Community Wellbeing Fund 'Summary of Applications' Report'

Recommendations

Officers recommend that the CWBF Subcommittee:

- 1. Receive the 'CWBF Subcommittee Summary of Applications report.
- 2. Approve an allocation of grant funding to applicants that successfully meet the fund criteria and one of more of Council's four wellbeing outcomes.

Background

In August 2022 Council approved entering into a funding agreement between DIA and SWDC for Three waters Reform – Better Off package (Tranche 1 Funding) of \$1.88m. Last year, the proposal to fund a Community Well Being Fund was accepted and the agreement signed.

On May 29th the Community Well Being Fund Subcommittee agreed to a meeting schedule where applications are submitted for review and consideration. The first, 24 July, then 4 September and the final meeting for the year 27, November.

A total of \$500,000 remains for grant funding allocation.

Strategy Working Committee approved (SWC2024/41):

- A total grant pool of \$500,000 to be used for the Community Wellbeing Fund.
- Expenditure for marketing and promotions will come from this total.

Grant distributions and Subcommittee expenditure must be made by resolution at a formal meeting.

Discussion

It is evident that there are several community projects in our district that were paused due to either COVID or economic shifts that caused cost increases to the supply chain. Some of the projects, initiatives and activities the Subcommittee will assess include projects that have been well endorsed by their local community and almost at completion.

The investment in our region for community groups in terms of grants funding may be limited but the passion and commitment of the individuals that come together to deliver initiatives in our communities is not.

When considering the allocation of grants it is important for the Subcommittee to assess each application on its own merit under the eligibility, criteria and wellbeing outcomes provided.

Eligibility and Criteria

As per the CWBF Criteria Report: The Community Wellbeing Fund will benefit a range of community-based projects, this is a fund that individuals can apply to as well as:

- ·Community groups
- ·Marae and Hapori
- ·Primary/Intermediate schools/kura
- ·Secondary schools/Wharekura
- ·Tertiary education providers/Whare Wānanga
- ·Charitable trusts
- ·Incorporated societies

The focus of the fund will be on the South Wairarapa District, however, initiatives that were outside of this locale that have measurable benefit to our communities may be considered at the CWBF Subcommittee's discretion.

To be eligible projects, initiatives or activities must meet one of the following criteria:

- a) Supporting communities to transition to a sustainable & low emissions economy.
- b) Delivery of initiatives that support improvements in community wellbeing.

Applicants must include one or more of the following wellbeing outcomes: Social, economic, cultural and/or environmental.

Applications received

There is currently \$500,000 in the fund and \$361,918 worth of grant applications to be considered at this meeting.

Ten applications were received in the July 2024 funding round. The majority of these have fallen under criteria b, and are focused around capital enhancements and events.

This leaves gaps in impact funding for criteria a and should be considered in future communications to the community to open up the diversification of the CWBF fund allocation.

It is also noted that this is the first round, and these types of projects need timely planning and development.

In terms of allocations across the locale it is noted that there are four applications from the Greytown area, one from the Featherston area, two from the Martinborough area and one from the Carterton area (the organisation services South Wairarapa). There is one application for the district and another from a national body.

Summary of Applications

DIA responsibilities

The 6 monthly reporting requirements have been encompassed into the drawdowns.

This reporting includes claims and invoices, milestones, projects status, health and safety, risks, forecast and wellbeing outcomes.

It is required that the Council spend the 10% pre allocated in the Community Wellbeing Fund before another drawdown.

Future Allocations

This is the first of three tabled funding allocation meetings for the 2024/25 year.

Detail: Outward Bound is seeking support from South Wairarapa District Council to provide scholarships to enable young students from the Wairarapa region to unlock their true potential by attending the "Korowai" 2024. The course will take place from 24 September to 14 October 2024. We work in partnership with our Wairarapa partner schools to design a course that is relevant, engaging and responds to the opportunities and challenges identified by teachers from your region.	Outcomes: Improving the wellbeing of young people is at the heart of what Outward Bound does. Our courses are designed to equip young people with the skills to face the challenges of life, the ability to set and achieve goals, the confidence to embrace opportunities, and the compassion to be of service in their community. Outward Bound gives young people the valuable opportunity to develop their own personal toolbox to guide them through life.	Measures: PEQ assessment We measure the outcomes of our courses using an internationally recognised Personal Effectiveness Questionnaire (PEQ) tool that compares the students' scores on Day 1 and Day 21 of the course. Additional measures: Quality control, feedback surveys, course reports, thank you letters.			

