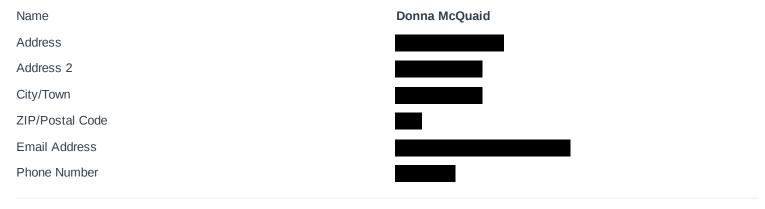

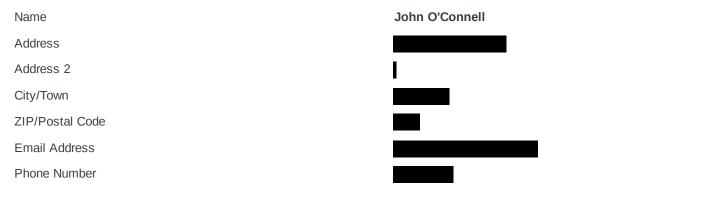

To guote the Mayor October 10, 2022 "And something like a 28 per cent rates increase is just killing, particularly on top of other costs which the council is not responsible for, like petrol." (Wairarapa Times Age). The Mayor was referring to the previous 29% increase in rates of 2020/21. In his policy statement in 2022, when seeking support from voters, he stated his #1 priority: 'Deal with the rates fiasco of the past year'. In asking the Mayor in May this year to clarify this the response was the fiasco was the communication. Do the Councillors see similarities in the 2023 consultation document stating in bold on Page 2 "As a result, for the 2023/24 year, Council is proposing a 15.9% increase, or an additional \$3,376,671 on, the 2022/23 total rates income" but buried on page 11 the true impact for Rural Ratepayers as 29%? By the Mayor's own definition, the Councillors are overseeing another fiasco. Perhaps for transparency the Council should be firstly stating its 2023/24 budget principles; that it, that they are promoting a policy shift to introduce a stronger user pays approach to service provision. This is what the Council should be consulting on policy. Once accepted, decisions will flow from this policy position. Rural roads are universally used by all rate payers. Urban rate payers do actually leave the urban boundaries of the three towns. The use of the roads is not unique to the resident who resides on it - unlike water services to a house, which has a unique and direct benefit only to that resident. The largest users of Woodside Road are urban commuters travelling to the train station. To levy one group of rate payers for a benefit ALL rate payers use is a slippery slope.

