Thank you for your email. Please include the below email in addition to our original submission.

Bryce Neems has been working with us to address some of the issues raised in our initial submission and has emailed a list of jobs earmarked for completion before next season. I have copied this correspondence below in Blue:

1. Painting the front of the office outside
2. Replacing the cracked and uneven concrete between pool and changing room, fixing known damaged pipe underneath at same time (big job)
3. Pope and Gray have a job to raise the ground around the children's pool on/ next to the outer fence as quite a fall there.
4. Look at painting main pool
5. Tiles either replace or fix.
6. Lint pot cover.
7. Removal of Solar heating pipes off roof
8. Filter 1 flange is leaking.
9. The door and the waste water drain in front of the plant room in need of repair.
10. New signage, awaiting decision from Council on extending hours

However, there are some pressing issues to resolve that we feel are of urgency that remain unresolved. I have copied the below correspondence that was sent to Bryce from the swim club with regards to Pool Heating (in Blue).

Community impact statement: one of the points that stands out for us in your email is that Featherston pool is different from both Greytown and Martinborough pools. Featherston has the responsibility as a venue for the South Wairarapa district school swimming sports events, and is the only district pool able to accommodate this type of gathering. Due to the unpredictable conditions of the pool and temperatures, it was decided to hold these events outside of the district this year (at the Masterton Pool). We understand this has been costly—both in terms of financial expense for schools but also a decrease in parent involvement around these events due to the travel distance and venue location.

We feel the warmth of the pool and seeing the heating reinstated is of primary importance for the whole district to benefit and seeing these much needed events return.

2. Swimming Club core function: from the position of the Featherston Amateur Swimming Club (FASC), our primary functions are the ability to provide wider public swimming safety and education; providing swimming lessons during the current timeframes; and ensuring kids stay warm enough to learn in the pool on colder club days. FASC does not see the point of extending opening hours (as proposed in the draft Annual Plan) when currently we are unable

to meet the basic need of keeping the pool warm enough for children to learn to swim. Given that we do not support extended opening hours at the pool unless safe functional heating equipment is first provided. FASC do not support the draft Annual Plan's expenditure for pool opening hours. We fear a backlash of ratepayer sentiment against the pool and our hardworking volunteers. We also note that swimmer numbers at night during the late night trials have been vanishingly thin and once again question whether pool heating is the bottleneck in getting more people swimming safely.

The Club will present to the Featherston Community Annual Plan consultation at tonight's workshop an application for a SWDC community grant to partially fund pool heating. This is for \$29,000 + GST + installation costs. At this stage the Club is able to contribute \$8,000 for the total cost of the quote being \$37,000 + GST + installation. The Club sees this as of primary importance in retaining swim club members and teaching children to swim. Swimming safety and learning to swim is so important to the wellbeing of the community, as is the ability for people to use the pool for recreation and fitness to stay happy, healthy and well. Also, heating will mean that the community is able to use the facility to its utmost in the current seasonal timeframes, which currently we feel we are unable to do because of the temperature of the pool. We continue to fundraise at every opportunity to achieve the goal of reinstating the heating to the pool and our next fundraiser is a sausage sizzle during booktown to raise more funds towards this.

We want to see the pool warmer so we can keep children and families engaged and still able to participate on cooler club days and so the community can get the most benefit out of the pool. There are a number of days in the current season we feel are lost to cold water temperatures and our initial statistical information shows a correlation of numbers dropping when pool temperatures are low. We have included additional support from schools and i have attached an additional letter of support in this email from St. Teresa's school who organize the south wairarapa cluster schools swimming sports days.

We hope to continue to build on the positive relationship with the council over the past couple of months and look forward to helping achieve the best we can for the community in regards to the Featherston pool.

Please find below and attached documents -a submission by The Featherston Amateur Swim Club (FASC) for the needs of the Featherston Pool to consider your yearly council planning purposes.

Dear Council,

As a club we are seriously concerned about the management of the asset -Featherston Community Pool -by SWDC. It is our view that there has been a lack of adequate management for some years by council towards the pool. This directly impacts the running of the swimming club and its future. The club provides the service of learning to swim and swim safety for our community and has done for over 100 years. Not being able to provide this service can have serious repercussions in a country like New Zealand, where Water Safety NZ have shown the drowning rate per 100,000 of population to be twice that of Australia and four times that of the UK.

Communication between the club and SWDC has been extremely frustrating, despite efforts on the club's part to communicate. It has taken over 50 days for the council to formally respond to requests of the club to prepare for the 2018/19 season. A bare minimum of matters raised were addressed from a September club/council poolside walk-around. This is despite efforts and support from councillor Olds, for which we thank him for his support.

We appreciate that there has been a vacancy recently within council but this lack of response is an example of what has been happening for several years already. Despite this, it is assured that council representatives will be more communicative in the future and we have a planned meeting at the end of the 2018/19 season on the 5 March to discuss further needs for the following season.

We had hoped to send with this submission supplementary data collection regarding the pool, but despite repeated requests council haven't sent on this information from CLM contracting.

The club requested to see the management plan and budget for the pool. In the September meeting we were told by the group manager of infrastructure and services that the pool was managed by council on an 'as needs' basis. The problem the club has with this is that this relies on adequate inspections being carried out by council to inspect the state of the assets. This has not happened and we now have a situation where we essentially have no solar heating for the pool due to council only now alerting the club to the fact that the solar heating has begun to leak onto the roof. This is evidence that there has been no regard by SWDC to check or monitor this important infrastructure for the pool. The result of little monitoring of the pools assets and infrastructure to inform planning is that now the roof and guttering have become exposed to rust and the heating now has to be removed entirely leaving the pool with no solar heating for the season about to start.

