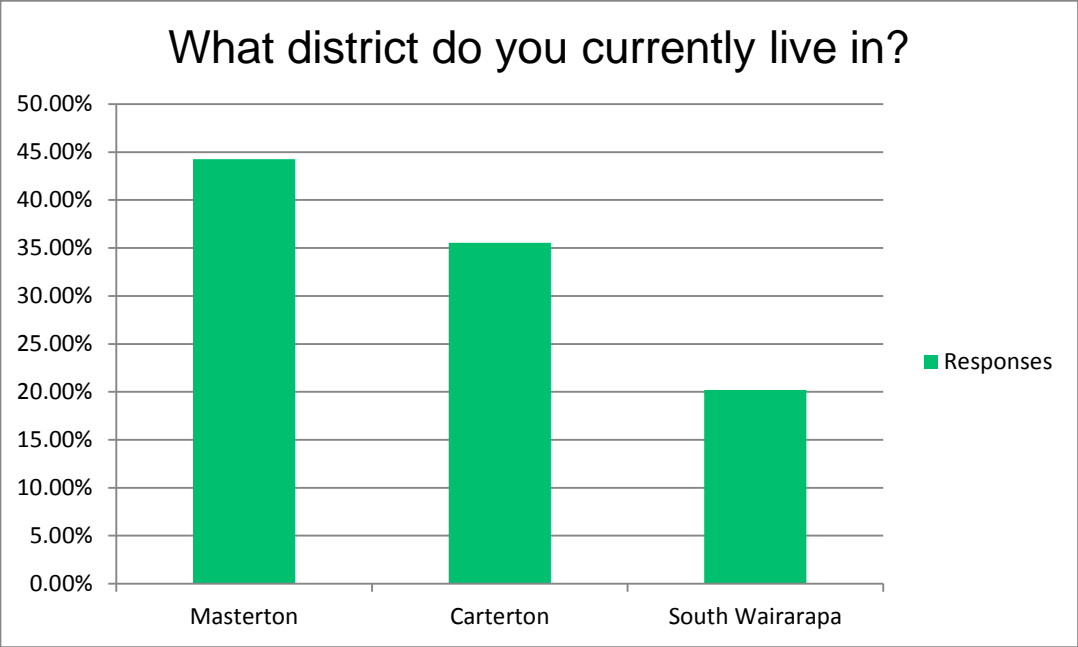

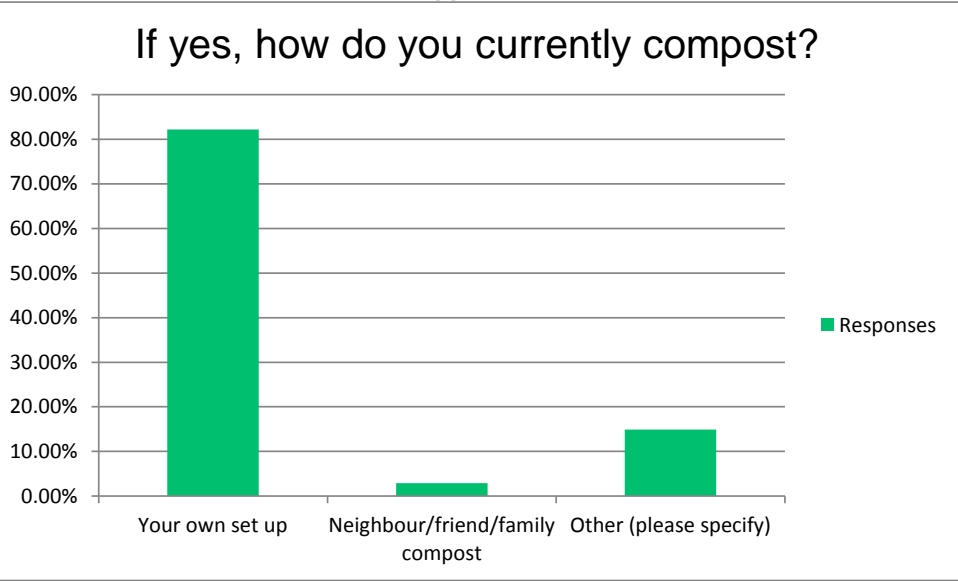

