The candidate will be elected or appointed if he or she receives the votes of a majority of the members of the local authority or committee who are present and voting. This system has the following characteristics:

- (a) There is a first round of voting for all candidates;
- (b) If no candidate is successful in the first round, there is a second round of voting from which the candidate with the fewest votes in the first round is excluded; and
- (c) If no candidate is successful in the second round, there is a third round, and if necessary subsequent rounds, of voting from which, each time, the candidate with the fewest votes in the previous round is excluded.

In any round of voting, if two or more candidates tie for the lowest number of votes, the person to be excluded from the next round is resolved by lot.

Wairarapa Recovery Report 27 July 2020 Agenda Item B1

1. PURPOSE

To Update the Wairarapa Recovery Committee on the recovery co-ordination.

2. SIGNIFICANCE

The matters for decision in this report are not considered to be of significance under the Significance and Engagement Policy.

3. BACKGROUND

In December 2019 a new pneumonia like illness was first reported to the medical fraternity from Wuhan in China. By early January 2020 a new type of coronavirus had been identified and isolated. In February the World Health Organisation (WHO) designated the newly identified coronavirus as "coronavirus 2019" or as we have become more familiar COVID-19.

On 11 March, the WHO declared an official pandemic.

On 23rd March 2020, the number of cases in New Zealand surpassed 100. Director-General of Health, Dr Ashley Bloomfield, confirmed 36 new cases in New Zealand, bringing the total to 102 with all cases been connected to international travel. However, two cases, confirmed on 21 March, could not be linked to overseas travel (one in the Wairarapa) and were treated as the first cases of community transmission within New Zealand.

At midnight on the 25th March 2020 New Zealand moved to COVID level 4. This has become a prominent part of New Zealand's history and referred to as lockdown. At that time there were a world-wide 72,757 confirmed cases of COVID-19 and 16,231 people had died.

As at 20th July 2020 there have been 14.5 million reported cases and over 600,000 deaths directly attributed to COVID-19.

4. WAIRARAPA RECOVERY COMMUNICATIONS

Since the previous report in June, the recovery team have developed a communications scoping document to provide a communications specialist a framework for the upcoming comms strategy (**Attachment 1**). A Communications and Marketing specialist and has been contracted by South Wairarapa District Council to undertake writing the communications

strategy which will be overseen by Masterton District Councils' Communications and Marketing Manager. In conjunction with the writing of the strategy, recovery branding and awareness has commenced with an awareness advertisement appearing in the Wairarapa Times Age midweek edition (**Attachment 2**).

A Wairarapa recovery website has been set up and provides links to each Council's own website to promote individual Council's recovery work. The website (<u>www.wairaraparecovery.nz</u>) will provide information on any shovel-ready projects and Council plans. The website contains information and links to other organisations such as Destination Wairarapa, funding opportunities, and information from Central Government including Central Government assistance and support packages.

The website will also contain a downloadable update that the team will prepare. An example of the format to appear on the website providing a public update is attached (**Attachment 3**). Note that this document is unfinished at this point with more economic reporting, environmental and social updates to be added in.

5. WAIRARAPA RECOVERY ECONOMIC MONITORING

A large amount of economic data is being collected, notably by the Wairarapa Economic Development Strategy (WEDS) group, and that data will be posted on the Wairarapa Recovery website. In addition to the broader economic data we will post relevant data from each Council such as the building consent numbers for each District, displayed below.

The relative numbers of building consents have reduced in comparison to the same time last year for all Councils, but the total value of works has substantially increased. The increased value suggests there are some large-scale building investments, and confidence, continuing within the Wairarapa.

In addition to building consents, property sales have remained strong with reportedly very strong sales volumes, high numbers of multiple offers presented on properties, and prices achieved consistently exceeding expectations across the Wairarapa.