There have been repeated requests over many years by the club to council requesting maintenance needs. These needs have not been met and we have slowly seen the degradation of the current infrastructure over time. Items of primary importance/concern are:

- New covers for the pool - the club has been waiting several years for this with confirmation just now that these will be replaced.
- A removal of the supplementary pool heating system by council from the rugby club roof in 2016 (resulting in lower pool temperatures, due to a leak- this has not been replaced)
- lack of maintenance and inspection of the swim club solar heating (resulting in the degradation of the roof and a leaking solar system with the remaining heating available -we are now being faced with removal of this, leaving the complex with no heating)

The heating (covers and solar) is proven to be a basic necessity throughout New Zealand for the running of a swim club to provide swimming lessons, and for the community to use the pool (including toddlers and the elderly -for without heating infrastructure these groups have limited access). When the solar heating was installed on both the rugby club roof and the swim club roof, this was fund-raised for by the community at the time. The FASC have raised thousands of dollars donated from the community over the years for improvements to the pool such as; pool covers, starting blocks, solar heating, concrete for main pool etc.

In addition to the items above (which we feel are most important), matters still to be addressed that have been raised (some for a while now and were again) raised at a September (and at an urgent November meeting) with council/club pool walk-around and prior are:

- toddler pool edges on eastern side unsafe height -falls risks
- concrete uneven on south side of main pool -trip hazard
- Trees on northern boundary of pool blocking filters (card reserve)
- northern fence needs replacing (easy entry for vandals) -propose replace with same as existing steel fencing on eastern/western sides of same
- spot lights need new bulbs/maintenance
- learner pool steps need fixing to concrete -drowning hazard/falls hazard
- main building guttering rusted and leaking
- mesh between club-room and fire-brigade building needs repairing
- pool painting (the club has been waiting several years for this also)
- There is no disabled access for any of the pools in the complex -making swimming access difficult for groups such as elderly and disabled
- the door on the female change room needs to be replaced (to full length like male same)

The matters raised that have been addressed by council and the club from Septembers meeting are;

- grating on main pool fixed -drowning hazard
- loose tiles fixed -slip/trip hazard
- leaves removed from guttering and down-pipe by office replaced
- Northern fence palings mended
- provision of shading (sails to be installed)

As a club we propose:

1. That new solar heating be installed to the community pool before 2019/20 season
2. The pool be painted before 2019/20 season
3. General maintenance items as above be carried out before 2019/20 season (ideally this needs to be finished by the start of November 2019 to allow filling and warming of the pool for the season)
4. A five year rolling maintenance/budget/asset plan (to be rolled around yearly) that is formally worked on from now for the pool between council and club to ensure adequate time to fund-raise or prepare for future upkeep of the pool and its needs.

The lack of maintenance and planning by SWDC regarding the pool has resulted in members of the community now travelling outside the district for swimming lessons because Featherston is no longer able to provide the warm and safe environment for learning to swim that residents expect.

Featherston pool being the only complex in South Wairarapa large enough to cater for the South Wairarapa cluster school swimming sports has sadly lost this much needed local event this year. The decision was made at a combined school principal meeting recently to hold this event in Masterton due to the cold conditions of the Featherston Pool over the last couple of years. This is as a direct result of the pool needs not being met by council and will likely result in some children from the community not being able to attend these sports, as well as a missed opportunity for local schools to fund-raise on the day of this event. We also worry about the long term effect this will have on child water safety in the South Wairarapa.

As the council's Opus report (2012) suggests (see point 3. discussion -minimal maintenance), we face an imminent threat of losing this valuable asset over the long term, if steps are not put in place to preserve it.

As a club we wish to continue to provide a strong centre for learning to swim and as guardians of the pool we would like to see our needs met (as we have outlined above) so the club and the rest of the community can benefit from the use of the pool.

Thank you very much for listening to our concerns in this submission. We look forward to better communication and efficient, sustainable management of this vital part of the Featherston community.

As a supplementary article we would like to bring to your attention an example of the difference to a community that heating can make to a pool. Please see attached document -A pool to be proud of - in particular the section "stepping up" and the temperature achieved by the Stewart Island community.

Let's get this pool managed well so as a community we can be proud of it and so residents won't have to travel outside the district to get the benefits of learning to swim as they will have the use of a warm pool.

The Board of Trustees for St Teresa's School, Featherston wishes to express our support of the application to install solar panels at the Featherston Swimming Pool. We believe that the swimming pool is a great asset for the Featherston community and the community needs to make the most use possible from such a valuable asset.

As a school we appreciate being able to include swimming in our Healthy and Physical Education programme. We are grateful that the South Wairarapa District Council allows children to swim for free so these lessons do not impact on the school's budget. If the Featherston pool was heated, we feel the pool would be used more in Term 1, and in Term 4. We would certainly look at holding water safety lessons. It would be ideal to run these before the long summer break.

When we surveyed our parent community about our Healthy and Physical Education programme in 2018 the majority of parents supported the continued inclusion of swimming in our programme. These are some of the comments parents made:

An essential lifelong skill that can be utilized for the rest of their lives

Maybe give the option of going to an extra swimming lesson at an indoor pool with a swimming instructor.

This is an important programme for every child to experience confidence in the water and improve their swimming skills

Could some swim safety take place in term 4 prior to the holidays?

Shame the current pool facilities don't let swimming happen for longer

Support to help transfer swimming skills to rivers - given the area we live in

It would be great if the pool was heated as that would make a huge difference to the learning of vital swimming skills. My daughter finds the water extremely cold on the cool days and that impacts on her ability to take in the learning.

We have organised the Featherston Cluster Swimming Sports and the South Wairarapa Swimming sports for all the primary schools in the South Wairarapa over several years. This year for the first time the South Wairarapa event was held in Masterton in their covered pool. The reason for this change was to eliminate the impact of cancellation due to weather conditions. The most frequent comment heard from the pupils swimming was that they enjoyed the warm water, compared to the "ice breaker" of previous years. The down side of moving the event to Masterton was the impact on South Wairarapa parents who had to travel further and were unable to just pop in to see their children race. The distance also made it harder for us to organise the event. We struggled to get the required number of marshals and the money raised through selling sausages was also down on previous years.

A Pool to be Proud Of....

Community: Stewart Island
Theme: Working together in place

The Beginning....

The Halfmoon Bay Community Pool was first developed in the early 1970s as a basic, concrete, cyclone-fenced, rain water filled extension of the wider ocean that the Halfmoon Bay community literally has as our constantly changing vista. However this pool of water is not so deep and doesn't contain big biting fish, crashing waves or seaweed!!

