5.1 COMMUNITY AND YOUTH GRANT REPORT

PURPOSE

To inform *councillors/members* of the applications to the Community and Youth Grant Fund.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- There have been 26 applications totalling \$249,289 who have applied to the Community and Youth Grant Fund, with an average request of \$10,549.
- Of the 26 applications 77% are Community specific and 23% Youth specific.
- Of the 26 applications 50% cover the South Wairarapa District, 20% are based in Featherston, 15% are based in Greytown, 11% are based in Martinborough, with 4% based in our coastal area.

BACKGROUND

The South Wairarapa District Council's 2024-25 Enhanced Annual Plan sets the funding available for community support through grants. Through our funding we support project and activities. By providing direct financial assistance, SWDC can support shared objectives, be a catalyst for positive change, deliver value for money to ratepayers, and help to sustain a thriving and independent community sector.

The Community and Youth Grant is allocated through the Enhanced Annual Plan process to a total of \$120,000 for 2024-25.

The Grants Policy describes Social, Environmental, Economic and Cultural community outcomes as principles required to assess grant applications.

DISCUSSION

Grants Policy

Council's policy seeks to support and resource initiatives that meet identified community needs, which contribute to community empowerment and strengthen communities. The Community and Youth Grants primarily for the benefit of the district's residents. The Policy sets out the eligibility and outcomes Council considers when allocating grant funding.

Funding outcomes

Grants will be allocated to organisations which contribute to the community in at least one of the following six areas. The funding categories are aligned to the community outcomes as outlined in the Long-Term Plan (LTP).

Our Community Outcomes	
Social wellbeing <i>Oranga Hauora</i>	Residents are active, healthy, safe, resilient, optimistic and connected
Environmental wellbeing <i>Oranga Taiao</i>	Sustainable living, safe and secure water and soils, waste minimised, biodiversity enhanced
Economic wellbeing <i>Oranga Ōhanga</i>	A place of destination, new business and diverse employment that gives people independence and opportunity
Cultural wellbeing <i>Oranga Ahurea</i>	Strong relationships with iwi, hapū and whānau, celebrating diverse cultural identity, arts and heritage

The activities must benefit the South Wairarapa district, or, at the discretion of the Council, the Wairarapa region. Regional funding will be considered on a per capita basis and must show a tangible direct or indirect benefit to South Wairarapa.

Eligibility

As per the Grants Policy applicants need to meet the following eligibility criteria:

Community organisations, marae committees, an individual, or a group of individuals who have come together for a common purpose to benefit the South Wairarapa can apply, except:

- to fund activities seeking to promote commercial, political or religious objectives.
- for costs associated with fundraising events where profits or proceeds are redistributed to other organisations or individuals.
- from organisations which have not completed the funding outcomes report for previous grant funding.

Community organisations, marae committees, an individual, or a group of individuals who have come together for a common purpose to benefit the South Wairarapa and who meet the eligibility criteria outlined above, may also be eligible for:

- A concession of up to 50% of the cost or a charge for hire or similar fee payable for the short-term use of a Council owned facility.

- A venue hire concession will only be available once per financial year for each applicant

Project funding is for the purpose of delivering a project and does not include operational costs. Recipients will be required to return an Accountability Report from previous grant allocations prior to receiving further funding. A set of annual accounts including notes and review/audit report (for applications over \$1,500).

The food parcel is just one aspect as hunger does not come alone- many issues are being faced by families who go without this most basic necessity. Elaine and her team notice, draw out, comfort, that people with respect, and signpost to further support. This grassroots welcome is not formal, it is just borne from a drive to be of service to people at rock bottom, some of whom are burdened with shame, disability, addiction, abusive situations, homelessness and mental health issues, and who may veer away from formal services for whatever reason.</p> <p>If SWDC can contribute a quarter of the salary for the Foodbank manager, it allows the rest of our fundraising to focus on food and equipment. The demand for food has grown and we do want to focus on building food resilience in our neighbourhood, and that will be something we plan for next year.
