Overview:

With numerous growth and development opportunities before the region it is an exciting time for the residents of South Wairarapa and the South Wairarapa District Council. Embracing those opportunities requires the development of long term plans and bold thinking.

Kuranui College is the only secondary school in South Wairarapa and serves all three towns and surrounding areas. That 80% of students bus to school each day, reinforces that it is indeed a whole of South Wairarapa facility.

As the only secondary school in South Wairarapa, education outcomes aside, the facilities are used for training and competition by the majority of the region’s youth who play winter and summer sports, theatre, music and performing arts.

The College Board of Trustees hold a strong belief that success for the College lies in being an integral part of the community. We recognise the importance of reflecting the diverse make up of our students and the wide geographic area we draw from. We value the importance of ‘brand South Wairarapa’.

The concept of a multi-million dollar community facility being developed in South Wairarapa for all of South Wairarapa residents is significant and unrivalled in the history of the Council. This opportunity is on our doorstep right now and we urge the Council to embrace the long term potential and leverage the opportunity to create a South Wairarapa Community Gym.

The Opportunity

The Kuranui College Gymnasium has been assessed by the Ministry of Education as a leaky building. Initial assessment by the Ministry of Education is that approximately \$2million is required to remedy the issue. As an outcome from that \$2million investment in this South Wairarapa facility, the gym will be repaired and from that \$2million capital expenditure we'll have.... a facility, identical to what we already have.

A challenge, that together we can turn into an opportunity

A number of years ago the South Wairarapa community fundraised to have the original school gym building extended. That means the 831 sqm school gym is made up of two parts:

- The 556sqm the Crown owns
- The 275sqm the community owns

The Ministry of Education will fund the repairs to the 556 sqm the Crown owns but the community must fund the approximate \$450,000 repair for the community owned extension. If the community does not contribute, that extension will be demolished and the existing gym will be restored to its condition and size of 1990. The school does not have the funds to rebuild that extension and it's highly unlikely the community can raise the funds as the proposition to any potential funder is weak.

With the increased residential land being made available across South Wairarapa we are facing significant future demand and a ridiculous situation of the only youth gymnasium in South Wairarapa being scaled back.

With vision, as a community we can embrace a once in 30 year opportunity.

- 1. The existing Gymnasium is instead demolished and a new building erected on the north east corner of the school grounds.**

The relocation to a publicly accessible site is important to truly create a gym for the community

The immediate benefits:

- A Community Gym that is directly accessible to the public – street frontage.
- Purpose built to meet the needs of South Wairarapa, adults, youth and children seven days a week

This is a once in 30 year opportunity to have a NEW community facility for South Wairarapa and we already have:

- An anchor tenant, contributing to the ongoing operating costs – the school
- Approximately 40% of the building cost at hand, being the Crown contribution
- No land acquisition needs

It will require significant support to make this a reality and for that reason we encourage the Council to recognise the potential of a Community Gymnasium as part of a much greater strategic initiative.

2. The Community Gymnasium offers the Council a strategic opportunity to address the recreation and amenity issues in Greytown

A visionary, long term solution is for the South Wairarapa Community Gym to become the anchor project to the Greytown Sports Hub. The Council and the community have a rare opportunity of leveraging a new Community Gym, partly funded by the Crown as the anchor to the Greytown Sports Hub.

The significant shortcomings of sports facilities in Greytown are well established.

1. Kuratawhiti Street's Soldiers Memorial Park faces significant capital cost to its turf restoration and the potential of no football or cricket played for 12 months while this takes place.
2. Irrespective of turf restoration, the demand on the grounds, which has created the need for this investment will only increase with population growth. The potential to use this park for both football and cricket is not sustainable and must be addressed.
3. The Hockey and Football Club have no grounds or Club home in Greytown.
4. Other codes such as Bowls and Rugby are on non-Council owned land amongst residential property with rental costs that are not sustainable for these Clubs.

We have the potential to also capture the 'Wheels Park' concept within this opportunity.

We note the Council acknowledges these challenges with the LTP provision in 2021 and 2023 for new sports and recreation areas as a result of projected growth in Greytown. The 2017/18 annual plan made a provision to support investigations.