This 'community' pool was erected on Ministry of Education land and was subsequently run by funding provided by the Ministry and through the School Board's fundraising initiatives. However, fund raising for the pool itself was very much a creative local effort.

The local Stewart Island Lions Club raised some initial funding to build the pool. Momentum grew, especially with the local publican leading a bike tour from Cape Reinga to Bluff in 1971- a real challenge given the bikes were steel framed, roads rough, there were no energy drinks and lycra and chamois pants were nowhere to be seen. Plus the abundant number of pubs along State Highway 1 made this a treacherous journey. Nevertheless, all those around supported the cause both financially and in time and energy – particularly energy! A substantial amount of cash was thus raised to enable a community pool to be built.

At the time the pool was built there were three full classes at Halfmoon Bay School, an active play centre and a thriving fishing community. Having a pool marked a new era at the school. Swimming lessons could now be held on site rather than require a walk over the hill to 'Bathing Beach' where previous lessons had often been held.

Always Room for Improvement

Living on an Island, local kids spend a lot of time on wharves and boats, meaning that learning to swim is a priceless skill.

Since its opening, numerous children have learnt to swim in the community pool. There have also been many improvements made to the pool as there is a constant desire for the pool to better serve the community's needs. The first obvious improvement implemented was to raise the temperature of the water. Whilst there was no seaweed or tidal action, the temperature remained **very** cool- thus reducing the practical amount of time available for teaching children to swim.

More funds were raised and the pool was converted to an 'indoor pool' - the old fence now replaced with a steel frame and translucent cladding. Then, due to the very high price of electricity (at this point only available by individual generators), an innovative and cost effective method of heating the pool was installed. Solar energy was captured through polythene pipes on the roof. At the time, there were many people who again said "it'll never work!" But creative, lateral thinking is evident throughout the history of our community pool. Solar water heating via the polythene pipes proved to be a very effective solution and at times the pool reached 20 degrees, considerably warmer than the ocean!!

Changing Times

As our community has changed over the years, the number of families here on the Island has dwindled. Fishing is no longer the main income and as a consequence there has been a change in population dynamics. By 2005, we had a school roll of around 16 children.

In addition, the Ministry of Education introduced tighter regulations and more accountability around school pools. This brought new challenges for small communities like ours –new guidelines required water testing every hour and a lifeguard to be constantly present. Pool maintenance was also becoming a big, expensive issue with cladding requiring an upgrade, heating pipes and pumps failing and cracks in the concrete base all becoming serious concerns. These issues, combined with high running costs, meant the community pool suddenly became prohibitive to run and maintain for a very small school.

Stepping Up

The School Board at the time were at an impasse. They desperately wanted to keep the pool running, but were not adequately funded to do so and Ministry of Education's new pool regulations were so stringent that it was deemed impossible to meet the required standards.

Then two Mums of six children stepped up - active and vocal in their desire to ensure that the pool remained open. Some serious brainstorming as to the 'how to' and "with what funding" conversations were had. Many great achievements have been made over a bottle of wine! The Health and Safety regulations for the Ministry were satisfied with a change to a new salt chlorination system that does not require the same stringent testing as regular chlorine pools. A volunteer has been checking the water daily (as opposed to hourly) ever since and is all AOK.

A successful application was submitted to the Community Trust of Southland for upgrading the solar panels, heating system and cladding. The Trust approved the grant on the basis that funding was for a 'community' pool as opposed to a purely school pool.

Yet another working bee was then organized with many locals turning up to fix up the cladding and install the new heating system. The enthusiasm was infectious throughout the community and the children were wildly excited about the prospect of having a warmer pool.

Warm it is, and long lessons the children now have. It is now also warm enough (29-32 degrees being optimal) that the under 5's can also have several classes each season – as part of the Rugsrats early childhood centre timetable during term time, with their own families and under the watchful eye of a volunteer Mum during school holidays.

The pool is now open from late October to April (or when temperatures deem it suitable) allowing a huge increase in the amount of time that the school children are now able to swim. Many others in the community now swim also - once they have purchased a key (a small fundraising measure) and agreed to the conditions of use. The pool now provides a great new way to get fit and an excellent rainy day activity!! Halfmoon Bay school children are now very competitive with mainland schools in swimming competitions, and the confidence of water safety that it gives parents who have children around water is immeasurable.

Today there is more to happen still! More solar panels are to be installed as our cooler Southland conditions mean that we should have 20% more panels that we currently have to ensure optimum usage from the available sun. Next summer is going to be even warmer in the water!!

Very recently, over another bottle of wine, a bright and enthusiastic community member mooted the idea of an entirely new pool! This would be deeper, longer, wider and more appealing to a wider range of the community. I believe that this will eventuate as we have the history of dedication to a project that is somewhat unprecedented - anything can be done here on Stewart Island.

Intent:

- Increasing community safety around water.
- Maximising opportunities for local children to keep pace with swimming skills of their off-island counterparts.
- Providing another option physical activity and exercise in our community.

Learnings:

- Good ideas gain momentum when good minds of local leaders are prepared to get the ball rolling.
- Good ideas can still face hurdles and not all hurdles show up at the onset. Some emerge long after the initial motivators have moved on and require new people to step forward.
- Times of crises can be useful tipping points for others to 'step in/step up' to help.
- Facilities are empty opportunities unless people use them – and then they become priceless.
- It is not disrespectful to take a great achievement and improve on it.
- Central government does not always respond well to the needs of individual, unique communities – 'one size fits all' policies do not generally fit all!
- Communities know themselves best and are best placed to make decisions that achieve local needs.
- There are ways to work 'with' regulations - they don't always have to stop things from happening.

Outcomes:

- While many other schools and towns have lost their pools, Stewart Island has retained and enhanced theirs –for both school and broader community use.
- Upgrading of the pool has enabled a much longer swimming season for local pool users, with temperatures of 34 degrees now achievable in the height of summer.

- Having a community pool and access to swimming lessons, means Stewart Island children are now more competent swimmers, with a much better sense of water safety – both essential ingredients for Island living!
- Halfmoon Bay children have the chance to be competitive with other NZ kids in swimming and water based sports.
- Adults have reconsidered the importance of their children learning to swim. Many are now spending time at the pool with their kids –something that didn't really happen before.
- Under 5's are now easily able to gain their first experiences in water in a planned, relaxed and comfortable way – without having to leave the Island.