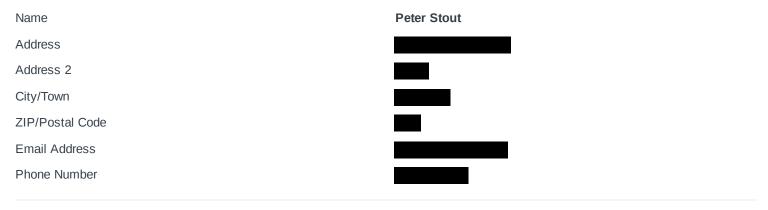

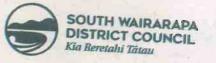

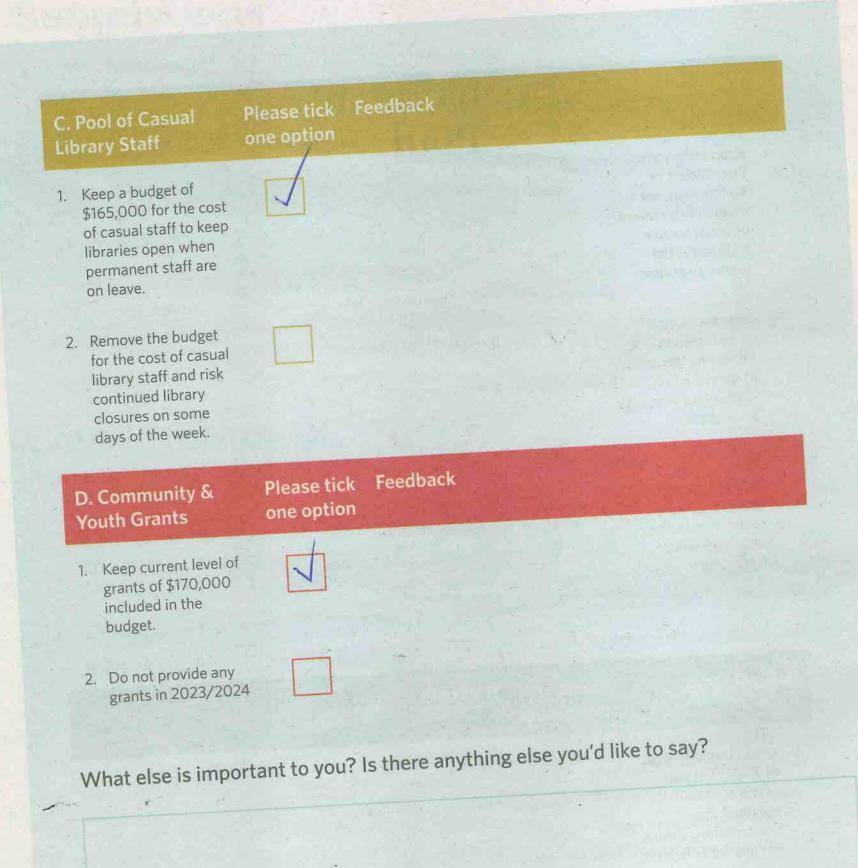

#### Submission to SWDC from Joy Cooper,

Firstly, the council are to be congratulated on providing a clear, easy to read, and well laid out consultation document and a clear response process.

While appreciating there are no easy options, I believe council's desire to ensure rates increases are kept as low as possible has weighed too heavily in council's current proposals and insufficient weight given to potential long-term impacts, and the effects of these decisions on the local business economy.

South Wairarapa has been experiencing exceptional population growth for the last few years and this looks set to continue, particularly as city house prices become less affordable and rail transport improves in the near future. The covid lockdowns demonstrated the longer-term feasibility of working from home, for at least part of the week. This has led to a surge in the numbers of permanent residents and those seeking to relocate here. Each of our three towns are significantly busier on weekdays than they used to be.

Since the Consultation document was published further information about our water infrastructure needs has come to light, regarding the long-neglected desludging of Martinborough's sewage systems. This is in no way the fault of the current council, but must be attended to with all speed. The current ban on consents for any new connections (while understandable) is completely unacceptable.

#### Loans finance must be sought

The bar chart on page 7 showing where council gets its money from does not show any borrowing. (and neither does the chart below – what our income is spent on - show any interest payments). It appears that borrowing is not a significant part of this council's financial management strategy at present.

In our current situation (rapidly failing and non-compliant infrastructure, resulting in blanket restrictions on development) the prospect of substantial borrowing to invest in the infrastructure improvements that are required so urgently MUST be considered. I understand councils have access to loan finance at very competitive rates. Certainly, borrowing must be paid for, and this will be mostly via rates, but borrowing to invest in infrastructure has to be good for us. It will enable further development which will grow the rating base and numbers of rate payers – both business and domestic.

The current moratorium on building consent approvals is shocking and very short sighted. It damages the livelihoods of many local businesses and tradespeople. I urge the council to move to end this as soon as possible, by attending to infrastructure deficits with all speed, financed as far as possible, by loans and bonds. This has to be council's number one priority.

"Debt is an effective and appropriate way for councils to spread the burden of capital expenditure across generations, so that the people who benefit from infrastructure investments now and in the future contribute to meeting the cost. Spreading the costs in this way is fair. The Local Government Funding Agency raises debt on behalf of member councils and is the largest lender to local government. Councils may also borrow from banks and other financial institutions, and issue bonds."

Productivity Commission Report, 2019: Local Government funding and Financing; Overview, page 2.

#### 'Better Off' Funding

We are told \$1.88m is available to SWDC and that recommendations regarding use of this will be taken to council in June. This timing is unfortunate at the very least. Surely this "Three Waters" money should be prioritized for expenditure on our most urgent water infrastructure needs? There is no more 'prudent investment' for this fund.

#### A. Water Budget options

Option 3 is the only supportable option.

Option 1 risks our citizens' health and prosecution for the council. Would councillors really want to tell the court that they prioritized a balanced budget over health, welfare and legal requirements?

Option 2 is little better than option 1.