Summary: Korowai is a course designed specifically for young people in the Wairarapa who would otherwise not have the opportunity to attend an Outward Bound course. Rangatahi in Aotearoa New Zealand are facing significant issues that are affecting their ability to thrive and achieve. The number of 15 – 24 year-olds experiencing extreme psychological distress has jumped from 5%to 19% in 10 years. We have the highest rate of bullying in the OECD. Only 7% of our young people get enough physical activity in their day. School attendance is declining especially in lower-decile schools. Young people are experiencing significant environmental anxiety. Traditional education systems are confined to the classroom and do not set today's rangatahi up for the challenges they face. In our uncertain, changing and fast paced world, young New Zealanders don't have the space to connect with themselves, with others, and with nature

Recommendations:

This project meets CWBF criteria as it targets a particular audience, the social wellbeing outcomes can be effectively measured, and the evidence shows that this project has an immediate and long-term impact on youth.

Detail: Cobblestones is a regional museum and heritage village at 169 Main Street, Greytown. Our cultural heritage is our legacy. The 'Two Sheds' project is a multi-faceted development which delivers social, cultural, heritage and economic benefits to the Wairarapa community. Enclosing and extending the two hay sheds will provide additional space for the horse-drawn carriages currently on display in the museum exhibition hall. A new eye-catching exhibition space will then be set up at the hall entrance, dedicated to the display of Māori taonga.	Outcomes: Social, Cultural and Economic are strongly met. Our two waka tiwai are displayed in pride of place in the exhibition hall and we hope, will form part of the display we are discussing with Pāpāwai. We see that moving away from what has been a 'colonial' stance, to include our shared cultural diversity to be vital for visitors, individuals and our community to understand how our culture has developed in Wairarapa. When complete, the displays in the 'Two Sheds' hall will add to our other displays at a quality and level of interest to appeal to youngsters of all ages. We anticipate that, as has been the case over the last period of time, our visitor numbers will continue to increase, currently 7000p/a	Measures: -Increased youth engagement - Collaboration with Pāpāwai. An integral aspect of the project involves working closely with Pāpāwai Marae. The objective is to allow Pāpāwai to provide te ao Māori views of history in the Wairarapa context User stats - the development will provide multiuse spaces able to be used alongside the open landscaped areas -Ongoing surveys and visitor metrics. 'Two Sheds' is an extension and development of the museum's work which has met with popular approval since the completion of the exhibition hall ten years ago. A recent community survey gave Cobblestones an 88% approval rating.			

Summary: Cobblestones Museum has been in existence for over 50 years, having been born of a community wish to preserve the 1857 Hastwell stables. Since its inception, the museum has become a centerpiece for history. Today it's a community asset that serves a strong volunteer base, draws tourist and engages with Tamariki.

Recommendations:

This project has been well thought out, the feasibility study details the process and thinking. It is evident that this project is well endorsed by the local community based on the supporting letters attached and number of volunteers actively involved. This project meets the criteria and multiple wellbeing outcomes. In discussion with the applicant is clear the success of this project will allow a butterfly effect for the 'Pāpāwai display' and youth engagement.

Council officers recommend:

Option 1: Fully Fund

Option 2: Partial funding, consider as this is a capital project no less than 80% of the total requested.

Detail: Our goal is to enable mana whenua to uphold their mana motuhake and be able to provide for their whānau in the district including whanau, hapū and the wider community. To do so effectively as part of our long term aspirations we are seeking funding to upgrade our mattresses, bedding, cooking and food storage equipment, and equipment storage.	Outcomes: All are strongly met. Providing opportunities for all people to connect with each other in the context of Te Ao Māori uplifts their wellbeing. Providing emergency assistance to the public. Providing opportunities for our hapū, the wider community, and tourists to connect with our whenua, waterways and marae. Providing economic sustainability and employment opportunities. Providing increased engagement with our native nursery programme, to host volunteers for environmental care events, and host environmentally focused wānanga.	Measures: Increased capacity and bookings for marae stays. Increased volunteer participation in our nursery projects; training opportunities, seed propagation and collecting, growing trees to revegetate our land blocks and local farms. Strengthened partnerships with tourism providers e.g Jersey Cycle Tours. Increased ragatahi engagement ownership of their heritage by sharing it with visitors. Ability to provide support in an emergency. Some of the tools we will use and can report back on: Increased calendar bookings, visitor logbooks — with comments, photos and videos, Annual Report		

Summary: The increase in our capacity to host community will have positive impacts for the community across all the four well-beings. If successful in this grant will allow us to provide opportunities for the wider community to connect with Te Ao Māori which is beneficial for wider social wellbeing and our unique place in the world as people of Aotearoa. Kohunui Marae, have also been identified as an Emergency Assistance Centre. To enable Kohunui Marae to function as a EAC we are needing to make upgrades and enhancements to our facilities.