There are several viable land opportunities, which have been explored that would support the relocation of sporting grounds as a sporting precinct, with the Community Gym as the anchor project. It would include utilising the school grounds. A single artificial turf has the potential to offer the capacity of four traditional turfs so when we consider capacity, it is not always in acreage.

We should consider:

The health and wellbeing benefits the South Wairarapa Community Gym and improved recreation facilities offers, particularly with the Council's acknowledgment of the value of youth and recognition that Wairarapa has the highest youth suicide rate in NZ.

On behalf of the NZ Government, Sport NZ undertook research in 2017, identifying the value of sport and recreation in communities:

- 92% believe being active keeps them physically fit and healthy, helps relieve stress
- 88% believe that sport and other physical activities provide them with opportunities to achieve and help build confidence
- 84% believe that sport brings people together and creates a sense of belonging
- 74% say sport help builds vibrant and simulating communities.

We must avoid:

Losing the opportunity the potential rebuild of the gym is presenting to the South Wairarapa Community. \$2million is a significant capital project for the South Wairarapa and to have that spent and create nothing new would become a generational mistake. The Board of Kuranui College is reaching out for the Council to become a partner in developing a long term asset for the community.

Our request to the Council:

To progress the potential of the Community Gym the community needs to raise 60% of the investment required. Provision of the Community Gym development within the Council LTP provides a substantial platform to then leverage with potential funders. Demonstrating that the Community Gym may also form part of a long term sports facility hub for the town is additional leverage.

We are aware the Council needs additional information before any specific commitments can be considered. Therefore, at this time the most important support from the Council is a commitment to the concept so our submission is:

From the consultation document we support:

- Future Growth and Development - Option One: The importance of developing a Spatial Plan
- Supporting Youth Training and Development Opportunities - Option One
- Infrastructure for Visitors - Option One
- Sports Coordination – Option One

And our submission requests that the SWDC Long Term Plan:

- 1. Makes provision for the Community Gym to be developed at Kuranui College as a South Wairarapa community facility.**
- 2. Commits to investigating the feasibility of a Sports Hub with facilities located on or near Kuranui College.**
- 3. Captures that the Community Gym concept is a new opportunity and this may enable the existing provision in 2021 and 2023 to be brought forward should the development of a sporting hub make progress faster than initially anticipated.**

We request the opportunity to make a verbal presentation to the Council as part of this written submission.




PROJECT OVERVIEW

SPECIFIC REASON FOR GRANT APPLICATION

We are seeking a grant to enable us to hire a Social Worker to work from our College in our community with our students and their Whanau. It is our vision to have the college as the hub of well being services in the South Wairarapa.

Kuranui College is the only secondary school in the South Wairarapa. Even though we are not a particularly low decile school we have a significant number of students who come to us from very challenging backgrounds. These challenges include students with mental health issues, students who experience poverty and housing issues, students with abuse issues both physical and sexual and students and whanau who need extra support.

We are a rural school, three quarters of students arrive daily from bus. Most of our students live a considerable distance from any services outside of this location. We draw our students from 12 different primary schools in the South Wairarapa. Our students experience difficulty accessing health care. We as a school experience when referring students on to other services. Most of these services are based in Masterton and our students and their whanau do find it difficult to access the services needed in a timely manner.

Our vision is to have a clinic located in our school which will be a hub for services in the South Wairarapa. We already have a full time Guidance Counsellor, the services of Doctor Dias from Featherston Medical Centre 4 hours a week and a nurse for two days per week. We also have a youth worked which is funded one third by the College, on third by the Wairarapa Whanau Trust and one third by St Lukes. The Doctor and Nurse are funded by the DHB and managed by Compass Health. Our vision is to have a multi disciplinary team based in our location and working with vulnerable youth and their families in the South Wairarapa. We want to provide a coordinated approach to dealing with issues proactively instead of reacting to crisis.

This grant would enable us to employ a part time Social Worker to work as part of our pastoral team. We have the medical and counselling covered what we don't have is a Social Worker who would visit families, assess living conditions, and liaise with outside agencies Social Workers particularly Oranga Tamariki and WINZ. At the the moment this an area that is not served well. Our counsellor is doing this job but it takes her away from the vital mental health work she should be doing and she is working in isolation.

