Official information Request: Grant Guru

I am writing to you in response to your request received via email on 27 January for information relating to Grant Guru.

We have assessed your request under the Local Government Official Information and Meetings Act 1987 (LGOIMA). I have received information to provide the following response:

1. The total membership spent on using Grant Guru by council over the last three years broken down by year.

a. Please specify how long council has been using Grant Guru.

South Wairarapa District Council signed up with Grant Guru on 24 May 2024. We proceeded to work with Grant Guru to build the South Wairarapa Fund Finder grants portal. The portal was launched to the South Wairarapa community on 15 August. There has been no payment for 2025 as yet.

2. The total paid on advertising each year over the last three years and where this has been advertised.

Greytown drinking water consultation

In partnership with Wellington Water, South Wairarapa District Council is looking to progress with an upgrade or replacement of the water treatment facilities in Greytown. This will increase the resilience of the town's drinking water supply. As part of this consultation, the council is asking for feedback on three potential locations for the bore and how the project could be funded.



The current assets at Soldiers Memorial Park are in poor condition and require upgrading or replacement to ensure an ongoing reliable supply of safe and healthy

drinking water and to provide enough water for firefighting.

The treatment plant is located in Greytown but the funding may impact all of the district so it is important that council hears from the entire community.

Libraries open longer

Libraries in the South Wairarapa will open for more days and longer hours from Monday 30 September. Library Services Manager Louise Dowdell says the longer hours will allow all libraries run by Wairarapa Library Service (which also includes Carterton) to grow literacy services in print and digital publications. This builds on the 800+ new

members over the past year, along 119,274 items issued in print, 15,441 ebooks and 13,292 audio books issued. Libraries are free, inclusive, educational, empowering and provide a sense of belonging.

Māori ward reaffin

South Wairarapa District councillors have reaffirmed their decision to create a Māori ward for the 2025 triennium. South Wairarapa will have a binding poll on Māori wards in the 2025 elections.

"We stand beside mana whenua and have a strong desire to give Māori a voice in our district's governance now and in future," says Mayor Martin Connelly,

"The council has a legal duty to improve Māori participation in our democracy. South Wairarapa District Council paved the way years ago with the establishment of the Māori Standing Committee," says Mayor Connelly.

"This takes nothing away from anyone but provides tremendous opportunity for Māori."

Council Pou Māori Advisor Narida Hooper says when the majority of the district's councillors voted yes to establishing a Māori ward in 2023 that "Those Councillors were thinking of the future they want for their tamariki and mokopuna to grow up in. They recognise the value Māori bring to our communities, that Māori representation at local government level is a step towards a dynamic future."



Summer hours libraries & council offices

Waste not

Eating food destined for landfill, turning cocoa husks into hand scrubs and reducing medical waste were hot topics at the Wellington Region Waste Forum at the Carterton Events Centre in November

The forum takes place four times a year between the eight councils in the Wellington region. This one saw 73 people gather to discuss how the region can reduce waste and drive sustainable practices.

Speakers shared stories of waste reduction, including, among other ideas, reusing cocoa husks from a chocolate factory to make a hand scrub at Homewood Station in Masterton and a trial to reduce vape disposal.

A waste free lunch was made by chef Ant North with rescued food from Wai Waste. Attendees brought containers for leftovers so nothing was wasted. The meal was funded through the Waste Forum membership. The event underscored the role councils, businesses and communities play to shape a sustainable future.

Putting the S into sustainable communities

Grants were given to 19 projects focussing on sustainability from schools and community centres to marae and nurseries in the final round of the Community Wellbeing Fund.

The largest was \$49,000 to Hau Ariki Marae in Martinborough to support rain water collection to add strength to its role as an Emergency Assistance Centre for the community. Featherston Community and Greytown School were the second largest beneficiaries with \$33,000 each for solar power while Martinborough School was one of many to be granted \$10,000 for its Garden to Table project. The Pae tu Mokai nursery in Featherston was also granted \$10,000 to develop a potting shed, while another group was given funding for coastal restoration at Tora. This was the second and final round of grants from the Community Wellbeing Fund, which is 100% from Te Tari Taiwhenua, the Department of Internal Affairs. The total funding pool was \$500,000 and the first round were distributed in July this year.



Buses replace trains 26 December to 10 February

Trains to and from the Wairarapa will be replaced by buses for 46 days from Thursday 26 December to Monday 10 February 2025 to



upgrade the rail line through the Remutaka tunnel in preparation for faster trains and more frequent services from 2029.





Martinborough has a new tale to tell on its StoryWalk^R trail at Centennial & Considine Park. The story is That's Not a Hippopotamus by Wellington author Juliette Maclver with illustrations by Sarah Davis and it's displayed along the walking trail in rainproof story boards.

The town's StoryWalk^R trail was launched in 2022 by Wairarapa Library Service, which took its inspiration from North American Anne Ferguson, who invented StoryWalk^R in 2007, in collaboration with the Keller-Hubbard Library in Vermont.

Her aim was to promote early literacy, movement and a connection with nature. StoryWalk^R has now become an activity in many countries around the world.
