3 Annual Plan 2017/2018 Submissions Report

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Mr Crimp undertook to review the rating impact of borrowing \$2M to undertake sealing of the most urgent footpath and roading areas, noting that 1km of new roading seal was budgeted for the 17/18 year.

Funding against the Economic, Cultural and Community Development budget was discussed, however final decisions were held over for decision on the 28 June 2017.