Our community needs young people who are actively engaged in education who are healthy and who can contribute to the community as good citizens and find meaningful employment. As it stands now a significant number of our students are dealing with issues such as depression, anxiety, suicide disclosure, drug and alcohol issues, truancy and youth offending.

There's quite a lot of outstanding work on footpaths and trails required (around Featherston anyway). I've written to you about it in previous long terms submissions. For example, there is a little park next to the SuperValue on Daniel St. Oddly enough, since the Town Square went in the number of people using the Daniel St space has increased three-fold. This includes visitors to town. (By comparison, to date, I've never really seen many

people ever use the Town Square... give or take the First Friday events - which are great by the way). Anyway, the path in the Daniel Street park is pretty rough now and is in bad need of repair. Given that this is where most visitors to our town are now stopping to eat, it'd be great to get it upgraded. (Perhaps we could relocate some of the unused paving stones from the Town Square to it instead. Just a thought.) The path the SWDC put in recently along the Johnson St Domain is in need of attention as well. It was put in so that people wouldn't have to get wet feet when it rained and the grass got wet. Unfortunately, as it is at the moment, it fills with puddles that don't drain when it rains - so people are taking to walking on the grass when it rains instead. (Pretty much the complete opposite of what I think was intended here).

In terms of the Long Term picture though, we clearly have some challenges when it comes to supporting economic growth in our town. And it seems pretty clear to me that we are all really struggling. My understanding is that Council themselves are frustrated with things like the District Plan and so forth and reluctantly they are forced to play petty nay-sayers when they don't really want to be. This, I think, is why there is so much mistrust of the Council presently in the town. Rules around mandatory car parks is just one example. Pedantic rules around shop signs on streets would be another. Clearly, everyone is hurting here. Business is being hampered and great opportunities are being lost. Towns people are in turn disappointed and frustrated and I believe Council themselves on everyone's behalf is feeling frustrated too. We all need to figure out how to change these things (e.g. District Plans) so that everyone can benefit as I think everyone hopes. I would like to see more deliberations and effort going in to how this can be done. More information. More dialogue. More genuine consultation. More engagement. I think even short term investment put in here could be worth it many times over in the long term.

Submission to the Long Term Plan

At a meeting of Card reserve Artificial Surface Trust we would like to make a formal submission to the three year plan as outlined in the consultation document. The Trust has been in existence since 1998 and has established an all weather artificial turf for Featherston sport users with lighting in 2000. This year has seen the upgrade and re laying of turf and lighting to this facility at a cost of almost \$100,000. Council have removed the old trees which bordered the turf on the road side and we have really appreciated them gone. The trees had not helped the care of the turf and had damaged the fence surround. The stumps have been removed and we are mowing the grass alongside the tarmac and the turf to keep the area looking good. There are however some final pieces of work we seek to have done by Council to continue the good work already undertaken.

We are seeking the expansion of parking alongside the stadium which in our view may just require the removal of the fence as the surface on the road side of the stadium is hard. However a well prepared gravel surface would be a good option.

Further we have been seeking access to the stadium so we can use the toilets especially as we have young children and young adults who regularly use the turf and having easy access to toilets is a necessity. Whilst we appreciate we can gain keys from the Library for commuting parents that becomes problematic.

We would like to work with Council to address landscaping the area beside the road and the drain and would like to agree a working party with Council so issues for us in managing the turf surface can be understood and that we could look at fencing or planting options that would enhance the area and provide a welcoming entrance to Card Reserve on the Wakefield Street side.

The Crast trustees have raised these matters with Council on many occasions and have received letters from Council agreeing to this work being undertaken. It has been a conversation of ten years with you and we would ask that it moves to the top of your agenda. We have provided this top class facility at no cost to Council in the upgrade apart from the removal of the turf and we certainly appreciated that but it is time the entire project was completed.

We cannot emphasize enough that four sporting groups use the turf, Tennis, Hockey, Soccer and Basketball throughout the year. It used daily and the advantage of good lighting enables those commuters to have facilities for evening use. The turf is used most days and provides for our community well. The trustee have managed finances well using the sinking lid of charging the clubs annually and saving this money to maintain the surface and therefore not being a burden on ratepayers. We pay an annual licence fee to Council and have been responsible tenants and users at Card Reserve.

