The assumption of an enclosed pool is that it is available for use 364 days a year, and for longer opening hours each day than presently. For example, to have a pool operating 15 hours a day (6am - 9pm) for 364 days a year, the additional operating cost would be \$1,377,200 (on top of the current \$125,000) plus the additional utility costs of heating the pool for 9 months of the year. It is extremely unlikely, even with increased swimmer numbers, that these costs could be recovered from users.</p>