Option 3 has to be the preferred option. It is the only one recommended by Wellington Water, and it does include some allowance for de-sludging which is a district wide need, although most urgent in Martinborough. Option 3 costs \$3.96m more than Option 1, but what are the flow on costs to future years of not choosing option 3? What will council do in the remaining two years of its triennium?

The risks table on page 14 of the consultation document outlines the water system and compliance risks but ignores the wider economic and reputational risks facing the district.

#### Finding an extra \$4.96m to fund option 3:

As stated previously, \$1.88m, all (or as much as possible) of the 'Better Off' funding, should be allocated to funding option 3. The remaining shortfall should be financed by borrowing.

#### B. Rural Roading Reserve Options

I support Council's proposal to maintain this at the current contribution level. This and the other proposed levels of funding would each be totally inadequate in the event of one or more major events such an earthquake or major cyclone.

#### C. Pool of Casual Library Staff

I support \$165,000 being budgeted for a library staff casual pool. Some of our most needy citizens rely on libraries for a wide rage of services.

#### D. Community and Youth Grants

I suggest this fund be suspended for one year. The fund is small relative to the number of organisations supported (40 in 21/22) and the allocation process is heavy on councillors' and staff time. A one-year moratorium would encourage those community organisations that have come to rely on council grants to seek alternative means of support. That said, there are some which fulfill an important social need (eg Foodbanks). Perhaps councillors could look critically at the list of grant recipients and limit applications to those that meet much more stringent criteria for providing 'social good' for our most needy local residents. Could some, or all of the \$170k budgeted be used to provide rates relief for our local charitable organisations?

#### INTRODUCTION

1

The Wairarapa Province of Federated Farmers (FFNZ) welcomes this chance to submit on the South Wairarapa District Council (SWDC) Draft Annual Plan 2023-2024. We acknowledge any submissions made by individual members of Federated Farmers.

Federated Farmers is focused on the transparency of rate setting, rating equity, levels of service for key responsibilities and both the overall and relative cost of local government to agriculture. We submit on Annual Plans and Long-Term Plans through-out New Zealand; and have actively submitted on previous SWDC Annual and Longterm Plans.

#### PROPOSED RATE INCREASES

FFNZ record concern that – against the LTP forecast of an average 3% rates increase in the coming year – Council now propose nearly 30% increase for rural ratepayers; and that this very significant increase is 3 times the 10% increase proposed for urban ratepayers.

The reasons for these dramatic - and disproportionate – increases are not clear in the Consultation document. In that document, page 6 sets out the matters causing the proposed \$5 million increase:

- Half the proposed increase (\$2.5m approx) is accounted for by *inflation*, depreciation, insurance and interest rates. FFNZ acknowledge these factors are driven by external pressures. At face value, however, we would anticipate that these increases would be approximately equally spread across rural and urban ratepayers
- Half the proposed increase (\$2.5m approx) is accounted for by *resourcing council, information technology and other costs.* Again, at face value, we would anticipate that these increases would be approximately equally spread across rural and urban ratepayers. More importantly, these proposed increases are over and above inflationary pressures and are of such a magnitude that we suggest they should be proposed and properly debated in next years Long Term Plan process.

FFNZ emphasise that farm incomes are exceedingly unlikely to be increasing by 30% in the coming year to sustain rates increases of this magnitude. Instead, Beef & Lamb NZ recently announced farm profit before tax for sheep and beef farmers is expected to fall by a third in the 2023 year following reduction in exports<sup>1</sup>. For dairy, Fonterra has recently announced a further fall in farmgate price/kg of milk solids, which have continued to decline over the last 12 months<sup>2</sup>. These factors point to harder times ahead for the rural rate paying community in South Wairarapa District; and the implication that the proposed rates increases would squeeze out other areas of farm expenditure and reinvestment in farm operations.

New regulatory requirements on the horizon will further diminish economic opportunities for these landowners, including prohibition on subdivision of land containing highly productive soils (Land Use Class I, II or III). This underscores increasingly limited farmer options to realise income from farm properties, other than by farming; and re-confirms that the ability of farmers to pay rates is tied to their ability to productively farm the land for income, rather than in the valuation of that land.