Submission by the Wairarapa Whanau Trust to the South Wairarapa District Council – 2018/2028 Long Term Plan (LTP) Consultation Document

1. Introduction

The following is a submission from the Wairarapa Whanau Trust to the South Wairarapa District Council (SWDC) regarding the 2018/2028 Long Term Plan (LTP) Consultation Document.

Wairarapa Whanau Trust is a registered, not for profit, charitable trust whose purpose is to coordinate social services in the Wairarapa Region, allowing a more coordinated approach to community engagement, development and care with specific focus on youth (12yr – 24yr).

The main goal of the Trust is to break down barriers to success for youth in the Wairarapa, and to build positive bridges with the community. This will be achieved through providing youth with a safe place to belong, where they can learn new skills, and work with mentors from the community.

2. Executive Summary

This submission outlines how the work that the Trust is doing addresses the key priority area of SWDC of building the Best & Healthiest Community Partnerships, along with most of the five Community Outcomes listed in the SWDC Long Term Plan (LTP) 2015-2025:

- Healthy and economically secure people
- Educated and knowledgeable people
- Vibrant and strong communities
- Sustainable South Wairarapa
- A place that is accessible and easy to get around

We know that the work we are currently doing in the region is already having a positive impact on youth, especially in Featherston. We believe that there is a direct correlation between our engagement with Featherston youth and a reduction in graffiti and vandalism around town.

Our young people take pride in being part of our town. Getting them involved with other local groups and working on projects that benefit the community as a whole is giving our young people an opportunity to contribute, and a sense of ownership, identity and belonging.

We currently have 80+ young people actively engaging with our youth groups in South Wairarapa. We have a youth worker employed in the local college and have provision for a second one. This has enabled us to connect to even more youth and identify the challenges they face both in and out of the college.

The trust is developing a youth space at Boundary Rd, Featherston as a place where youth and the community can come together to break these barriers down.

We are in the process of recladding the buildings with a partnership with Kuranui College and their year 13 building students. We also are in the final stages of procuring other buildings to be built on site to enable further development of after school activities and digital development opportunities.

In order for this to be successful we need financial support from SWDC. We believe that the continual annual investment of \$23,380 will support our work in South Wairarapa and result in ongoing positive engagement by youth in our communities.

We also believe that further opportunities can be developed with council assistance to make the Boundary Rd site a leading youth hub in the Wellington Region.

We also know that this investment will offset a lot of the current costs that are being incurred by the SWDC to manage graffiti and vandalism in Featherston in particular.

3. Background

Our key focus is on the main barriers listed below:

- Lack of “starter jobs” which allow them to get work ready and earn money to get a drivers licence, car etc.
- Isolation through lack of transport options/car or limited train availability.
- Lack of access to internet or after school facilities for homework.
- Lack of space to develop relational skills with other sections of the community; a place where generation gaps can be crossed and mentoring/role modelling can occur.
- A facility for young people to work on projects, develop ideas and connect with the wider community.

Developing the site to provide opportunities for youth and community engagement will go a long way towards removing some of these barriers.

The Trust will be providing a range of learning opportunities for youth at the Featherston site including:

- basic carpentry including pallet furniture making
- light engineering and motor mechanics
- digital and computing skills
- creative arts, and
- work ready skills.

4. Feedback on the Annual Plan 2017/2018 and the Long Term Plan 2018-2028

The Consultation Document states that the Council has three priorities over the current term:

- To build the best and healthiest community partnerships
- To provide the best care and use of our natural resources, assets and infrastructure
- To ensure we have the best Council, staff and officers.

The outcomes we are seeking support the achievement of the above priority to build community partnerships for the South Wairarapa through providing a structured, co-ordinated and supported approach that focuses on developing pathways for our youth to become engaged in meaningful education, training and/or employment.

Our activities also support the Community Outcomes set out in the SWDC LTP:

- Healthy and economically secure people
 - Healthy and well housed people who are economically secure, active and involved in their community.
- Educated and knowledgeable people
 - Educated and knowledgeable people who feel confident that they can achieve their aspirations.
- Vibrant and strong communities
 - A place where people feel safe, are proud to live and have a sense of belonging.
- Sustainable South Wairarapa
 - A sustainably managed district where economic development and environmental management go hand in hand.
- A place that is accessible and easy to get around
 - Well served by a range of transport options (including roading), local and regional services and telecommunications.

