11 CHAIRPERSON REPORTS**11.1 CHAIRPERSON'S UPDATE****Strategic Māori Framework**

Pou Māori spoke to the update on development of the Strategic Māori Framework (SMF).

The Committee has received funding to do the groundwork to develop the framework, including:

- the Committee having a say
- the Committee going out to engage with their communities for feedback
- the production of the final framework.
- a reviewed Māori policy may also result from the framework.

Action for Ms Hooper: Provide a road map and timeframe for engagement with marae and mana whenua and milestones to ensure accountability and delivery.

Cr Baker left the meeting at 6.30pm and returned to the meeting at 6.32pm.

Elections NZ

Members were reminded that people must be enrolled 13 or 14 days before election day in order to vote, and were encouraged to share this information with their marae and communities. Elections NZ has offered support for marae information and enrolment processes, and members noted the importance of a collaborative approach to ensure planned Council library sessions also reach Māori communities.

Flood management activities and its effect on te Taiao

Ms Te Whaiti raised concerns about the ongoing impact of flood-related road works on the awa and te Taiao around Te Rata Road and Turanganui Bridge, noting repeated flooding and infrastructure repairs following recent severe weather events.

Members discussed the need to consider Te Mana o te Wai, listen to the awa, engage more closely with mana whenua, and explore constructive alternative solutions that could reduce ongoing damage to the awa while also saving ratepayers money and restoring balance.

A collaborative approach involving the Māori Partnership Committee, Greater Wellington Regional Council (GWRC), Council, Kahungunu ki Wairarapa, Rangitāne o Wairarapa, hapū, marae and the Wairarapa Moana Statutory Board was supported.

Actions for Ms Hooper: Seek further information from GWRC, SWDC Roding and Emergency Management before the next informal hui at 4 August 2026.

Actions for Ms Te Whaiti: Prepare a draft for circulation to members and further discussion at the informal hui.

10.1 LONG-TERM PLAN 2027-37

PURPOSE

To inform members of the upcoming process and timeframe for the Long-Term Plan 2027-37.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- Under the [Local Government Act 2002 \(LGA\)](#), Council must produce a Long-Term Plan (LTP) every three years.
- For the two years between each LTP (which are years two and three of the LTP, an Annual Plan must be produced).
- The last LTP for South Wairarapa District Council (SWDC) was 2025-34. This was due to legislation being passed that enabled councils to opt to complete an Enhanced Annual Plan instead of an LTP for 2024 due to the significant changes in water reform.
- Work is now underway for LTP 2027-37.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That *the Māori Partnership Committee* receive the Long-Term Plan 2027-37 Report.
2. Agree to review the current project plan for years four through to nine of the existing LTP and provide feedback to officers by the end of September 2026.

BACKGROUND

Under section 93 of the LGA 2002 a local authority must at all times have an LTP. The purpose of the LTP for local government is to:

- Describe the activities of the local authority.
- Outline the community outcomes for the district.
- Provide integrated decision-making and coordination of resources for South Wairarapa.
- Establish a long-term focus for the decisions and activities of the district.
- Ensure accountability of the local authority to the community.

SWDC provides a range of services and facilities for South Wairarapa communities that help make the district a safe, healthy and enjoyable place to call home. These services are grouped into Significant Activities in the LTP and include roading and parking, civil deference, regulatory services, parks and reserves, libraries, swimming pools, and customer services.

The scope and cost of each Significant Activity are determined through levels of service. These levels of service reflect what is important to deliver to the community. The quantity and quality of each level of service affect the overall cost over the 10-year period of the LTP; generally the higher the level of service, the higher the cost.

Timeline

For every Long-Term Plan, SWDC must prepare a Consultation Document to summarise our plans and proposals for the duration of the LTP and what the financial implications are. Public consultation guides decision-making. Council uses feedback to gauge support from the community and to highlight any issues or options that may not have been fully explored when preparing the proposals.

By January 2027 SWDC will need to have the LTP 2027-37 consultation document and supporting information ready for Audit New Zealand. A review by audit of the consultation document and supporting information is required under legislation (section 94 of the LGA 2002) and the report from the Auditor-General must be included in the LTP.

Following the Audit NZ review, Council will consider approving the consultation document and supporting information. Once approved, SWDC will consult with the community on the key decision and choices facing the district over the next 10 years.

Consultation is currently scheduled for March 2027. The consultation period must run for at least one month and include hearings and deliberations.

Under section 93B of the LGA 2002 the purpose of the consultation document is to provide an effective basis for public participation in local authority decision-making processes relating to the content of a long-term plan through:

- providing a fair representation of the matters that are proposed for inclusion in the long-term plan and presenting these in a way that:
 - explains the overall objectives of the proposals, and how rates, debts, and levels of service might be affected; and
 - can be readily understood by interested or affected people; and
- identifying and explaining to the people of the district or region, significant and other important issues and choices facing the local authority and district, and the consequences of those choices; and
- information discussion between the local authority and its communities about the matters in paragraphs (a) and (b).