Recommendations:

This is a strong application; the project has been well thought out and has both short term and long term impact. The emergency management element is a vital component of this application and will allow the marae to provide services that are lacking in this part of district. The budget provides a comprehensive list that could also be successful with other funders, it is noted their maybe an opportunity to acquire funding from DIA.

Council officers recommend:

Option 1: Grant the maximum under the CWBF Subcommittee of \$49,000, await outcomes of other funding avenues and look at a second grant in following meetings

Option 2: Delegate to council for decision on full funding allocation

Option 3: Part fund; select items that the Subcommittee would like to fund specifically

Detail: In support of Mental Health Awareness Week 2024 (September 23rd to 29th), we are hosting a well-publicised celebration event aimed at encouraging and celebrating well-being journeys. This will be the second year. "Courage Dear Heart: A Celebration of Our Well-Being Journeys" is pivotal for community well-being as it reduces the stigma surrounding mental health, promotes inclusivity, and encourages positive narratives around personal growth. By featuring diverse well-being stories and providing interactive, supportive activities, the event fosters a sense of community and connection.	Outcomes: Social - the event is all about individual and community well-being, connection and creating supportive community. It strongly aims to de-stigmatise "mental health" while championing and applauding our well-being journeys. Cultural Wellbeing - Using music, storytelling, poetry, art, and dance as a means of showing/telling diverse (age, race, gender, ability, socioeconomic) wellbeing journeys. Connecting diverse groups together through creativity and shared journeys towards greater wellbeing.	Measures: To evaluate the success and impact of "Courage Dear Heart: A Celebration of Our Well-Being Journeys," we will employ a multi-faceted approach, including surveys, case studies, statistics, and event attendance. We will record the number of performers, organisers and volunteers involved for each event. We will have a feedback form asking questions such what has been helpful, what would make the event better, what people would like to see next year/in the future. We will monitor social media engagement and comments.		

By featuring diverse well-being stories and providing interactive, supportive activities, the event fosters a sense of community and connection. It also offers access to local support resources, ensuring ongoing benefits beyond the event. This celebration not only uplifts individual participants but also inspires broader community engagement and support for mental health awareness across New Zealand. An estimated 500 people are to benefit with several arts collaborators secured.

Recommendations:

This event could remove stigma and open up individual wellbeing conversations, supporting a range of people in our community. If run well this could be an event that connects art and wellbeing in a meaningful way. The project meets CWBF criteria and targets diverse audiences, the social wellbeing outcomes can be effectively measured and promoted with tangible digital assets that could have extended reach.

Council officers recommend:

Option 1: Fully fund

Option 2: Partial funding, select event costs that the Subcommittee would like to fund

Detail: We are looking to create the South Wairarapa Community Festival; an event that brings together our towns and communities as a unified whole and showcases the incredible talents, creatives, groups, activities, producers and people that make South Wairarapa what it is today. This event will have fun for the whole family and showcase community and cultural performances that enable local talent, young performers and groups etc. to share their craft with their community.	Outcomes: This project aligns with and supports social, economic and cultural wellbeing outcomes. In addition, we will work alongside SWDC to ensure the festival is environmentally sustainable and minimises waste. Social well-being: This event is primarily about connecting residents. There will be interactive events, demonstrations and physical activities that will not only be fun but give our residents an experience of what's available to participate in regularly in our communities. Economic well-being: While this event is community-driven, it will showcase and support local producers.	Measures: This event offers a rare opportunity for the South Wairarapa district collectively to get together, celebrate our communities and showcase what we have to offer. It is an event for our local community to enjoy and will provide entertainment and enjoyment for the whole family and cost is not a barrier to entry. - The number of groups, organisations, businesses and individuals participating and involved with the Festival - The satisfaction and experience of those participating and involved - Attendance numbers - Feedback from community members - Photographs from the day - Media coverage		

This event is distinct from other large scale local events because, it is community-driven, not commercially driven. It is made with the community, *for* the community – not for tourism. It brings together the whole district, in a location that is equally central to our three urban towns. It is a collaboration of Council and community.