We now see our young people taking pride in being part of our town. We know that by getting them involved with other local groups and working on projects that benefit the community as a whole we are giving our young people an opportunity to contribute, and a sense of ownership, identity and belonging. This bodes well for both their future and that of our town. The youth have actively participated in neighbourhood events, Book Town, Matariki at Pirinoa, Christmas Parades, wetland plantings, river clean-ups, helped with holiday programs and are looking for ways to help strengthen and benefit the community.

We have been able to give individuals basic automotive education and driving lessons, fundraise for individuals requiring funding for trips, leadership courses etc.

We have been able to purchase a bus to remove transport as a key barrier for our youth and students in school to participate in activities or events. This bus is available for schools to hire at a very low rate to enable schools to transport students to events – a key barrier identified by all the local schools.

We have developed key relationships with other organisations such as SW Rotary, Kuranui College, Fab Feathy CLDP, local businesses, all of them share the same goal of a vibrant and positive community.

SW Rotary have offered to coordinate and provide volunteers for any after school programs we start with the completion of the education buildings.

We also link into the work that the Youth Education Training and Employment (YETE) Partnership is doing in the region.

We believe that this work has a direct and positive impact on the SWDCs costs especially in relation to dealing with graffiti and vandalism. We know that there has been a reduction in costs and believe that there is scope for further reductions through more active engagement with local youth. Local police, the truancy officer and Youth Connect have all commented on the improvements for the region around youth engagement, lower NEETS, less youth related crime, and the over-all improvement around youth in the SW area.

5. Conclusion

This submission outlines the issues facing youth in our region and the work that Wairarapa Whanau Trust are doing to these issues.

In light of this we request that the SWDC commit the continued funding of \$23,380 per annum for the next two years to support the work of the Trust in South Wairarapa. This funding will assist with the running costs of the property which include rent/lease, power, insurance, activity coordination. A budget is attached for your information.

2. PROJECT OVERVIEW

Specific reason for grant application (e.g. upgrade to facilities/purchase of equipment/one-off event):

Seeking an overall contribution towards the yearly Trusts operational budget to continue to meet wider youth and community needs.

Research tells us that young people need significant role models in their lives, a youth worker, a family friend a positive "other" person. Often young people don't get these kinds of mentors, and drift through their teenage years with no direction, hope or understanding about who they are and what they need to be doing.

A strength based youth worker will provide the tools and resources to see a significant number of young people in South Wairarapa to connect with strength mentors to help them during some very difficult years, especially growing up in the places like Featherston.

The youth worker is an experience provider and has the tools and resources to work with some very hard to reach young people in the Community. We also hope a team of volunteers will continue to grow as the youth worker mentors a team to drive this vision for forward to see young people in South Wairarapa engaged.

Our youth worker has the ability to facilitate change in young people lives in our community and has a proven track record in delivering opportunities for this change. Our youth worker also provides a space to develop youth leaders to impact a generation in the South Wairarapa.

Part of our activities include seeking out opportunities for employment. . Meaningful work creates a sense of worth, a means to provide, a purpose and a sense of being part of something that brings change, these are all needs that the Trust seeks to provide.

For the past 12 months our Whanau Trust youth worker has been recognised as a key influence in young people's lives in the region and a number of positive outcomes have been achieved from the youth engagement. The Whanau Trust has also developed other leaders in a voluntary capacity to help support youth in the area.

Youth need significant others in their lives, our youth worker has built a team to engage with young people that will allow these needs to be met. Leasing the facility at Boundary Rd has provided the Trust with a turangawaewae (a place to stand), not just for the Trust, but for the community, it's not just a place, it's a place with purpose that with further

development will address needs through a home work centre, job creation, and various potential community programmes.

Ongoing developmental involvement for next 2 years.

To Whom It May Concern.

The current ANZAC Club Incorporated was established in 2008 to support the improvement and the use of the Anzac Club complex so it is a viable asset to the South Wairarapa and to Aotearoa, New Zealand.