- There is no maximum amount for any one grant, however, the SWDC's resources are limited and funding support is not guaranteed on an on-going basis.
- Applicants will need to re-apply each year for consideration of funding to continue.
- There is a 12-month time limit for uplifting the funds from the date of notification of approval.
- After 12 months, if funds have not been uplifted the grant will be rescinded and a new application must be completed and submitted for consideration.
- Unused funds must be returned to SWDC.

Supporting material:

- Organisations are required to provide copies of their most recent annual report and financial statements that have either been audited or reviewed by a suitably qualified person.
- Within two months of completion of the project or event, applicants are required to send to the SWDC a completed Grant Accountability form.

- Grants will be paid directly into the applicant organisation's designated bank account.
- SWDC may request receipted accounts as evidence of payment in advance of release of this grant.

Thank you for the opportunity to supply a quotation to solar heat the Featherston Public **swimming pool**.

The **Alpha OKU** pool system is very unique , and is very different to any other solar pool heating system on the market today, the main difference is it has an expected lifespan of 25 years plus as you would expect for a German designed product, and for every 2 square meters of pool surface area only 1 square meter of Alpha OKU solar pool panel is required (1:2 ratio) based on an average pool depth of 1.4m , this means 100% of the pool surface area is being heated with only 50% of solar panel surface area.

The **pool's** surface area is approx **396m²**,... 50.% coverage of Alpha OKU solar pool panel is required versus the pool surface area, under that scenario you will require **200** x (1.12m² Alpha OKU panels = **220m²** of solar array, this equation assumes that "**the pool has a cover**". Your Alpha OKU panel requirements maybe less if the pool depth is less than 1.4m

Based on the plans that were sent to me from Jennifer Roberts of the Featherston Swimming Club, the roof dimensions for panel installation I received are as follows :

Roof 1 = 3.8 deep x 33.1m long roof we could get **72** panels (2 rows of 36)

1. which would be reduced to 3 groups...
2. Each Group would consist of 2 parallel rows of 12 = 24, (total 72 panels),
3. should you extend the depth from 3.8m to 4.3 you would be able to get on another row of panels to add to the groups giving you another possibly 36 panels which would change the groups to 3 rows of 36 as opposed to 2 rows of 36

Roof 2 = 21.3m x 7.8m roof we can get on **115** panels

1. which would consist of 3 groups,
2. Group 1 and 2 has 5 rows of 8, = 40 panels x 2 groups = (80 panels)...
3. group 3 has 5 rows of 7 = 35 panels

Total panels equals **187**...13 short of the 200 required. The Alpha OKU panels comes with a 10 years warranty on the panels and standard manufacturers warranties on **all** remaining components which are generally 2 years.

The firm quoted price for the supply only of a 187 panel Alpha OKU solar pool heating system is :

The quoted system price **includes** all associated components such as

- Alpha OKU solar panels
- Panel joiner hoses and 31 6L stainless steel clamps
- Solar pool pump ,

Please bear in mind local conditions can effect sizing also, such as the location maybe in a cooler part of the country that gets less irradiation on the panels in the summer time compared to other NZ locations , wind chill on the panels and the surface area of the pool is also a factor



This submission is made by **Stephanie Luxford and Xavier Watts**. Please count this submission as two separate submissions made by each of us. We are the ratepayers of 61A Watt Street, Featherston. We do not give permission for our address and contact information to be published with our submission.

We support all four initiatives covered in the consultation document (subject to our comments in the main body of our submission below). We would like to see the initiatives implemented in this order:

- 1) Change in funding for housing for seniors
- 2) Extended pool opening hours
- 3) Extra footpath maintenance
- 4) Reduction in library charges

Feedback on the discussion topics

Topic 1: reduction in library charges

We agree that there should no fees for renting adult fiction, children and youth fiction, and DVDs. We also agree that there should be no charge for reserving books. We submit that we prefer option 4, subject to the following comments.

Option 4 supports removing fees for overdue books. While we agree that there may be some benefit to removing the charges for overdue adult and children's books, we disagree with completely removing the charges for overdue books because this seems to remove the incentive for customers to return their library books on time. This could have flow on effects, because if books are not returned to the library by their due dates, other people who have reserved books or could want to borrow the books may not be able to access the books for some time after they otherwise would have had access to the books. Additionally, removing the fees for overdue books provides no incentive for customers who have lost their books to notify the library of this and pay the replacement cost of the lost books.

We submit that overdue book fees should only be removed in certain circumstances. For example, where a person has a general history of compliance with their library book due dates, and has not incurred any overdue fees in the last three months, the system should automatically remove their fees. Where someone has repeated non-compliance, however, overdue fees should continue to be applied. Librarians should also have the ability to exercise discretion to remove overdue fees from a person's account where it is clear they have no ability to pay the fees, or to require them to pay the fees would result in severe hardship. If someone incurs overdue fees for the same book for a certain period of time (say two or three months), the person should be assumed to have lost the book, and should be required to pay the replacement cost of the book.

Topic 2: extended pool opening hours

We agree with extending the pool opening hours. We agree, for the most part, with the proposed new opening hours (see below), although would like to see longer opening hours in the weekend.

We submit however that consideration should be given to changing the proposed swimming pool opening hours on Saturdays and Sundays. It is currently proposed that the swimming pools be open

from 11am to 7.30pm on Saturdays and Sundays. We support funding the increased opening hours through rates collected from South Wairarapa residents.

New Zealand has one of the highest incidence rates of melanoma in the world ([Melanoma NZ, accessed 4 May 2019](#)). The risk of melanoma increases with sun exposure, and experiencing sunburn at any age increases the risk of melanoma in later life. To prevent melanoma, Melanoma New Zealand recommends staying in the shade and protecting one's skin between 10am to 4pm in summer. This is supported by the Cancer Society, which advises that UV radiation levels are particularly high from September to April between 10am and 4pm ([Cancer Society, accessed 4 May 2019](#)).