6. SIGNIFICANT RECOVERY ACTIVITIES

6.1. Mayors Taskforce for Jobs Community Recovery Programme

The Mayoral task force for jobs (MTFJ) is a combined joint venture between the Ministry of Social Development, South Wairarapa District Council and Carterton District Council to get 50 young people into jobs or training within the next 12 months.

The MTFJ Community Recovery Programme has helped rural councils assist small to medium sized businesses (SMEs) with recruitment, training and subsidies, to help them take on young workers or those who have been displaced due to the impact of the Covid-19 crisis. The combined project will be reported on through the recovery team as the project progresses. Funding between the 2 districts may be up to 1 million for the current financial year.

The eligibility requirements unfortunately preclude Masterton District Council from direct funding, but Masterton residents will be included in the job placement projects.

6.2. Hood Aerodrome

A major Government investment will see construction on a revamped Hood Aerodrome get underway this year, creating jobs and boosting the local economy. The \$10 million investment from the Government's recently announced infrastructure fund will support Masterton District Council to get the project into construction.

The project will widen and extend the runway, including realigning the road and purchasing strategic land. It will also extend the taxiway and apron, upgrade the lighting, improve effluent, water and power on site, and fund increased security and CAA certification.

Construction in the first year is estimated to create 53 jobs locally, with a further 29 in the Wellington region, and once fully operational the project will support 200 employment opportunities in Wairarapa. Hood Aerodrome is an important asset to the Wairarapa, providing essential transport infrastructure and hosting major events like Wings over Wairarapa.

6.3. Masterton Forestry Roading

During June the Government announced funding from the Provincial Growth Fund for road and rail improvements across the country, including \$1m of this for tree removal and maintenance on high-risk roads across the Masterton district, employing 10 people. This work is underway in partnership with NZ Forest Works Ltd and Arb Innovations. There have been 10 staff employed on ground, with 4 new employees last week and another 2 potential staff members have been interviewed this week. All of the new staff and interviewees have come to the contractors through MSD / Work and Income and there has been will continue to be a really strong focus on the training and future employment objectives of this project.

The \$60 million worth of funding announced in June also included funding for work and employment (including redeployment) opportunities on the Wairarapa Rail Line.

6.4. Masterton Skate Park

The Government also announced \$1.3M for improvement works to the Masterton skatepark. The project is community-led with Council suppport and the redevelopment that has been funded in principle was designed by Masterton youth and an award-winning landscape architecture company. Once complete, the improvements will provide new experiences for our local families, recreational activity to support community and youth wellbeing, include job creation, event-hosting possibilities, retail opportunities and grow the skatepark as a regional attraction for visitors.

6.5. Other "Shovel Ready" projects

The Councils and others in Wairarapa have made applications for a number of shovel-ready projects into various government funding programmes. There is an expectation that some of these projects will be confirmed as receiving funding in the next few weeks. Announcements will be made as decisions on the applications are made.

7. WAIRARAPA SOCIAL RECOVERY ACTIVITIES

Alongside the economic impacts of COVID-19 the social recovery of the Wairarapa is an important pillar of the recovery plan. Key partners and sectors were identified in the scoping document adopted by the Committee (Iwi, WaiDHB, Work and Income (MSD), Connecting Communities Wairarapa, Caring for Communities Wellington, Education providers, Housing, Police/ Justice). To ensure this pillar makes progress the Mayor of Masterton has agreed to call together an initial group of partners, community representatives and providers to discuss next steps next month (August).

8. WAIRARAPA RECOVERY KEY PHASES

Despite the Oxford University group reporting promising results from their stage 1 vaccine trials, the COVID-19 pandemic continues to increase outside of New Zealand's borders and there remains a potential for community spread of the disease within New Zealand. Any future planning for Wairarapa recovery will need to keep this in mind. However, presented (**Attachment 4**) is a high-level, phased timeline indicating some key points in which the Wairarapa Recovery Committee may assess its role and future involvement.

Phase 1 continues from the recovery team commencement and the founding of the Wairarapa Recovery Committee.