The charitable purpose of the Club, as outlined in the Charities Services register, is as follows:

- (a) To be beneficial to the community by restoring, developing, and preserving the ANZAC Club site in Featherston.
- (b) To educate the public about the ANZAC Club and the historic significance for the people of Featherston in supporting the soldiers in training at the Featherston Military Camp during the First World War.
- (c) To provide furnishings, equipment and to refurbish and maintain the buildings and facilities and other improvements in and around the ANZAC Club's complex in Featherston.
- (d) To fundraise for these purposes.
- (e) To liaise with other societies, clubs or organisations with similar objectives including those whose purposes is to honour the spirit of past and present servicemen and women.

It is with these purposes in mind that we respectfully make this submission to the South Wairarapa District Council's Long Term Plan.

The ANZAC Hall complex is a listed heritage building with Category 1 status. The complex is vital to the story of Featherston and the entire country, and relates to the two world wars of the twentieth century. The ANZAC Hall complex has suffered from neglect by the South Wairarapa District Council since the Council was amalgamated in 1987, and various iterations of ANZAC Hall supporters have worked valiantly to take care of this building. The latest Club has come from these earlier entities.

The Anzac Hall, Kiwi Hall, Supper Room and Meeting Room are all useful facilities that could be marketed to make the complex self-sustaining and provide great opportunities for economic growth. Its potential has not yet been realised. This is an asset, we submit, that can be utilised with a moderate investment by this Council and investment from the ANZAC Club to provide an up-to-date facility that fulfills its heritage values and moves into the 21st century.

This submission seeks a real commitment from the Council to complete the task and to have a fully functioning Conference Centre in use at least 80% of the time, and which also allows the Featherston community to be heavily involved in aspects of its development and future.

We note in the LTP consultation document an increase in the Reserves and Civic Amenities – the urban rate shows an increase to 6% and a total increase in Featherston rates of 7.2%, which is a higher increase than both Martinborough and Greytown. This means you are anticipating more revenue that should go to this nationally significant civic amenity in Featherston.

Important Items the ANZAC Club submits for the Long Term Plan

- **The ANZAC Hall complex's mains power, power boards and wiring needs to be upgraded urgently.** This is a safety issue as much as it is a need. This will ensure that heating systems in the whole complex can be operated at the same time without crashing the power supply. We understand that the council have set aside funds to do this work and we support this wholeheartedly. Furthermore, we would like to add that this work needs to start immediately.
- In undertaking this long overdue mains power, power boards and wiring upgrade, **the ANZAC Club wants to be involved in determining additional power point placement and the design of the entire power network**, and we look forward to working with you.
- **The ANZAC Club requires council to establish a comprehensive Annual Maintenance Plan for the whole complex.** The ANZAC Club will assist in this undertaking. It is essential for a building of this mana to have a regular maintenance assessment and regular maintenance undertaken. Members of the ANZAC Club, in their recent review of the premises, have noted with great concern the borer infestations – and we would like the treatment of the borer (and board replacement, where needed) to be a top priority in the new Annual Maintenance Plan. Another area of concern for us is the fire equipment that we believe is not up to standard.
- **The men's toilets off the Anzac Hall currently have waterless urinals. These have not been effective and often leave an awful smell and hygiene concerns.** We recommend that the urinals are replaced with flushing urinals.
- **The Men and Women's toilets off the Kiwi Hall are in appalling condition and are in dire need of total replacement.** Considering that the Kiwi Hall toilets are the most used toilets in the complex, this again needs to be attended to urgently. The ANZAC Club would like to work closely on the design, so that the heritage authenticity is maintained to a high standard. We can't hire the Kiwi Hall out for professional functions with the toilets so far below commercial users standards.

- **The ANZAC Club members have identified that the steps of the main outside entrance into the Kiwi Hall are very dangerous and need to be upgraded as a Health and Safety matter urgently.** We are aware that if someone is injured while using this main entrance, the liability falls squarely on the council.
- **The main kitchen supporting the Anzac Hall, Kiwi Hall and Supper Room is not able to fulfil its purpose and needs a total redesign and refurbishment as a top priority.** This vital refurbishment needs to take into account the provision of stainless steel bench tops, a new hot water system, a new 6 burner stove, a new commercial dishwasher and a new fridge. The ANZAC Club is willing to allocate substantial funding to assist in this refurbishment.
- **The ANZAC Club is very concerned that the supper room has no heating whatsoever.** This requires the urgent installation of high-mounted heat pumps to provide heating and cooling.
- We are also convinced that **a complex such as this requires a WIFI Network** available in all the rooms.