The currently proposed pool opening hours on Saturdays and Sundays fall, for the most part, within the time New Zealand typically has peak UV radiation levels. Only part of the Featherston pool, for example, is shaded, which means a lot of the pool is still fully exposed to the sun. The pool will only be open for 3.5h outside of these peak UV radiation times - from 4pm to 7.30pm. The council has an obligation to consider the health and safety of South Wairarapa residents. We submit that the pool should be open earlier in the morning (say from 8am), so that people have the opportunity to use the pool before the peak UV radiation hours.

If staffing costs are a concern, the pools could be closed for a few hours during the middle of the day when UV radiation levels are the highest. Possible opening hours could be:

- Morning opening hours: 8am to 12pm
- Afternoon opening hours: 3pm to 7.30pm

If this submission is not accepted, then we submit that there should be an option for residents to apply for access to the pool outside standard opening hours. Residents could provide a deposit to the council in exchange for a key to access the pool, and would use the pool at their own risk. A suggested deposit amount could be \$25 or \$50.

Topic 3: change in funding of housing for seniors

It is important for the elderly to be housed in warm, well-insulated and ventilated houses. We agree that it is important that Council-provided housing for these people continues to be available at affordable prices. We agree with ratepayers contributing to the cost of senior housing.

Topic 4: extra footpath maintenance

We agree that more money should be spent on footpath upgrades in South Wairarapa. We are prepared to pay increased rates to fund this.

Other submissions

Upgrade to pool facilities

The long term plan refers to an intention to complete pool upgrades in 2018/19. We used the Featherston swimming pool when it was open earlier this year. The water was cold, and when we made inquiries we were advised that the system which heats the water was not functioning properly. We did not return to the pool after this occasion, because we were told it was unlikely the council would fix the heating issue this season, and the swimming pool water would continue to be very cold until this heating issue was fixed. We submit that the Featherston pool heating

system should be fixed or replaced as a matter of priority, so that residents are not discouraged from using the pool when it opens later on this year. We note that the Wellington City Council run Thorndon pool, which is an outdoor pool, is heated to 28°C ([Wellington City Council, accessed 4 May 2019](#)).

Infrastructure to prevent flooding

The council needs to invest more in improving, or putting in place, infrastructure to prevent flooding in Featherston.

Martinborough drinking water

We note that the [consultation document](#) refers to the Council's intention to invest in and install a manganese extraction plant in Martinborough. It explains that "removing the manganese delivers a variety of benefits and allows for potential chlorination of Martinborough's water in the future". We submit that drinking water, whether in Martinborough or any other part of the South Wairarapa district, should only be chlorinated if this is absolutely necessary, and where the benefits of chlorination can be shown through solid evidence to far outweigh the costs of chlorination. In addition, we submit that before decisions on chlorination are made, consultation must be undertaken with all affected residents.


Workshop dates

We note that a number of workshops were held regarding the annual plan. These workshops were all on weekdays. Considering the growth experienced in the South Wairarapa region of residents who commute to Wellington for work, we submit that there should be at least one workshop held on a weekend so that commuters are provided with a better opportunity to attend, learn more about the issues being consulted on, and provide their feedback. While we appreciate that the preference for council staff is likely for workshops held during the week, most professionals are expected to work reasonable overtime, which may include overtime after work and in some instances work on the weekend. It is not unreasonable to expect council staff to spend a few hours on the weekend, on the rare occasion something is released by the council for consultation with residents, to meet with and discuss issues with residents.

If the Council has any questions on our submission we are happy to speak at the hearing on 30 or 31 May. If this is the case, please notify us at least 3 working days in advance so that we can make arrangements to be available. Otherwise, we do not wish to speak to our submission.

Dear Mr. Crimp.

By the time you receive this we will be in 2019. This will be an ideal time for the council to redeem one of its appalling lapses these past years. I refer to the state of footpaths particularly in Featherston where I am a resident and ratepayer. That I am a wheelchair user is beside the point. For any person, disabled or not there are several footpaths in the town that represent a danger to the general public. Getting from Fox Street to the medical centre or public toilets is an obstacle in itself. Whoever designed the sloping accesses to road crossings had obviously not taken into account how dangerous it could be for any person with a mobility difficulty, parents with prams, walkers and motor scooters. Approaching the public toilets one is faced with roots from the trees roots bulging through the surface that presents an uneven surface and situation where wheelchairs/ scooters can tip over, as I have experienced. That the medical centre is about to move still presents a problem at the new address. Passing the Police Station it is necessary to go onto the road as on arriving at the corner of Bell Street one is presented with a direct drop onto the road.

I must give praise for the creation of the sealed pathway between Bell and Haywood Streets following four years of pleading for this to be done.

The park? In Fitzherbert Street has two dangerous slopes that that are unmarked thus causing another example where wheeled vehicles can tip over. There is a similar slope at the side of the supermarket where there is yellow markers indicating danger there. If the supermarket can be so thoughtful why can't the Council?

I look forward to a year where the Council can show it is worthy of looking after all its ratepayers who will then be able to move around in safety.

May I also draw your attention to the amount of heavy traffic moving through the town. When recent celebrations were taking place this offensive traffic was diverted via other streets. It also creates an unsocial atmosphere to our town. I would like to see this become permanent. In addition I would like to see all heavy traffic stopped from travelling across the Rimutaka Hill Roads between 0600 to 0900 and from 1600 to 1900. These are commuter times that when drivers are faced with these lumbering obstructions it tempts a number of car/van drivers to take risks thus creating the possibility of accidents. Having lived and spent several years living in German and travelling throughout Europe I would like to point out that all heavy traffic is forbidden to travel between 1800

and 0600 the next day on motorways and from 1800 on Fridays until 0600 on Monday. I'm sure you would like to know that Germany in particular that there is no such thing as an accident. Any occurrence is considered a breach of a regulation. Just try making an insurance claim.

All I have written should be considered a learning curve, that is if the Council are looking to be elected in future. Should there be alternative avenues to express the above I look forward to your reply.

Pursuant with the Local Government Act 2010 Part 4:54(d) (sic) Role of community boards to prepare an annual submission to the territorial authority for expenditure within the community.

