Key issues from meeting Speakers	 Graffiti statistics for February 2017 circulated for members' information Police update: Burglary legislation has changed - you don't have to break and enter a house for it to be a burglary. If you enter onto a property with the intent to commit a crime this constitutes a burglary. Of the 30 odd burglaries maybe only four are actually home burglaries. There are issues around people not locking vehicles or leaving valuables in their cars (generally it is youth committing these crimes). Police 'can't measure what doesn't happen' it might be a deterrent seeing Community Patrol Car patrolling. Police have been approached by some Greytown residents about setting up a Neighbourhood Support in Greytown wanted (East Street to start with) There is a change in the Vulnerable Children's Act. 17 year olds will fall under the Care and Protection Umbrella. They will still sit under in the Jurisdiction of the District Court as an adult but they are also under the umbrella of Care and Protection. Community Patrols: Featherston has 15 volunteers. Community Patrol car is very effective. Martinborough has 8 new members. Community Patrol Car often parked in the square during the day. Patrolling during the day is equally as valuable as at night. Youth: Ann Rainford (GCB) Reported discussions with Kuranui College around initiating future employment related events for Yr 11 students Wairarapa Safer Communities Trust: Two youth coordinators based in Carterton. Parenting Programme has started. Two more programmes on based in SWDC. Parents need to learn to be parents. NEIGHBOURHOOD SUPPORT & Featherston Development Coordination: Lynette Juno is covering for Mark Shepherd MARTINBOROUGH MENS SHED: Focussing on community programmes and bike refurbishing FEATHERSTON MENS SHED: 50 members. Key issues from meeting	 Nationally as at 11 April there were 99 road <u>fatalities</u> compared with 96 for the same period last year <u>'SPEED'</u> is the UN Global theme for Road Safety Week 8-14 May Will run a <u>restraints</u> campaign at the same time. <u>Road Safety Messages</u> run every hour on the Brent Gare morning <u>radio</u> show. Will run a safe winter driving campaign with messages on radio & in <u>print</u>. Local <u>flyers</u> reminding of the importance of rest, sharing driving & reducing distractions will be put out on service station counters. Lobbying govt. for mandatory <u>'ride forever'</u> courses as a requisite of obtaining a m/cycle licence. RSM to present to colleges the <u>consequences and choices around drinking</u> & driving The successful <u>Community Driver Mentor Programme</u> is to be expanded with the steering group applying for more funding & sponsorship. Around 280 Yr 12 Students sttended <u>RYDA 2017</u> Almost 60 senior drivers attended <u>3 Carfit clinics</u> (one in Greytown) in February/March. A <u>Bike-Bus workshop</u> was held at TRANZIT in April for cyclists and bus drivers to understand how they interact on our roads. 18 - 20 students to attend the <u>Annual SADD Conerence</u> at Feilding in April. 22 schools have signed up for <u>Pedal Ready</u> this year. The Wairarapa has the highest number of students in the Wellington Region passing grades 1 & 2. An outstanding result with only 2 trainers available. 10 schools participated in <u>Movin March</u> – a month-long active travel programme. <u>Bikes in Schools</u>: Greytown School is really keen to move forward with this initiative. Holly (RSC) is running <u>car seat clinics</u>, has created local <u>resources</u> for car seat providers, early childhood educators and medical centres.

General	Carterton are conducting a review of their Library Policies which will be completed by the end of June. Helen to email tracked changes to the policy as reviewed by SWDC at the end of last year. Anne attended the APLM (Association of Public Library Managers) in Rotorua – items covered included: • Strategic Plan for Libraries • Workshops on creative writing • Stepping up programs. • Libraries to focus on classes for literacy as 40% of 16 to 65 year olds have insufficient literacy to get a job. Carterton are also completing an evaluation of every item in the library before the end of June. They will then complete an annual stocktake going forward. This is not too onerous as with the Kotui system most of this information will be able to be obtained electronically. Carterton have ordered wheels for all their shelving which will allow more flexibility within the library. Helen advised that Janet is leaving Martinborough Library and is taking up a position with Masterton Library. Janet has been responsible for all the school holiday programs and is a great team member. Adverts for part time and casual library staff is being undertaken.

	Mark Ellingham – Advised the group to put in a submission to the Annual Plan. He also advised that the removed toilet from the beach would not be replaced as this was DOC land and SWDC had no jurisdiction on this. The Committee is going to approach DOC regarding this.

Perry Cameron – The Bio Diversity Group are having a planting day on the 8th July and this is around the lagoon. He also requested comments and suggestions regarding erecting rope and bollard fence around the lagoon to protect the natural plantings etc.

The trees on the front of the reserve at the edge of the roadway are causing problems re sight of vehicles coming along the road. Helen McNaught to be asked to look into this.

Design plans are being drawn up for the reserve area and are to incorporate a wetland area and a memorial area – these will go out to the community for consultation and comment/suggestions. Once finalised will come to Council.

Perry Cameron suggested that rescue equipment was required near to the beach – after a long discussion it was decided that this would not work. Instead a sign, to be designed, showing the number of fatalities at Lake Ferry and to have the ability to be updated in the future be erected.