FINAL COMMENT: This submission only deals with our Top Priority matters for the Council's 2018/2019 year. However, we wish to indicate that in the next financial year, we will seek from Council [through its annual plan] to install a professional sound system in the Kiwi Hall and built-in electric datascreens and projectors in the Anzac Hall and the Supper Room. We would further like you to note that in the current financial year, the ANZAC Club are funding and installing a professional sound system in the Anzac Hall as well as a built-in electric datascreen and data projector into the Kiwi Hall. In recognition of our substantial ongoing contributions, we would like the Council to match our commitment in helping us to bring this amazing heritage complex into the 21st century.

The initiative to engage in the process of Spatial Planning is supported. In supporting the initiative I submit that a clear understanding of what is intended is imperative.

A recognized definition of spatial planning states – : "*Regional/spatial planning gives geographical expression to the economic, social, cultural and ecological policies of society. It is at the same time a scientific discipline, an administrative technique and a policy developed as an interdisciplinary and comprehensive approach directed towards a balanced regional development and the physical organisation of space according to an overall strategy.*"

It is important that a South Wairarapa District initiative recognizes that any such plan gives priority to *the economic, social, cultural and ecological priorities of the district whilst acknowledging the context in which South Wairarapa functions, key relationships and resources necessary for the plan to succeed.*

TIME FRAME:

I am concerned that the process proposed suggests a time frame of 10 years? Is this the time frame to actually develop/create the plan or the expected life-time of such a plan?

In order to capture the ideas, energy , involvement, cooperation, and collaboration of citizens it will be critical that the process is time-limited so as to maximize the engagement of those parties/stakeholders involved.

A shorter period of plan development activity such as 18 months – two years is strongly suggested.

ENGAGEMENT:

Engagement with a wide variety of - persons, groups, organisations, agencies, etc, is imperative so as to capture –

- the degrees of diversity across the economic, environmental, social and cultural spectrum and
- the interests and energy of those likely to be most affected by, and expected to fund, this initiative.

The process to achieve this will be very important.

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APPENDIX 1. EXTRACT FROM 2017-2018 ANNUAL PLAN SUBMISSION

“Current Contexts:

SWDC faces significant on-going district challenges such as –

- changing populations across diverse age groups
- continuing pressures on core infrastructure from increasing economic (business) and sub-division activity
- changing and increasing demand on present and anticipated recreation facilities
- increasing traffic (Tourism, Commercial and local) on State Highway 2 and through, Featherston and Greytown.

An example. The submission by Barbara and Ray Stedman, supported by affected Cotter Street residents, suggests that further development in the south western corner of Greytown needs to acknowledge the changes likely to arise from the new residential development - Tararua Junction. Development in this area can be expected to increase traffic movements coming off, and on to the State Highway (Main Street) at the intersection of the Highway and Humphries Street.

This busy intersection is also a turning point for traffic to and from Papawai Community, the Marae, Soaring Centre and JR's Orchard. Humphries Street between SH2 & West Street is understood to be the busiest street section in South Wairarapa. This short section includes a bus stop and two points of entry to the Challenge Garage! Garage traffic from the south comes off Main Street just before the intersection.

Further development needs to recognise the possible effects on the existing mix of land uses in the southern end of Greytown.

- The location of Kuranui College
- The Greytown Medical Centre and the Life care facility
- 'Larger' businesses such as Farmlands, ITM, the Stihl Shop, the Hire Shop, and the changing business activities on, and from Bidwills Cutting Road and Arbor Place.
- Arbor Reserve and the 'Dump' Station.

Intermixed within this area is smaller businesses, a motel complex, and residential development.

Unless alternative access to the new Tararua Junction is created all traffic from and to this area will be channelled through West Street. Council could consider the opportunity to re-open

South Street - in conjunction with the re-configuring of the junction of Bidwills Cutting Road and State Highway 2 through the creation of a roundabout at this increasingly busy point in the district transport network.