Phase 2 provides an important milestone at the end of the wage subsidy and mortgage holiday schemes, which will have a yet unknown impact on the Wairarapa community. A greater level of coordination may be required by the recovery team and Committee through to phase 3 (or beyond).

Phase 3 begins at the start of the 2021 calendar year and it is at this point that a review of the level of coordination that is to be undertaken by the recovery team is scheduled. This may mean a reduced or altered reporting/meeting sequence.

The end of the financial year 2021 does not signal the end of the recovery but a checkpoint in which to analyse future Council involvement

9. WELLINGTON REGIONAL RECOVERY: UPDATE

The purpose of the Wellington Regional Recovery Group is to:

- Position the Wellington region to maximise the opportunities and minimize the impacts that result from COVID-19.
- Provide confidence to Central Government and the private sector that the region's local authorities have shared goals and are in alignment.
- Identify priority actions for the region that achieve bigger impacts, cost savings and efficiencies through regional collaboration.

The Wairarapa recovery team continues to actively contribute to the wider Wellington Regional Recovery Group. The group is currently scoping a range of regional recovery initiatives across the social, economic, infrastructure, and governance and collaboration themes. The initiatives are based on the following goals:

- Goal 1: Enhance the capability of NGOs and community groups to be more selfreliant
- Goal 2: Create economic opportunities for visitors to spend time and money within the region
- Goal 3: Lay the foundation for future infrastructure investment from Government
- Goal 4: Strengthen regional governance and collaboration for long-term benefits

WAIRARAPA COVID-19 RECOVERY: COMMUNICATIONS SCOPE

DOCUMENT PURPOSE

Communications planning and execution is crucial to the delivery of the Wairarapa COVID-19 Recovery Plan.

This document provides an overview of the objectives and requirements of the communications function and should be read in conjunction with the Wairarapa COVID-19 Recovery Plan and the Wairarapa COVID-19 Recovery Plan Scoping Document.

BACKGROUND

The COVID-19 pandemic, and the New Zealand Government's response to it, has significantly impacted the social and economic wellbeing of the country. While the short-term impacts have been very clear, the full scale and scope of consequences will continue to evolve and won't be realised for some time. We anticipate that the impacts will be significant and long lasting globally, nationally, and here in the Wairarapa.

Masterton, Carterton, and South Wairarapa District Councils are working together to develop the Wairarapa Covid-19 Recovery Plan. This approach ensures an integrated and consistent approach to recovery for the people of the Wairarapa, as well as a single point of contact for Iwi, the public, community groups, and our other partners.

COMMUNICATIONS

Requirements

The communications role will be overseen by Masterton District Councils' Communications and Marketing Manager, Shanna Vatselias.

Shanna played a key leadership role in the joint Wairarapa EOC, overseeing the Public information Management (PIM) Desk during the COVID-19 Response.

Shanna's oversight and quality assurance of communications collateral during the recovery phase will ensure consistency and continuity of a communications approach that is acknowledged to have been very successful to date.

Hours

It is recommended that the role be fulltime (35-40 hours per week) for the first two weeks in order to get the initial communications plan drafted and to establish ongoing phases/ engagement activities.

It is estimated that the ongoing requirement for the communications role will fluctuate between 10 and 20 hours per week, depending on what engagement and communications activities are being delivered.

Competencies

The following competencies are required to successfully fulfil the Recovery communications work:

- Keen eye for strategic outcomes, and ability to link implementation to the end goal of developing confidence amid community.
- Ability to take the high-level and strategic and make it meaningful to our community
- Experience in stakeholder engagement, with a preference for experience in community engagement)
- Ability to implement tactics like media relations and website management.

Initial objectives

Our initial communication objectives during recovery are:

- 1. Provide clear, relevant, accurate and timely information;
- 2. Two-way communication with our community including providing appropriate channels for feedback;

- 3. Ensuring information is accessible by our diverse communities and stakeholders; and
- 4. Be able to adapt communication methods to meet changing situations, needs and requirements.
