Draft Greytown Community Board Submission to the South Wairarapa District Council Plan 2022

This submission is a result of an open meeting with the Greytown Community and correspondence.

The meeting was informed of the likely average rise for urban and rural properties, and that this year there would little money for nice to have projects. The priorities were classified under headings identified as the four areas of well-being in the Long Term plan.

Greytown Priorities for Spending

Social Well-beings

Consultation on 85-87 West Street. Wider public consultation (as outlined by council officers) should commence this year to determine the future of this piece of land.

We support the council in their commitment to financing the Greytown Wheels- Park and would like council to review and identify options for providing more space for recreational requirements. These issues were also highlighted under environmental well-beings

We support the council in their work to improve water facilities. In Greytown improving the Papawai ponds and dealing with street flooding is a priority. Drains and gutters need to be cleared more often.

The community agreed that there is a need to upgrade the changing rooms in the Greytown Swimming Pool. A sports facility upgrade is in the council plans, which is great, but all clubs will use the changing facilities in the memorial pool, whilst this work is undertaken, and these changing rooms are not fit for purpose, and need upgrading. This issue was also identified under environmental concerns.

Residents would like the Refuse Centre in Cotter's Street to be relocated to another part of Greytown. The cycle trail, dog park and wheels park are all assets to Greytown, but these assets are undermined by the refuse centre which stands out as an eyesore.

We are in support of spending to provide a pathway and crossing to the 5 Rivers medical Centre and see this as both a social and environmental priority.

Environmental Well-beings

The need to reduce speeding along East and West Street was seen as a priority, though speeding in Wood Street was also raised as an issue.

Regarding priorities for footpaths, the need for channel and curbing in the South end of Reading Street, channel and curbing between Main Street and East Street, channel and curbing along one side of North Street from Main Road to West Street, and from Kempton Street channel and curbing on the North side of Humphry's Street leading to Elmstead Lane and from Kempton Street to Hewson lane were all highlighted as important.

Cultural Well-beings

It was suggested that we should have bilingual signs for our town amenities

There was support for the RSA moving forward in their quest to design and build a commemorative wall for all veterans in Soldiers Memorial Park. This issue fall under both social and cultural well beings.

We supported all initiatives to strengthen our relationship with the Maori Standing Committee and our local iwi.

Appendix 2 – Greytown Community Board Draft Priorities for 2022/2023

Greytown Community Board's Priorities for the 2022/2023

Social

- Facilities for youth
 - Youth facilities network with families of teenage children and Kuranui College to support initiatives that improve youth facilities in Greytown.
 - Increase links with senior students at Kuranui College and Greytown primary school to increase civic awareness and to ensure that their ideas are heard.
 - Continue to facilitate the IT programme for the elderly run by Kuranui College
- Consult with the Greytown Community on whether the town is concerned about safety issues at the junction of McMaster Street and Main Road.
- On Anzac day 2023 it will be 100 years since the formal opening of Soldiers Memorial Park and the Memorial Gates. Plan with the community to hold a special celebration in Greytown.

Cultural

- Engaging with Māori
 - Relationships should not be issue driven or motivated by outcomes they need to be maintained overtime and value based
- Complete the work on signs for the Greytown Marae and Urapa, and hold a celebration at the marae to unveil the two signs.
- Acknowledge and support key events that celebrate community diversity.
- Work with other organisations to support Matariki, Mid- winter festivals, Māori Language week, Christmas Parade, Waitangi Day, Arbor Day, school and College projects.

- Strengthen our relationships with the Māori Standing Committee and our local iwi
- Review Arbor Day and improve the cultural significance of the day
- Support the R.S.A moving forward in their quest to design and build a commemorative wall for all veterans in Soldiers Memorial Park
- Listen to the reports of The Tree Advisory group and continue to allocate funds for tree preservation in Greytown
