REPORT FROM HER WORSHIP THE MAYOR

Purpose of Report

To update Council on activities and issues which have arisen since my last report to Council.

Recommendations

Her Worship the Mayor recommends that Council:

- 1. Receives the information.
- 2. Makes a submission to the Local Government Draft Proposal for the Wairarapa District Council.
- 3. Agree that the Mayor and councillor/s should attend the 2017 Local Government NZ Conference.

1. Local Government Commission Draft Proposal for Wairarapa District Council

The Local Government Commission released its Draft Proposal for Wairarapa District Council on 15 March 2017. The LGC is seeking submissions from the community.

SWDC has provided input from both a council and officer level into the proposal. It is important that we debate the proposal and give feedback to the LGC by way of a submission.

2. Tuia Programme

I have become a mentor under the Tuia Programme. The following is an excerpt from the programme guide. Matiu Te Maari has been selected to be my rangatahi for the year. Matiu is from Pirinoa and works with youth. He is keen to work with local youth (possibly at Martinborough School) and conservation, environmental projects.

I have invited Matiu to attend the Citizenship ceremony tomorrow night. He is currently working over the hill until later in April. I will invite him to attend a Council meeting and Community Board Meetings when he has more time. Matiu attended the Last Maori Standing Committee meeting.

How The Programme Works

- Mayors develop a 'one-to-one' mentoring relationship with a rangatahi in their community over a twelve month period (minimum).
- Both parties commit to meet at least once a month to share ideas, engage in local issues and develop a relationship based on trust and respect.
- The Mayor provides opportunities to explore local government and civic leadership (via events/hui and informal training).
- The rangatahi provides opportunities for the Mayor to better understand their world view as a young Maori- growing up in their whanau, hapū, iwi and wider community
- The rangatahi attend 5 wananga during the year...
- In each community, the rangatahi must also engage and/or develop a 'community service' project to pass on the learnings and take action.
- Building good networks between the rangatahi themselves is paramount.
 Graduates of the programme provide 'Peer support' and ongoing development opportunities with four years of participants (100+) coming together at the wānanga and social media.
- Leadership development is rangatahi driven and sustainable, with governance and support provided by the TUIA Charitable Trust and Mayors.

Selected rangatahi are expected to undertake and record a 100hr community service project in their respective communities. This will provide the young person an opportunity to share their experiences, practice new strategies and demonstrate leadership.

3. Local Government NZ (LGNZ) Conference

This year LGNZ's annual conference and EXCELLENCE Awards will be held in Auckland from 23-25 July 2017. The 2017 conference theme is *Creating pathways to 2050: liveable spaces and loveable places* with a future focus on infrastructure, place making and community engagement.

Approximately 550-600 delegates are expected to attend, such as mayors, chairs, chief executives, councillors and senior management from New Zealand's councils, along with key players from the private sector, business, government and nongovernment agencies.

Council normally pays for the Mayor and one councillor to attend the conference. As we have a number of new councillors I am seeking input on whether additional councillors should be given the opportunity to attend the conference.

4. Messines - 100th Anniversary of Battle of Messines

I have met with members of the Featherston RSA, ANZAC Club and The ANZAC Sculpture Trust. SWDC will organise a wreath laying service on 7 June 2017 which marks the 100th Anniversary of the Battle of Messines. Featherston will mark the anniversary with a commemorative weekend 10-11 June 2017. A small working group is drawing up a programme.

A quilting group who have members from Featherston are designing and making a quilt to commemorate the anniversary which will hang in the ANZAC Hall. A smaller quilt may be made to give to Messines from the people of Featherston.