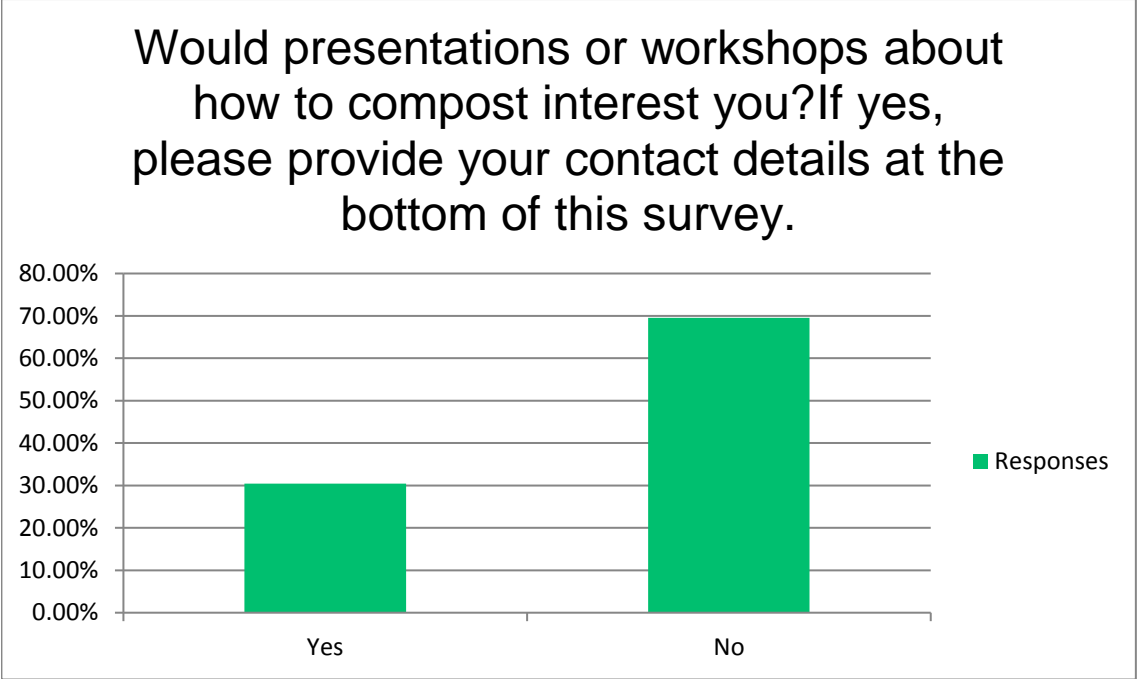