Following deliberations Council will adopt the LTP at the end of June before the new financial year on 1 July 2027.

DISCUSSION

Given the Māori Partnership Committees ability to advocating for their community, officers recommend that the Māori Partnership Committee prepare and submit a submission on the Long-Term Plan through the formal consultation process scheduled for March 2027.

The Committee's submission may reflect community views on the consultation questions, drawing on feedback and insights gathered locally. This will ensure feedback from mana whenua and hapū are considered as part of the development of the next LTP.

Between now and end of September 2026, the Māori Partnership Committee is also encouraged to review the commitments and projects currently planned for Years 4 to 9 of the existing LTP. This review should consider whether those initiatives continue to reflect the needs and priorities of the community and remain appropriate investment for the future.

COMPLIANCE SCHEDULE

Full consideration has been given to the provisions of the Local Government Act 2002 S77 in relation to decision making, in particular:

1. A Local authority must, in the course of the decision-making process,
 - a) Seek to identify all reasonably practicable options for the achievement of the objective of a decision; and
 - b) Assess the options in terms of their advantages and disadvantages; and
 - c) If any of the options identified under paragraph (a) involves a significant decision in relation to land or a body of water, take into account the relationship of Māori and their culture and traditions with their ancestral land, water sites, wāhi tapu, valued flora and fauna and other taonga.
2. This section is subject to Section 79 - Compliance with procedures in relation to decisions.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to inform members of the Māori Partnership Committee of their delegated budgets and provide an overview of the current financial position.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The income and expenditure report is to period ending 31 July 2027. The committee has four budgets, including grant funding, operational expenditure, an allocation for training purposes, and a budget for the development of the Strategic Māori Framework.

RECOMMENDATIONS

That the Māori Partnership Committee receive the Income and Expenditure Report.

BACKGROUND

The update is supplied to the community to ensure clear and transparent use of South Wairarapa District Council funds. Funds are used to support the ordinary operation of the committee and provide grant funding to the community, through their delegated authority.

Refer to the Terms of Reference for South Wairarapa District Council committees for guidelines of financial and non financial delegations.

DISCUSSION

Operational expenditure

This funding is for the committee's operational expenses. Kai for meetings or committee led initiatives, stationery and incidentals, and any costs associated with workshops and community meetings or consultation.

Māori Partnership Committee Funding

The Māori Partnership Committee Funding enables the Committee to consider funding applications within its delegated authority, with funding prioritised for initiatives that demonstrate alignment with one or more of the Fund's four pou.

The next funding round for the grants that are administered by the Committee, is set to open on 17 September and close on 25 October 2026. Decisions on funding will be made at the board's meeting on 17 November 2026.

The amount available in the total funding pool for the Financial Year 2026-2027 is \$20,440.

Applications should be aligned with the Council's [Grants Policy](#) and with one or more of the committee's four pou – Tautoko, Te Taiao, Whakapapa and Marae Wawata.

The four Pou of Māori Partnership Committee	
Tautoko	Supports individuals or groups whose activities demonstrate manaakitanga and whanaungatanga.
Te Taiao	Supports individuals or groups whose activities enhance and protect the natural environment (te taiao) and demonstrate kaitiakitanga.
Whakapapa	Supports individuals or groups whose projects honour and preserve the histories of whānau and South Wairarapa, while demonstrating whanaungatanga.
Marae Wawata	Supports the aspirations of marae and their people through activities that demonstrate manaakitanga, whanaungatanga, and tino rangatiratanga.

The four pou are underpinned by kaupapa Māori values of manaakitanga, whanaungatanga, kaitiakitanga, and tino rangatiratanga which inform decision-making and funding criteria.

A workshop is planned for the Committee's October forum to develop and implement a bespoke grants assessment matrix. A grants matrix provides documented rationale for funding decisions, demonstrating alignment with policy, community investment principles and the Committee's Pou.

The Māori Partnership Committee Grants Matrix will provide a consistent framework for evaluating grant and funding applications against one or more of the Committee's four Pou: Tautoko, Te Taiao, Whakapapa, and Marae Wawata.

By establishing clear assessment criteria, simple scoring methodology and structured discussion points, the matrix will support consistency across assessments and strengthen decision-making whilst providing clear and effective investment in Māori-led initiatives and community outcomes.