Such a change could be beneficial from a safety aspect given the present 50kmph sign is currently right at the junction and there is no reduced speed area (e.g. 70kmph) preceding it to slow State Highway 2 traffic from the south turning into Bidwills Cutting Road. (Alternatively the 50kmph sign could be shifted 250-300 metres to the south?)

Council will be aware this is not a new idea – it was proposed during the establishment of the Light Industrial Area off Bidwills Cutting Road.”

Hello,

I write on behalf of the Greytown Cricket Club.

I have previously spoken at the LTP workshop on 24th October regarding our submission.

We would like the Council to consider funding for a specific project to allow the feasibility of our club to continue as it does, being the main provider of cricket facilities in the South Wairarapa, not only providing facilities for an increasing junior club (the 2nd biggest in Wairarapa) , but the only one that provides the ability for Senior Men to play in the area. There is not only club games played there, but also representative games, and teams from the Wellington region come over to play each other as they just love our grounds

It has been approximately 15 years since our wicket block was last renovated. It is recommended that this process is done every 5 years.

What is involved is includes irrigation realignment, replacement of clay, hardfill and base core. Replanting of grass seed and levelling. We consider this is more of a regular maintenance requirement, rather than what has historically been an infrequent one-off task. Currently the Greytown Cricket Club provide all labour and materials in terms of maintenance of the wicket block, through the generous efforts of club members, including playing and Life Members. Every couple of years we are required to replace our covers which protect the wicket from rain to enable games to continue. Due to cost restraints these covers have often proven to be inadequate.

The Greytown Cricket Club is proposing assistance from the SWDC in regarding to funding assistance to allow the extremely overdue renovation of the block. We would like to take the opportunity to rather than continue on the existing block area, but to begin the relocation of the wicket block directly next to the eastern side of the existing block towards the clubroom. Initial estimates of the cost of this work is in the region of \$5,000-\$6,000 per wicket strip. We currently have 6 wicket strips on the block.

To ensure the adequate protection of this block, we have investigated the use of a mobile cover trailer. As the club is responsible for the application and removal of the covers each week, a mobile trailer would be advantageous, especially given our groundsman are life members and are elderly retired businessman who have been a lifelong part of the Greytown community. Current quotes we have received for these covers are in the region of \$12,000-\$15,000.

We therefore would like to apply for assistance of \$50,000 to allow the renovation of the current wicket block, and the mobile covers to protect this investment. The cricket club are very keen to help out labour wise wherever possible to reduce this amount as much as possible.

From: Greytown Little Theatre (GLT)

Long Term Plan 2018 – 2028

Our Society generally supports the thrust of the Long-Term Plan.

GLT would submit that the Long-Term Plan should also recognise that the contribution that arts, culture and heritage enhance the well-being of our broader community within our district.

Our Society specifically supports the key initiative; **enhancing the lives of the younger people who live in our district.**

Over the last two years GLT has specifically targeted the engagement with younger people as a mechanism to bring new energy and life to our theatre and create recreational opportunities for young people. This has been highly successful by engagement with Kuranui College (and other young people) and their drama studies team. By assisting in the creation of opportunities for youth development and training it will likely enhance the likelihood of more of our younger people staying in the region.

GLT is currently working with Council to build a new theatre on a site in West Street, Greytown. This will entail GLT leasing land on a long-term basis adjacent to the Rail Heritage Historic Goods Shed. GLT will be funding the building construction of the theatre. It is hoped that this area will be significantly enhanced by our presence and will contribute to the establishment of a community hub. It is hoped that our initiative will assist Rail Heritage to find a more community focused use for the Good Shed – possibly linked to the rail trail initiatives.

New initiative

GLT is seeking the support of the SWDC through this plan to make provision that it should fund the car parking that will be required on the southern side of the site (and not leased by GLT). This car park will provide parking for both GLT, Rail Heritage and any other community activity that might occur in the precinct. Because of the special nature of this site it would be appropriate for Council to undertake this provision.

It is suggested that this could be funded by SWDC over the two financial years; 2018/19 and 2019/20.

We would like to speak to our submission.