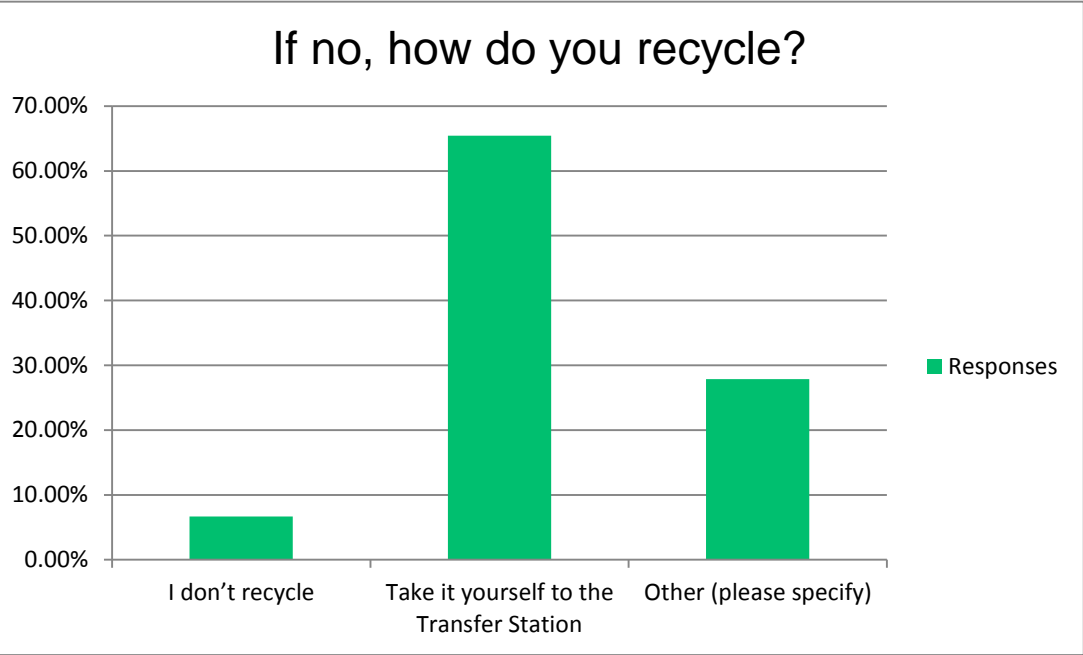

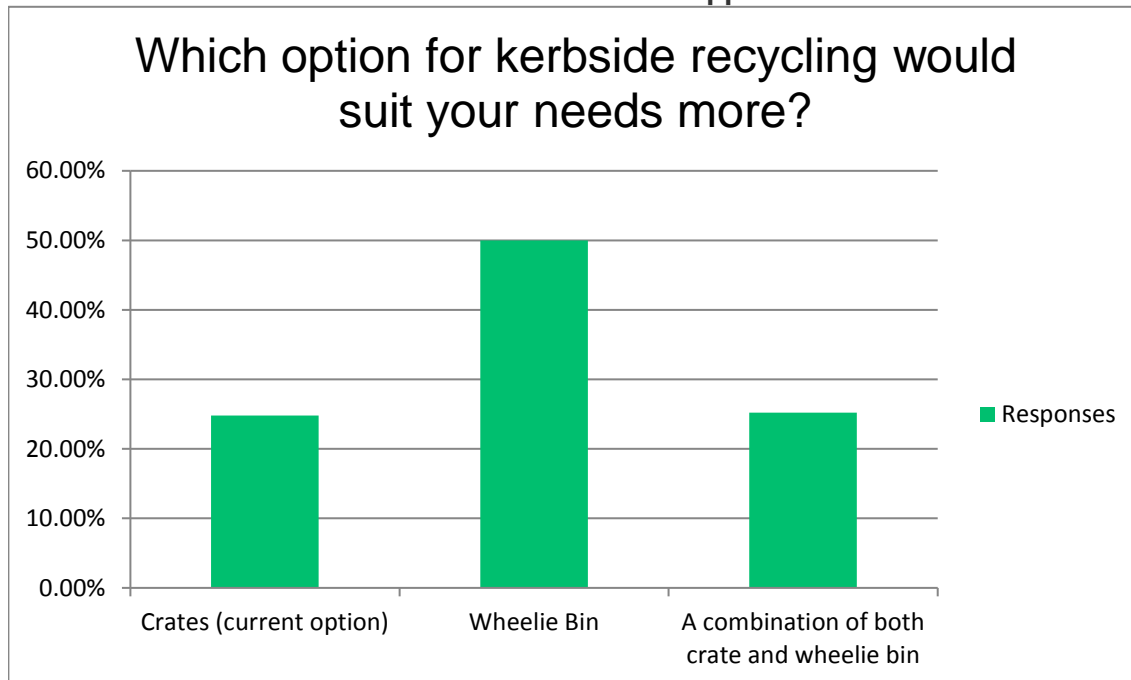