In this context, FFNZ invite Council clarification of the reasons for proposing increases well above the rate of inflation, and disproportionately weighted to the rural sector. Pending that clarification, **FFNZ recommend**:

• Proposed rate increases be restricted to matters outside Council control (eg, inflation), and that other proposed increases be deferred for full consideration in next years Long Term Plan

#### RATING IMPACT ANALYSIS

FFNZ commend Council on presenting (page 10-11) examples of rating impact disaggregated by sector; and we specifically commend the dis-aggregation of the broad "rural" category to show example properties as *lifestyle, pastoral, horticulture, dairy*; and disaggregated again to show the impact on *low/median/high* land value properties. This analysis is very helpful (and a model for other councils to follow).

**FFNZ recommend** that this analysis would be greatly strengthened if Council could also show the following information (ideally in table format):

- Ratepayer category, eg, urban resident, business, lifestyle, farming
- Number of rating units: and
- Rates contribution, eg, UAGC, general, targetted

#### **REVENUE & FINANCING POLICY REVIEW**

FFNZ commend Council on commissioning a "first principles" review of rating policies. We understand this review is underway, and that it will take effect next year alongside consultation on the next Long Term Plan.

We emphasise the critical importance of a rigorous process and transparent community consultation before concluding that review. Council will of course be aware of the requirements of the Local Government (Rating) Act to provide for processes and information to ensure ratepayers can identify and understand their liability for rates; and to ensure rates reflect decisions made in a transparent and consultative manner. Council may also be aware of the Productivity Commission report (2019) into local government funding which recommended (inter alia) that "Council decision-making needs to be more visible to stakeholders...this includes information about how councils are allocating rates across different ratepayer groups".

In respect of funding tools available to Council, we reiterate key points made in previous submissions to Council, including:

- **UAGC**: we commend Council on making good use of UAGC and reiterate our position that it be used to the maximum allowable (30%) for services which benefit the population at large
- General or targetted rates and use of differentials: this first principles review is an excellent opportunity to test the effect of alternate rating scenarios, including in respect of matters raised in earlier FFNZ submissions (eg, urban pavements, forestry roading differentials, farm dogs)

• **Property valuation**: SWDC is unusual in relying on land value as the basis for apportioning rates. We anticipate that Council will test alternate options, eg, capital value; and we emphasise again that property valuations cannot be assumed as equivalent to income and ability to pay.

More broadly, we understand Masterton and Carterton are also commencing reviews of their rating policies, and we encourage collaboration across our local councils to help streamline these important reviews. We specifically encourage Council to give attention to matters which are relevant across the Wairarapa as a whole, including:

- The extent to which the rural roading network could be considered a district network asset, and consequential options for funding maintenance and upgrades. We acknowledge the early history of rural roads, but suggest that in this modern age, the importance of the road network is considerably wider than rural landowners
- The extent to which carbon valuations on hill country farms could artificially inflate farm values, potentially with significant detrimental financial impacts on those farms

In respect of any and all scenarios tested as part of the rating policy review, FFNZ emphasise again that information should be presented to the community showing rating contributions, not just by individual property, but by sectors (as outlined above).

#### CONCLUSION

FFNZ acknowledge the difficult task of Council navigating the challenges of inflationary pressures, service improvements and regulatory requirements; alongside relatively restricted funding mechanisms and a small population.

Alongside that, we emphasise that the farming sector is a very small subset of that (small) population; that land value is not equivalent to income; and that - under current rating policies – our perception is that the farming sector contributes over and above.

In this context, we commend Councils intent to complete a first principles review of rating policies; we recommend a robust community process; and we would welcome an opportunity to contribute to analysis of scenarios by sector and group.

#### SUBMISSION TO SWDC ON ANNUAL PLAN 23/24

#### FROM BEN AND GEORGINA LUTYENS,

#### 1. Rates Review; fairness.

- As a rate payer on a farm 45kms from Martinborough the only service provided by the District Council is the maintenance and upkeep of the road. To provide this sole service we don't need a Mayor, Councillors, District Council offices or any of the expenses associated with them.
- As a farmer and land owner in the South Wairarapa we currently pay rates based on Land Value. Land value has climbed and climbed even though the productivity of the land here has decreased. Rates have become a straight tax on land ownership with no connection to the income or profits that can be made from the land. Much of the land is bush covered or gravel river bed with no potential to generate income.
- If Rates were levied on capital value then land owners and farmers may have their rates reduced while other rate payers may have their rates increased, but farmers and landowners would still be paying a disproportionately unfair amount for the benefit received.
- Farmers need the road for their business to function. But so do other businesses, for instance fishermen who need the road even more than farmers so that they can access the coast and promptly transport fish to town while possibly not paying any rates any where at all.
- Farmers also need the road for emergency services and household needs but so does every house holder anywhere.
- Historically the only users of rural roads were farm related. This has now completely changed so that farm related road use is very much in a minority.
- Roads that go through and past our farms have now become dangerous places for us.
- These are hard times for farmers and they will get harder.
- Give farmers a break for a change! Farmers' rates need to dramatically reduce.