Recommendations:

This event has the opportunity to become a well-received community-led event. As with most large events, often the 'first' is where most learnings are found. Consider a two-year seed investment to truly see the potential of this event. It is noted that most of the cost items are for the supply of commercial goods/services, once seed funding is secured the events organisers should consider negotiating with local suppliers to lessen expenses, or preparing a sponsorship model that offsets costs but provides benefit to suppliers and vendors.

Detail: With over ten years of experience, Ngahuia Wild Bird Rescue has an unwavering commitment to the welfare of wild birds. Our dedicated team has successfully rehabilitated countless birds, ensuring they are healthy and ready to return to their natural habitats. However, we are currently facing significant challenges that jeopardize our ability to continue providing this vital care. Funding Needs; Construction of a Bird Nursery and Hospital Shed, Building and Maintaining Large Aviaries, Purchasing Specialist Bird Food, Covering Veterinary Care Costs, Funding Transportation	Outcomes: Environmental Wellbeing, specifically in the areas of sustainable living, biodiversity enhancement, and waste minimization. By rescuing and rehabilitating both native and non-native bird species, we actively contribute to the preservation and enhancement of local biodiversity. Our efforts help maintain the ecological balance, ensuring that bird populations remain healthy and thriving, which is vital for a resilient ecosystem. By educating the community about the importance of protecting avian wildlife and the broader environment. We encourage responsible behaviours which directly contributes to minimizing environmental impact.	Measures: Biodiversity Enhancement: We will track the number of birds rescued, rehabilitated, and successfully released back into their natural habitats. This data will be recorded and compared year over year to monitor trends and improvements in bird populations. The applicant has noted endorsement and support from the community including DoC. By securing a shed, aviary and brooder she is able to increase her capacity and the butterfly effect of this is a DOC certification which support additional activities in this space.	

Summary: By fostering a community culture of environmental stewardship and conservation, our project supports the long-term sustainability of our natural resources and enhances the overall environmental well-being of our community.

Recommendations:

Whilst that applicant has not specified, they meet Social it is worthwhile to note the following: Looking at growth models for charities it is possible the project could engage with potential volunteers locally, empowering them to undertake activities that support the work. Can build resilience and optimism; observing birds recovering and thriving can inspire resilience in in individuals. Strengthen connections, this project brings together people with a common interest, fostering social connections and sense of community evident in the organisations Facebook page.

Council officers recommend:

Option 1: Fully fund

The Pavilion has been well endorsed by the community with an investment from council of \$1million, the building itself is secured. GSL has a strong governance structure and collaborates well with several sport clubs, this leadership will have a ripple effect amongst clubs in both their governance, community engagement and future fundraising.

Detail: Installation of a community defibrillator, to fund in partnership with Wellington free ambulance. We meet criteria B, Will enable a speedy response to a serious medical emergency. The installation will be on the junction of Eagle Place and Fairway Drive in Martinborough. It will benefit and impact residents, visitors and locals.	Outcomes: Social, installation will ensure prompt availability of a lifesaving device. Associated training will provide a number of residents the capability to provide first response with the use of the defibrillator. This is endorsed by our community, we have obtained pledges from the estate residents, any grant will reduce the individual contribution of residents. If an ambulance is called the dispatcher can call out the fire brigade who can be on site between 5 and 10 minutes with a defibrillator, with paramedics some time behind depending on where they are travelling from. However, if we have one and have residents trained we can reduce the time of intervention. A minute is a long time if someone is not breathing. Defibrillators are lifesaving pieces of equipment, it is noted that timely treatment for cardiac arrests is critical, every minute counts. Having a defib onsite can help provide immediate treatment, increasing chances of survival. Knowing that a defibrillator is close by and easily accessible can provide piece of mind to residents and their families.

Recommendations:

The installation of a defibrillator is an initiative that has been discussed across varying communities, it is commendable that this organisation has identified the need, prepared an application and has endorsement from Wellington Free Ambulance.

The proposed instal location is minutes from Martinborough town centre. Its proximity to Martinborough Golf Club and the "south side of town" makes it an accessible for several locals and visitors.