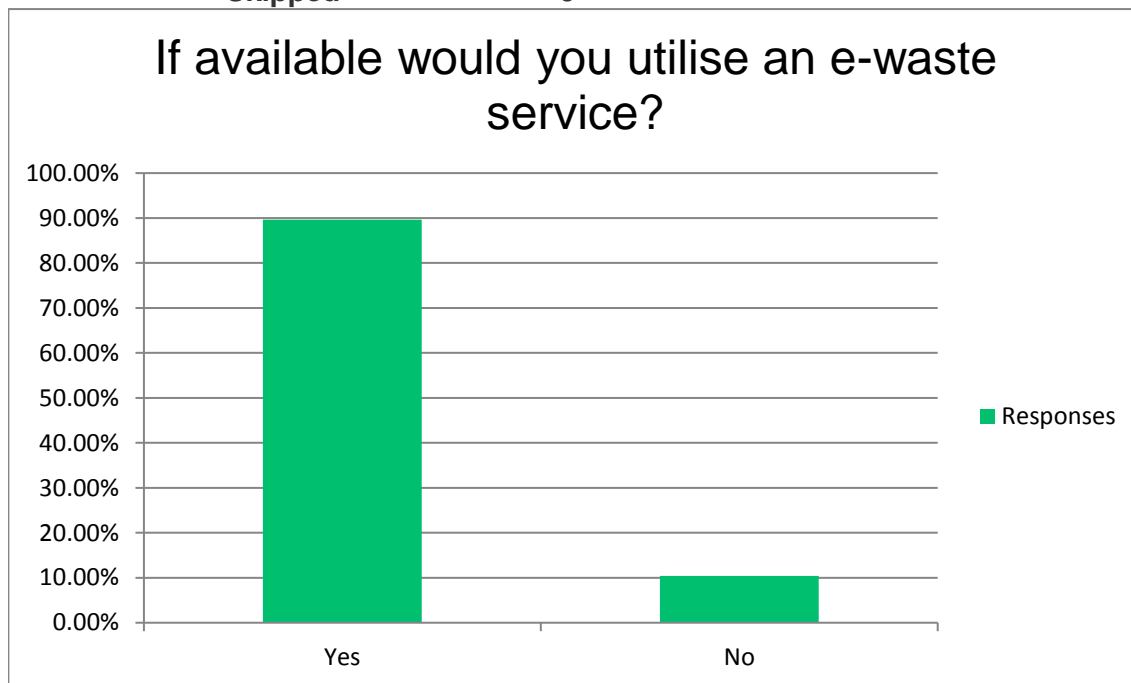

