	The nine member councils are completing a review of the Solid Waste Bylaw with a target to reduce waste from 600kgs per person per annum to 400kgs. Recycling figures presented show SWDC 92kg (capita/pa) Carterton is 57kg and Masterton 52kg. 34% of our Class 1 landfill waste is estimated to come from domestic kerbside waste. 2013/14 data suggested C&D waste was 12.7% of Class 1 landfill (approx. 32,099tonnes). Multi-unit dwellings having inadequate on-site waste storage & servicing areas. The bylaw will ensure provision of up to date regional waste data to be able to monitor waste reduction targets.
	Reports: Wellington City – Targeting kitchen waste with new trial beginning April 2020. Expanding the southern landfill. Kapiti – Food waste diversion project starting Jan 2020 Porirua – Community group looking at food waste & composting systems. New large housing estate starting & looking at C&D from this. 3. INFORMATION REPORTS FROM CHIEF EXECUTIVE

3.1 **Positive Ageing Strategy**

Ms Mitchell introduced the Positive Ageing Strategy document and that this Working Group was the appropriate place for regular updates to be presented from Emily Clark the new Wairarapa councils Positive Ageing Co-ordinator.

The outcome from the Strategy is to prepare an Action Plan.

The Working Party agreed that Emily Clark should provide a report to the Working Group on progress against the Action Plan and to receive input from the Working Group.

3.2 Graffiti Statistics

Ms Drury reported that the biggest graffiti spike was on private property, and that Council generally don't clean private property, but did in this instance. Council continued to remove graffiti ASAP to discourage further tagging. The Greytown toilet at Arbor Reserve had been closed due to vandalism.

3.3 CSRWP Terms of Reference

Members suggested scheduling meetings on the same day as other committees and reminded officers to seek appointments from community boards at the start of the triennium.

Membership was queried, and Mrs Colenso advised that the TOR reflected the original membership and it needed to be updated to be fit for purpose.

Mayor Napier advised that the Working Group be a forum for gathering information in the community, sharing and networking opportunity.

Material was useful to share with neighbourhood support groups.

It was suggested that reporting be linked to purpose.

The Māori Standing Committee should be added to stakeholders and that hearing from NZ Police, CDEM and Neighbourhood Support supported resilience in the community.

The forum provided an opportunity for Council funded groups to provide an accountability report back.

As graffiti was not currently an issue Mrs Colenso suggested that a 6-monthly update be provided and suggested timeframes of December and June, with the option of more regular updates if an issue arose.

The Positive Ageing Strategy/Action Plan was a good fit to the Working Party purpose.

It was suggested the deliverables were updated to show receiving of reports.

Members agreed to keep the Working Group meetings quarterly and to review the meeting timeframe in six months.

Mayor Napier noted that well-beings had been restored to Council's purpose and could feature more highly in the TOR.

Further suggestions for change could be forwarded to Mrs Colenso.

4. UPDATES FROM MEMBERS

4.1 **CDEM**

Ms Mills introduced herself and spoke to the report submitted in meeting papers. CDEM have a 5-year plan, have just moved to Waiata House and are aiming to work more with marae (and Pae tu Moiki) as a result of findings from previous national emergencies. Bob Hill is the Māori representative at the governance level. CDEM were currently promoting the community hubs, the local Martinborough hub was in the Council Chambers, all hub guides were available on the CDEM website, and CDEM had a presence on social media.

4.2 Māori Standing Committee

The Māori Standing Committee are working on mapping historical sites and getting them incorporated into the Wairarapa Combined District Plan. The Working Group for this project is visiting sites and learning how to identify archaeological sites. The Māori Standing Committee TOR was being updated. Pae tu Moiki, a group representing Featherston Māori, has been created and is based at the Featherston Golf Club.

4.3 Neighbourhood Support

Neighbourhood Support group numbers are: Featherston 22, Greytown 4, Martinborough 0.

Ms Bhati was going to trial a footpath meet instead of getting people to commit to meeting inside someone's home to try and get traction.

5.6 Connecting Communities

Glenda Seville was the new General Manager.

Ms Phelps was the new Strengthening Families Communities Co-ordinator and was doing more work in the South Wairarapa. Ms Phelps is currently introducing herself and promoting courses that she ran. A budgeting course has been run in Featherston and Ms Phelps would like to see this run in Greytown or Martinborough as well.

4.4 John Broern, Business representative

Summer and winter trade were getting closer together, it was less risky to start a business now than it has been in the past.

4.5 Mayor Viv Napier

Mayor Napier noted community discussion regarding the new policing hours. People were concerned about safety and queried whether this was reflected in interest in Neighbourhood Support Groups or Community Patrol.

Messaging needs to go out to community that they can be the eyes and ears and report to Police.

4.6 Anne Rainford, Greytown Community board

The Greytown Community Board had run a celebrate Greytown day. Over 40 stalls were available and the event would be run annually in the spring.

The students from Kuranui College help older people with IT technology during school term time. Students were helping an average of 2-3 older people every week.

4.7 Bryce Neems, Council Amenities Officer

Council officers were helping the Featherston community get a food bank up and running in the Featherston Information Centre building.