The Chair has taken advice from LGNZ with regards to the Annual Plan Submission. The result is that because we did not have a formal meeting to agree on the content of the submission this is a informal submission.

We would like to speak to this submission

Discussion Topic 1 – Reduction in Library Charges

We support option 3. The Board sees the value and increasing our social capital. Removing the over due fines as in option three allows for adults to keep reading and encourage young adults and children back to the library.

Discussion Topic 2 – Extended pool hours

The Board is in favour of extended the pool hours. We support the Featherston Amateur Swimming Clubs grant application and submission except that we think that both heating the pool and extending the hours available are not exclusive and both can be done for the benefit of the Community.

Discussion Topic 3 – Change in funding for housing for Seniors

There are conflicting opinions around the Featherston Community Board table, we believe this is best addressed through the annual plan process.

Discussion Topic 4 – Extra Funding for footpath maintenance

The Board is in favour of extra funding for footpath development. We need to fill the gaps that exist in our growing town.

The Featherston Community Board ranked the 4 consultation options as follows:

- 1 Footpath funding.
- 2 Reduction in Library charges
- 3 Extended pool hours

Featherston Pool

During a school module on improvements to our Community, the Featherston School Inquiry class suggested that the pool really needed bike racks for scooters and bikes at the pool. Having spent most of last summer at the pool, I can personally confirm that a bike rack would indeed be a very useful and practical addition to the town pool.

Furthering our Priority projects and initiatives in our Strategic Plan

1. Completion of the Town square.
 - a. We would like the town square to be completed. This may not be phase two of the plans as originally set out. We would like the paving pattern to be completed to the edge of the sculpture area , to the skate park and towards Fox Street. This area is difficult for elderly to navigate and it has an uneven surface.
 - b. We would like temporary shelter on the south side of the square so that people using the town square are protected, at least to some extent, from the wind.
2. Supporting vulnerable people, elderly and young
 - a. We support the creation of a South Wairarapa Youth Council that liaisons with Youth Councils around the Country.
3. Install a water fountain in the Playground so that children do not have to leave the park to get water.
4. We expect the Council to consult with Playground users on any major alterations and additions to the playground. This may involve working with any Community Led Development Group interested in the Playground.
5. Prioritise footpath usability from Housing for Seniors to the main street

6. Toilet Block in Card Reserve

We think it's time the toilet block in Card Reserve on the corner of Harrison and Johnston Streets (next to the waste dump) was upgraded and should to include coin operated and timed showers.

Firstly this topic has come up before. An upgrade would benefit the following users:

- Dog Park users
- Train passengers for when the facilities are shut on the platform
- Cyclists using the nearby Rimutaka Trail
- Freedom Campers who used the pool showers and toilets over the summer.

7. Commemorate 100 Years since WWI

The Featherston Community Board supports Heritage NZ Augmented Reality of the Featherston Camp.

8. E-mail Database.

We ask Council to further develop the database to allow direct communication from both Council and Community Boards to those who wish to receive it. For example all ratepayers would receive emergency e-mails and rates notifications but residents and ratepayers could opt in to receiving updates and information from Community Boards. In Featherston this would have been of use after the flooding event on 1 December 2018 to get targeted information out to the Community.

Supporting Grant Applications

The Featherston Community Board supports our community groups through grants. We can support grant applications to the Council through this process. In this role we support for following groups as they apply for funding to the South Wairarapa District council in this annual plan funding round.



Dear Viv,

Barb Roydhouse, Chair of Aratoi Regional Trust, has told me that she and Trust member Lydia Wevers had a very useful meeting with you on 7 November and I am writing to follow up formally from those discussions.

As you know the South Wairarapa District Council, along with the Masterton and Carterton District Councils, have been the major funders of Aratoi since it began. Aratoi could not function without this funding which is mainly used for operational costs - staffing, utilities, professional requirements. In return Aratoi, which is the only professional museum in the region, looks after a nationally significant collection of paintings, sculpture, taonga and historical artefacts. We hold a large and important collection of pre-European artefacts - the Palliser and Broughton collections - excavated from South Wairarapa sites. These irreplaceable and precious objects require professional storage and curatorial care. We also look after a significant number of portraits of South Wairarapa rangatira by Gottfried Lindauer and have a long history of exhibiting these and other significant aspects of South Wairarapa history, such as in the Ngāti Kahungunu, Wairarapa Moana and Featherston Camp exhibitions. Since 2002 there have been 32 single artist exhibitions by South Wairarapa artists, the most recent being Stephen Allwood at the end of last year. I attach a list.


As you are aware Aratoi's finances have become very tight. We are understaffed and meeting operational costs such as temperature control and museum quality lighting, is increasingly difficult. In real terms the revenue generously provided by the joint councils has significantly fallen as a percentage of our costs. The MCDC has recently restored us to a three-year Memorandum of Understanding, which makes it much easier to plan. We are also taking initiatives ourselves such as setting up a Patrons Trust for endowments, but as you will be aware, operational costs which are the lifeblood of any institution, are not typically what patrons like to fund.

We would like to establish a Memorandum of Understanding with the South Wairarapa District Council which would allow for funding to be put in place for a three-year cycle. I understand that the SWDC has recently renewed its Long Term Plan, but we would like to be transferred to your long term plan in due course, so that we can develop a structure for future planning which would suit us both. We understand that you also fund the three smaller local museums of the South Wairarapa and think there could be a helpful working synergy with these organisations, some of which is already in place.

I would like to invite you and your Council to hold a council meeting on our premises early in the New Year. This would enable us to show your Council members some of the South Wairarapa treasures we look after and have an informal discussion about how to progress our relationship with you.

Aratoi exhibitions featuring South Wairarapa artists & subject matter

Since Aratoi opened in 2002 there have been 32 single artist exhibitions by South Wairarapa artists, and many more have been represented in the biennial Wairarapa Review, and Little Jewels, and other group exhibitions such as Main Artery and Wairarapa Schools Art.