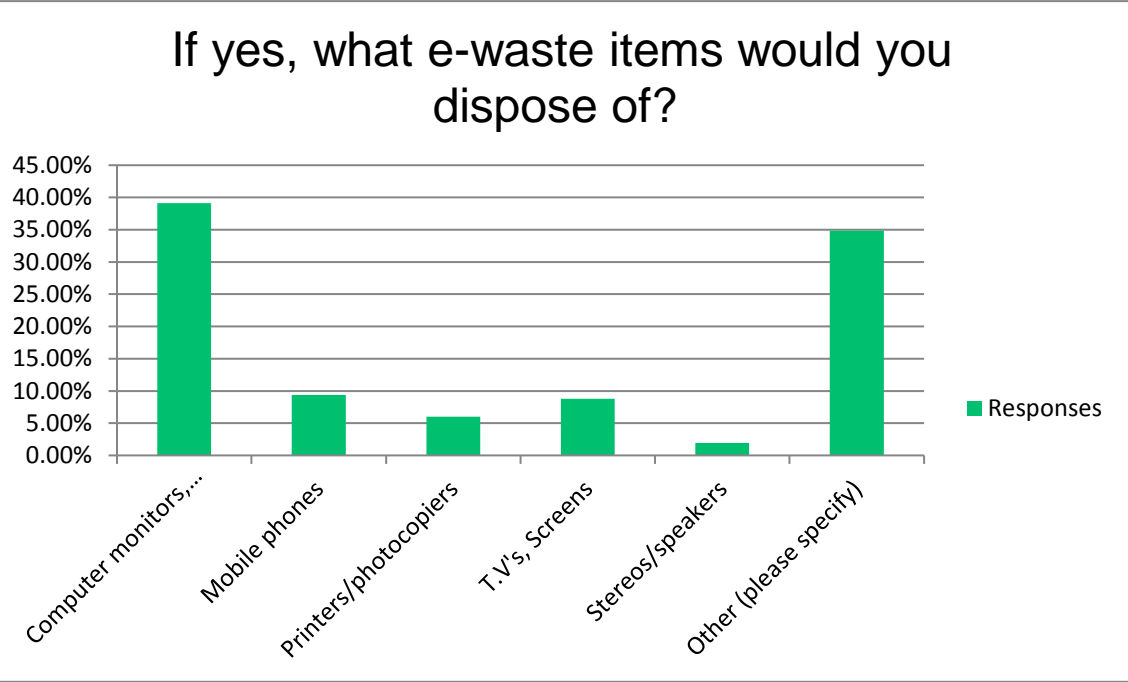

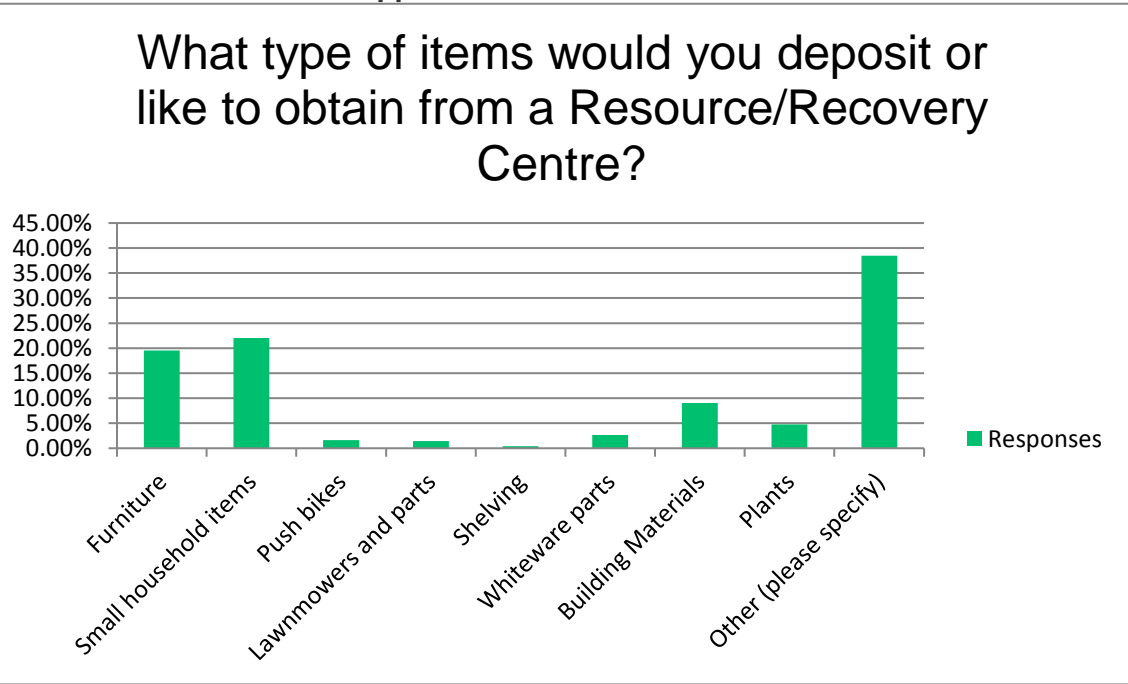
