



# A Message from the Mayor

Much is on the horizon for Council in this coming year. First and foremost in everyone's mind of course is the proposed reorganisation of councils in the Wellington area. In actual fact though SWDC will have no input into the process from here as it is driven by the Local Government Commission. For us we are very much focussing on business as usual and that of course means getting our teeth into our next Long Term Plan. It is important that we document our communities' wishes as a sound basis for whatever governance arrangements we have in the future.

The largest project on our horizon is the waste water upgrade required for all three towns. The investment required for this is significant and needs to be spread over some considerable time to make it affordable for ratepayers. At the same time we need to ensure other projects that make our district desirable, like amenity upgrades, are not sacrificed. Having the best sewerage system in the country may win us an environmental tick of approval but it won't be a huge draw card for visitors or new residents.

One project about to get underway is the upgrade to Featherston's Anzac Hall. The three hundred and sixty thousand dollar project includes a new roof, repainting, rewiring and general refurbishment. We have been fortunate to receive a generous grant of two hundred and forty thousand dollars from Lotteries which means all the work can be carried out at one time. The balance will be funded from Council

reserves. This work means our wonderful heritage building will be spick and span for her centenary in October 2016 and in good condition to last another hundred years.

### Martinborough Community Centre Project Update

It's the start of 2015 and there is another busy year ahead for the Martinborough Community Centre Project. 2014 saw a lot of work undertaken by our fantastic team of volunteers – whether it was communications work, fundraising or working on the construction team our people have been very busy! Our resource consent was lodged with SWDC in December 2014 and we hope to have a decision on this shortly.

Late last year we ran a competition to name the new centre. We had a great response and obtained the services of a marketing and branding expert to help us decide on the winner. At the time of going to print



we were researching the winning name to ensure it is appropriate and acceptable to all sectors of our community. Congratulations to the winners and thanks to everyone who put forward a name, it was clear that a number of people had put significant thought into their suggestions.

To date we have raised over \$1.3m from the community and external funders. We have our next council 'check point' in March 2015 and, providing we have raised the necessary funds, we will continue to move forward. We were lucky enough to secure \$150,000 from Trust House in November 2014 and we have an application in with Eastern and Central which will be deliberated on early this year. We are hoping to raise a further \$250,000 from the community during the first 4 months of 2015 and we have a public meeting planned for February the 12th to update the community on the project progress.

### Consultation on resource consent applications

**Legal situation** – Under clauses 1(h) and 1AA of Schedule 4 of the Resource Management Act 1991 applicants must identify persons potentially affected by a proposal. This information is then passed to Council to consider along with all other matters covered by the Assessment of Environmental Effects which an applicant must prepare.

An applicant is however not required to consult with any person or party so identified. Because of this statutory limitation, it is up to an applicant to decide whether or not to consult with any party, including Maori. Council cannot in law require consultation to take place.

Best Practice –In terms of best practice it is however a significant "omission" for any applicant to not undertake consultation with those persons whom they have identified as potentially affected, especially Maori. It is strongly recommended by Council that consultation with those persons at least be undertaken.

Benefits – Consultation can in fact assist an applicant to

prepare a sound application, particularly where there may be Maori interests at play. Consultation also enables an applicant to identify issues of concern to potentially affected persons early in the process and then to use this knowledge to adjust their application to address those matters.

By doing this the likelihood of an application requiring public notification and having to go through long and expensive hearings procedures can be avoided. It also helps to avoid misunderstandings about what is happening because people are told directly what is being proposed, rather than relying on hearsay and gossip which can be completely inaccurate.

Lastly applicants and other persons should understand that consultation does not in itself require agreement to be reached, rather it is an important step toward both an applicant and a potential submitter(s) understanding the interests of the other. At the same time it provides valuable commentary for Council to consider when deciding to approve or decline an application.

#### **Wairarapa Healthy Homes**

#### **Criteria:**

If your home was built before 2000, you qualify for free installation where the home owner has a community services card or gold card with community services card endorsement AND you have anyone living in the home who is under the age of 17 OR over the age 65. In circumstances where these criteria cannot be met but where there is anyone suffering from a medical condition it may be possible to obtain a health referral.

**Rentals** still a really good deal for landlords if tenants have community services cards and fit the criteria above.

**Everyone else 33% discount** available so get in while the special is on till March.

#### **Rebates 2014/15**

The Rates Rebate Scheme provides a rebate of up to \$605 for low income earners who were paying rates for the home in which they were living on 1 July 2014.

- Your rebate will be calculated based on your income, from 1 April 2013 to 31 March 2014, rates and the number of dependants. The income eligibility for a rebate is \$24,250
- However if your income exceeds this amount you could still be entitled to a rebate depending on the total cost of your rates and number of dependants.
  - You must provide proof of income from your income provider for ALL forms of income, including interest & dividends.
- Application forms are available from the Featherston and Greytown Libraries as well as the Council office.

# Would you prefer to receive your rate demand by email?

We now have the facility to send rate demands by email. If you wish to receive your rate demand by email please email rates@swdc.govt.nz, and we will add your details to our database.

We encourage you to take up this option, some local authorities have up to 20% of rate demands delivered by email and at 80c per envelope the savings are considerable and of benefit to all.

#### **Direct Debit Forms**

We included with a previous Rates Notice a direct debit form hoping to encourage ratepayers to consider this method of rates payment, if not already signed up. Direct Debit is the cheapest way to pay your rates as we withdraw the funds directly from your bank account at the very last minute. That way you get the benefit of your funds for the longest possible time.

If you have not had the opportunity to do so but would like to pay by Direct Debit please complete

and return that form to us. If you have not kept the form we sent, just contact us by phone or email/post or drop in to one of our service centres to arrange to complete the required form.

We are very pleased with the response to our last notice about paying by Direct Debit with 200 additional ratepayers signed up. Our thanks to all those who pay by this method as administratively it is easier for us and means you not having to stress about paying on time.