Seven history exhibitions that concentrated largely on South Wairarapa history:

Kahungunu Ka Moe ...Ka Puta (tīpuna photographs from the Turnbull Library collection)

Sea Change – History of coastal settlement

Kupe Sites

Wairarapa Whakaputa Mohio/Settling the land: the 800 year history of the Wairarapa

Wairarapa Moana – the story of Lake Wairarapa

Te Marae o Rongotaketake – Kahungunu history

Featherston Military Camp: the record of a remarkable achievement (most of this exhibition moved to Featherston Heritage Museum)

History exhibitions are hugely expensive to research and present

Outreach exhibitions at South Wairarapa venues:

Kahungunu exhibition at Martinborough Town Hall in 2004

Aratoi, Rutherford Trust and Prior Collections: selected works at Martinborough Town Hall (for Martinborough Arts Festival) (this exhibition cost a small fortune – truck hire, extra staff, purchase of special hanging system because of concrete walls)

Papawai Marae Kotahitanga Hui weekend 2012 – taonga exhibited, including Lindauer paintings, plus exhibition furniture and staff

Farewell Zealandia – the music of WWI – at Anzac Hall in Featherston (expensive – walls built especially, which have since been lent long term to Featherston Heritage Museum), staff time, travel etc)

Robin White *Summer Grass* shown in Velocity Café in Featherston for the weekend of the Japanese POW camp anniversary

Hosting performances and exhibitions for the Kokomai Arts Festival

Approximately a quarter of the Aratoi collection has South Wairarapa provenance.

There are three other museums in the South Wairarapa: Cobblestones, Martinborough Museum and the Featherston Heritage Museum, but Aratoi the only professional museum in the region, open 7 days a week.

- To celebrate our Toanga that is Aratoi and enable the 50th anniversary exhibition.
- To continue the fostering of the relationship of co-promotion of the district's tourist and cultural amenities within the wider South Wairarapa District.

The guiding public document of the SWDC LTP 2018/28 shows encouraging outcomes for Cultural Development in the community. Point 2 of the Community Outcomes wants "educated and knowledgeable people contributing to the cultural development of the district" and Point 3 "to encourage cultural development for the benefit of the district and the Wairarapa as a whole." Aratoi, the Wairarapa Museum of Art and History is well paced to accomplish such outcomes to a high level.

Aratoi could not function without ongoing funding from SWDC which is mainly used for operational costs - staffing, utilities, professional requirements. In return Aratoi, which is the only professional museum in the region, looks after a nationally significant collection of paintings, sculpture, taonga and historical artefacts.

We hold a large and important collection of pre-European artefacts - the Palliser and Broughton collections - excavated from South Wairarapa sites. These irreplaceable and precious objects require professional storage and curatorial care. We also look after a significant number of portraits of South Wairarapa rangatira by Gottfried Lindauer and have

a long history of exhibiting these and other significant aspects of South Wairarapa history, such as in the Ngāti Kahungunu, Wairarapa Moana and Featherston Camp exhibitions. Since 2002 there have been 33 single artist exhibitions by South Wairarapa artists; recently Stephen Allwood and currently Sam Duckor-Jones, Denise Batchelor and Siv Fjaerestad. Our 50th anniversary exhibition will focus significantly on South Wairarapa Taonga and artists.

Aratoi's finances have become very tight. We are understaffed and meeting operational costs such as temperature control and museum quality lighting, is increasingly difficult. In real terms the revenue generously provided by the joint councils has significantly fallen as a percentage of our costs. We have a three-year Memorandum of Understanding with both Masterton and Carterton District Councils, which makes it much easier to plan. We are also taking initiatives ourselves such as setting up a Patrons Trust for endowments.

Ideally, we would like to establish a Memorandum of Understanding with the South Wairarapa District Council which would allow for funding to be put in place for a three-year cycle, so that we can develop a structure for future planning which would suit us both. We are aware that you also fund the three smaller local museums of the South Wairarapa and think there could be a helpful working synergy with these organisations, some of which is already in place.

Who will benefit from these funds and in what way?

- All Wairarapa residents and visitors to the region.
- All visitors to Aratoi Wairarapa Museum of Art and History and its education and outreach programmes.
- All rate payers and Councils in the Wairarapa through increased visitor numbers to the region.

1. Management of Community Housing- Rental Increase

We support the increase in rent for community housing.

2. Footpath Funding

Greytown Community Board (GCB) has requested additional footpath funding for new footpaths in the town in the last three annual / long term plan processes. We support that:

2.1. SWDC use the AP Consultation Document to canvas the views of ratepayers regarding footpath funding, including the option of an increase in rates to extend the footpath network.

2.2. We support investigating the use of funds from the development contributions to fund this should it be possible.

2.3. Should funding become available GCB priorities for new urban footpaths are as follows:

2.3.1. New Foot paths:

- Cotter St, western side. As this is a popular walking street to get to the Cycle Trail we see this as a high importance.
- Udy St, Western side
- Wood St, curbing on corner of Kempton & Wood St and footpath (from Kempton St to New development on 30-44 Wood St)
- West St, continue footpaths to North St
- Footpath in North St (southern side) between West and East Street

2.4 Lime footpaths

- Papawai Road (near Marae) on Northern side, from 50km sign to No 33.
- North St, Southern side (this may be subject to change as it is dependent on the position of the Waiohine Floodplain Stop banks)

2.5 Access for Disabled: We request that urgent attention is paid to the pedestrian crossings on Main St which are extremely difficult for those in our community who are on a mobility scooter or wheelchair due to the steep camber.

3. Management of Notable Trees Register –Historic Trees

Thank you for updating the historic tree register which we believe is very important. GCB continues to support the updating of the historic tree register on a regular basis and we request that;

- 3.1. This is reviewed again in next 5 years or next WCDP whichever is sooner.
- 3.2. To explore the opening of an historic tree nursery in Greytown to enable us to have large trees should any historic trees need replacing in the future.

4. Greytown Historic Precinct

GCB continues to be strongly in support of the Greytown Historic Precinct and we request that;

- 4.1 Consideration is given to reducing maximum heights in Greytown in the historic precinct to 10meters. - 5.3 That council considers having a budgetary allowance for this project.
- 5.4 We support the proposed Kuranui Sports Hub.
- 5.6 We would support council continuing to look for youth activities in the region.