#### 2. White Rock Road

• In the 38 years we have been living at White Rock and then Riversdale Stations the condition of the White Rock Road south of Tuturumuri has without doubt generally deteriorated. The water table and culverts are no longer frequently serviced, the road is only occasionally graveled and the few places that have always caused problems, like Ussher's Hill are still causing problems. The areas that flood regularly around Tuturumuri still flood and cut us off. On Riversdale Station where the river now runs down the road during a flood and the road is then reinstated there is no consideration that the next time the river floods will have exactly the same result making the road

impassable. Trees have grown and fall across the road, which we clear away. Gorse and other weeds are rampant, often blocking visibility. There have been no improvements. The Regional Council have totally failed to limit the vast quantities of gravel entering our river systems causing the rivers beds to rise. Our rates have spectacularly increased and we get less for them. The production from the land has majorly decreased, we have become minority road users and yet we pay more and more for less and less.

- From attending the recent meeting of rate payers and Councillors at Tuturumuri Hall it came across that there is an arrogance from some Councillors towards rate payers. The message from rate payers was uniformly that we see what we consider inefficiencies, wastefulness and an inadequate service. And that certain members of the council would not be doing their job unless this is satisfactorily addressed before any consideration of increasing rates. For many these are hard time financially. Only 2 years ago we had an unjustified rate rise of 28%. This put our rates up by over \$7000. A further 29% would be a further \$10,000 and see our rates almost double in 2 years.
- There were a number of suggestions concerning the use of local contractors and local input to assist the council in delivering a better service. These need to be looked into.
- With regard to the Rural Road Reserve; in my opinion firstly this should not be paid solely by rural people who are minority users of the road and secondly that there should be no reserve and that the necessary funds should be taken as needed from other less important council services.
- Roading is an existential issue. Central and Local Government need to realise this.

Have had a lot to do with roading over the years, and certainly seen what works and what does not, and what is the best value for money. Below is my opinion on what should be adopted in this area to improve the roading network and reduce costing: Over the years our business has done guite a bit of roading and a good portion of that has been for SWDC in the past, so have certainly seen the problems and what caused them, and what was done to remedy them. The same problems are still evident, but what has changed is how the Council have chosen to respond to them. In most cases, not respond. The major issue that causes road failures is drainage and how it is directed; the road failures, dropouts etc which can be related back to blocked water-tables or culverts (ie lack of maintenance and monitoring). Ponatahi Road is a good example. This was brought to Council's attention on several occasions, me being one of those people. In the past, the Council employed a Contractor with a dedicated machine set up to do the water-tables on an annual basis, so road failures were very minimal as a result of this. It was always done prior to winter and after the roads were metalled and graded, as often the grading pushed metal into the water-tables. This is not just my opinion, speak to any long-standing farmer or contractor. Secondly, I think Council could save a considerable amount in their roading budget if they went back to extracting metal out of rivers themselves, at sites where continuous work has been identified in the past. They did it out of the Haungaroa, Disburys, Tuturumuri and Hinakura. This also alleviated a lot of the flooding issues, especially in areas like Tuturumuri. It is easily implemented, would reduce costs, cartage and allow work to be done in time efficient manner. Last of all, stopping sewer connections, as this brings Council a considerable revenue, I think different avenues should be looked at ie. allowing septic tanks to be installed and make water tanks compulsory on new builds. The sewer problem is not a new one, it has been kicked down the street for many years. In the early 1990s we were the Contractors in the development of Cottage Grove, now known as Pinot Grove. The developer, back then, was made to contribute a substantial amount towards the sewer and water upgrade, as the number of houses that were planned to be built would put significant strain on the systems in place. That was then, so where did that money go? Keeping in mind also that the number of bounces in Dinet Crows is were more than was
