A Message from the Mayor

It's hard to believe that summer is half way through and at Council we are once again underway preparing our next Long Term Plan. Despite all the talk of super cities and amalgamations it is still business as usual when it comes to meeting our statutory planning obligations regardless of what the future may bring. Our council officers are bringing a much more strategic view to our assets management so we can better plan improvements to our district's facilities.

Our two greatest challenges in the short term are upgrading our urban sewerage systems to an environmentally acceptable standard that is affordable for our residents and earthquake proofing the Martinborough Town Hall. We have already done a great deal of work on the sewerage issue and are exceptionally pleased with the results so far. The Town Hall however is not so straightforward and work is progressing.

Throughout the whole district there are demands for improved community facilities like covered swimming pools, better sports fields and increased library services. All these demands need to be weighed against our core service requirements like water, roads and rubbish to see the impact on rates of increasing services. This is never an easy task and we will be seeking our residents' input on

what they want for our district and how they see the future South Wairarapa.

Herrick's UV Plant

The Council received assistance in the form of a subsidy from the Ministry of Health to upgrade the public water supply at Martinborough. The work programme over two years included a new supply bore and pump at the Herrick's bore field, an additional water storage reservoir of 750m3 volume and ultraviolet(UV) water disinfection units. This disinfection is required because Council water bores are quite shallow and regarded as "insecure" from a potential contamination perspective. The units were brought into service on 5 December 2011.

The existing supply has always been regarded as an untreated supply and therefore non complying with the National Drinking Water Standards. Once the ultra violet units have been certified as being effective over a period of time, the District Health Board on behalf of the Ministry of Health will be able to give full accreditation to Council and hence compliance with the current Drinking Water Standards. This will be a significant step towards ensuring that positive public health outcomes are available for Martinborough residents and ratepayers.

Martinborough Waste Water Treatment Plant

The consent variation which took effect in October 2011 required Council to address and reduce the pathogen levels in the treated waste water discharged to the Ruamahanga River. To achieve this Council has installed a new Ultra Violet disinfection unit which was commissioned on 1 December 2011. Early results are encouraging and if consistently sustained will see significant long term improvements to the wastewater discharge quality. This work is the first stage of enhancements to treated water quality as in the long term the Council will consider discharging to available land.

Council is currently preparing a new consent application to replace the existing resource consent which expires in July 2012.

Libraries open all day Saturday!

The library service is trialling all day opening, 10am to 5pm, each Saturday during January 2012. An added bonus is that the library staff will still offer the same services, so at Featherston or Greytown libraries, you can register your dog on a Saturday, pay your rates, gain a fire permit or buy rubbish bags. Changes to Civil Defence in the Wairarapa.

A reconfigured Civil Defence Emergency Management (CDEM) structure is being implemented to coordinate CDEM activities in the Wellington Region and bring together all the expertise from the nine councils into one organisation.

The proposed Wairarapa CDEM office will fit within the new Wellington regional structure. The positions created within the Wairarapa will improve control support in emergencies.

The two Wairarapa CDEM staff will be involved at an area level and act as controller for area and local emergencies.

Civil Defence Emergency Management is delivered through a series of partnerships between many different groups: local councils, emergency services, community agencies and the wider community. All New Zealand communities rely upon these partnerships for effective emergency response and relief and volunteers are a vital component of this partnership.

Long Term Plan

Every local authority is required to have a ten year "long term plan" (LTP), and this must be reviewed and updated every three years. The 2012/22 LTP is due for adoption by the end of June 2012.

We are taking a longer term view for the current LTP and while we still need to focus on the immediate future, we are taking the opportunity to consider the longer term issues that we face. Our plan is to consider not only the near future, but also 10,20,30+ years out. This may take a few iterations to get right but the important thing is to start.

We have already carried out a number of internal and targeted external workshops to consider the longer term view and some interesting and useful points have been raised. The draft LTP is due out for consultation mid April 2012.