12.1 CHAIRPERSON'S UPDATE

PURPOSE

To provide members of the Māori Partnerships Committee with an update on key strategic, cultural and governance matters relevant to South Wairarapa District Council's engagement with Māori.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report provides the Chairperson's update to the Māori Partnership Committee, outlining key activities and matters of interest since the previous meeting, including a updates and discussion on the Strategic Māori Framework, Te Rata Road Report, Collaboration with the Martinborough Community Board and Relief to Marae Operating Expenses.

This report supports informed discussion, enables members to seek clarification, and strengthens shared understanding to guide effective partnership and decision-making. The Chair will lead the discussion of kaupapa of significance and invite the Pou Māori or other Members to speak to topics as required.

RECOMMENDATIONS

That the Māori Partnership Committee receive the Chairperson's Update Report.

BACKGROUND

The information in this report provides an update to the Committee's ongoing work in supporting and guiding Council decision-making, particularly on matters where a Māori perspective is required. It serves as a key advisory body to Council, providing advice on issues affecting Māori and contributing to the development and review of Council policies, strategies and initiatives. The Committee also helps strengthen relationships between Council, Mana Whenua and the wider Māori community, ensuring Māori values, aspirations and perspectives are considered in Council processes and decision-making.

DISCUSSION

Kaupapa of significance include

- Update on Strategic Framework
- Update on Te Rata Road Report

- Update on Collaboration with Martinborough Community Board
- Relief to Marae Operating Expenses

Strategic Māori Framework Development

The Strategic Māori Framework has been identified as a fundamental building block for future engagement between hapū/iwi and a governing local body, especially in light of future amalgamation.

SLT has completed a Te Tiriti o Waitangi Responsiveness Assessment with Hononga Consultants. Following this process, a report outlining findings and recommendations was prepared for the Strategic Leadership Team. The assessment identified a number of organisational gaps, particularly in terms of making sure we embed accountability to Te Tiriti into foundational council documents, operational delivery, cultural capability, and the need for a clear line of sight across all Council responsibilities arising from Te Tiriti o Waitangi. Importantly, the findings highlighted that Council has significant foundational work to undertake internally before embarking on the development of a Strategic Māori Framework in partnership with tangata whenua.

The Committee would like to see two lines of development occurring congruently;

- 1) a capability plan for Council as informed by the recommendations of Hononga Consulting.
- 2) a facilitated workshop for the Committee to explore mana whenua aspirations and priorities for the district, as informed by the recommendations of Hononga Consulting.

The Committee propose to write their own strategic framework which would be firmly grounded in mātauranga Māori and the voice of hapū. Date for the workshop to be confirmed.

Update on Flood Management Activities on Roads and its Effects on Te Taiao

Members are acknowledged for their work in preparing a report and for their advocacy on the issues of Te Rata Road and impact to Tūranganui River.

Dear Gillies,

Thank you for the response to our letter regarding the relationship between the Community Board and the Maori Partnership Committee. We welcome the opportunity to seek your advice and guidance in relation to the following matters.

Restoration of Wairarapa Moana

The Community Board looks forward to attending one of your practical restoration or replanting activities. We think probably later in the year when the weather has warmed up a bit.

Considine Park

With regard to Considine Park we would be happy for you to put forward a suitable tangata whenua representative. We have begun the process of developing a new plan for Considine Park. The last plan was developed in 2014 and has been completed. The Considine Park User Group has consulted with the community at the Drop-in sessions held over the last week of July and is currently consulting with the school, kindergarten and early childcare centres in Martinborough. We hope to formulate a plan that will meet the needs and aspirations of our community as a whole. We would like Considine Park to become a valued, highly interactive community asset that invites participation from all ages and interests.

We will have to present a proposal to the Council for their long-term plan at the end of this month. I would like to meet with your representative as soon as we can organise it.

Martinborough Multi Use Trails – cycling, walking and horse riding.

Another issue that we are working on at the moment is the development of a connecting walking, cycling and horse riding trail from the East/West access bridge into Martinborough and from Martinborough to Greytown and Featherston. The aim is for the trails to be off road so that they can be considered in the future as one of the Great Rides of NZ. We would like to discuss this proposal with you. What would be the issues that you feel we should take into account? There are many opportunities if this project is successful for the development of a wide range of tourism opportunities. What kind of relationship would be beneficial?

It would be helpful after we have had a chance to discuss this if your committee were able to formally support the project as we work alongside the Greater Wellington Regional Council, our Council, landowners and other interested parties.

Community Energy Network

We are investigating the possibility of a community energy network project. It would involve a range of options but possibly include a solar farm proposal that would supply electricity to the Martinborough urban area at peak times at a manageable price. There is a long way to go before this can be firmed up. We know that Hau Ariki marae has invested in solar for emergency resilience and we would like to discuss with you how this proposal might relate to your current provision.

Do you think it would be appropriate for me to meet with you, in the first instance, to talk through the areas of interest to create a way forward? I look forward to your response.