The Featherston Rugby Football (Rugby club) thanks the South Wairarapa District Council for the opportunity to provide feedback and submit to their annual plan. Sport is a vital part of bringing the community together. It transcends age, race, gender, sexuality and religion – we believe greater investment in the Featherston sporting facilities would lead to increased positive community outcomes.

Pools

The Rugby club supports the Councils proposal to extend the hours of the pooling facilities in the South Wairarapa. We would like to propose that the pools open in early November and remain open for an additional three weeks until the second weekend in April. Traditionally, November and late March/early April are very warm.

Furthermore we propose that the Council consider heating and shading options for the Featherston pool to enable it to be open year around. The option of joint facilities with the Rugby Club could be considered as a method of creating greater usage of the pool for sporting events, providing economic growth for Featherston.

Sporting facilities in Featherston

Featherston has the largest population base of the three centres in the South Wairarapa. We believe greater investment is needed at Card Reserve. The proposed sports hub in Greytown should be reconsidered and appropriately located in Featherston. The sports facilities in Featherston are of great value and minimal investment would see these improved to world class venues that could host an increased number of events, providing economic growth for Featherston.

Flood light maintenance is needed on an annual basis. Additional flood lights would enable winter sports activities to be held in Featherston.

The New Zealand Cycle Classic – Major international cycling event

The energy and international marketing generated by the New Zealand Cycle Classic in 2018 was exceptional. The return on investment for the South Wairarapa region in hosting this event positions the Wairarapa as a major destination for road cycle racing in New Zealand.

The men's Tour generated direct benefits of:

- 691 guest nights from the teams alone
- 60 minutes of international coverage on Sky TV
- Facebook activity from professional teams and cycling organisations:
 - 46 posts
 - 6,475 likes
 - 175 comments
 - 316 shares
 - Plus whatever their combined audience of 119,000 did with the posts

The international event cover a lot of territory in the Wairarapa. Some days will see the tours cross through three District boundaries in a single stage. Each district has the opportunity to get their community involved and bring visitors into their towns.

South Wairarapa has the opportunity in Martinborough. This was a special stage for the riders in 2018. When the riders saw the crowds of spectators on Martinborough Square, it's reported that the speed of the peloton increased with the support they received. Four laps of town passing through the square on each occasion gave plenty of opportunity for spectators to get involved.

- The 2020 tour will spend two days racing in South Wairarapa with both stages finishing in Martinborough. An improvement in 2020 will be to have the stage pass through Martinborough in the same way but return to the town for the finish.

Putting on an international tour in 2020 will require a budget of approximate \$400,000. It is anticipated that large corporate sponsors and charitable organisations will be able to assist with the majority of this figure. Assistance from Councils to make these events happen would provide an excellent return on investment.

- The tours provide opportunities for the community to experience the skills of athletes who will be standing on the Tokyo Olympic dais in 2020
- The community will see these athletes at other community events for future athletes to learn what it takes to make it to the top

- This is not a new sport for New Zealand with several male and female Kiwi athletes already cycling as some of the best in the world. There would be no other sport with such a high profile that requires such a small investment
- The community engagement, visitor attraction and media coverage alone provides an excellent return for Councils

This event will help position the Wairarapa as the national centre for road cycle racing.

From the feedback discussed about Library Fees, rental and overdue, the concern was about the increasing overdue fees. Why not cap the total overdue fee to \$2 for example, a small reminder to return books rather than escalating fees. I have not seen enough evidence to agree with total removal of overdue fees.

I think the pension housing is a great asset to the community, and a shared cost to recoup costs is fair. SWDC however need to clarify the overlap between council subsidising rental costs vs pension eligibility to potential accommodation supplements from MSD. SWDC should also take a close look at their management for these accommodation as running these assets at a loss is a burden for the general rate payer. The rent and budget allowances should also take into account minor upgrade work to prevent large debt accumulating again.

I am willing to pay additional rates to upgrade and maintain footpaths. It would be great to see a simple footpath renewal programme for each town so the community feel informed and confident in progress being made.




SUBMISSION FOR SOUTH WAIRARAPA DISTRICT COUNCIL ANNUAL PLAN 2019
RE-ZONING AREA SOUTH OF MARKET ROAD.

This submission is presented for the Annual Plan on behalf of the following residents of Market Road, Greytown:

Graeme and Helen Gray
Marty Stevens and Catherine Kerr
Terry and Michele Falleni

Currently Market Road and the three properties located at the end and on the southern side of the road are zoned as rural land. Our submission is that this area be re-zoned to urban to enable the current parcels of land (approximately 2 hectares each) to be subdivided into sections ranging from a minimum 2000m² to 7000m².

This land was originally market gardens then an orchard until 1999, when it was subdivided into the three 2 ha lifestyle blocks that it is today. The proposed "Orchards Retirement Village" is on the north side of Market Road. Plans for this development show two of the major entrances to the village and also many of the stand-alone villas having access via Market Road. While we are not opposing this development, there is no doubt it will change the demographics of the area from rural to urban. Therefore, it seems practical to re-zone the area to include the land on both sides of Market Road.

We feel the following facts create a compelling argument for this re-zoning:

- Greytown Primary School is in very close proximity to Market Road;
- Kuranui College and the Medical Centre are both on the east side of Greytown;
- it is a very desirable location for larger residential properties close to the town centre;
- in discussion with real estate agents and other residents, it is apparent that there is a demand for sections of this size;
- the infrastructure of water and sewerage is already located under the roadway.

Environmental Impact


Should the area be re-zoned and the subdivision of our parcels of land be permitted, there would be no adverse effect on the land as the current blocks are not large enough to be viable. There would be no disposing of any undesirable substances.

As the services are already at our boundaries, there would not be a need to source water from the underground aquifer and no septic tanks would be required. However, if it was a requirement of subdivision, the sections would be large enough to accommodate a septic tank waste water disposal field.

The road is already tar sealed - this was paid for by the current residents some years ago and the road was then donated to the South Wairarapa District Council. There are currently trees along the boundary lines and more planting will most likely be undertaken.

With any proposed new sections being a minimum 2000m² there would not be a large number of residential properties backing on to the rural land of Papawai Road. Each section would be large enough to plant shelter belts to screen and protect the rural area.







Overview Map Market Road, Greytown

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
