New logo - 'let's fly together'

We hope you agree that the new-look logo is a huge improvement on the old, out-dated, mono-cultural logo developed in 1989. Council voted unanimously in favour of adopting the Wairarapa Moana and mountains design, which was also the firm favourite of the South Wairarapa ratepayers. In the survey of 400 randomised ratepayers, 62%, agreed it was an accurate and appropriate representation of the Council, its services and the district.

The Māori Standing Committee has had critical input into the new logo, and chose the aspirational Te Reo words that are part of the logo. The words 'Kia Reretahi Tātau' mean 'let's fly together' or 'let's collaborate'.



Māori Standing Committee Chair Mr Raihānia Tipoki says, "the inclusion of Wairarapa Moana in the logo signifies an overdue recognition that our natural environment must be inherent in our decision-making processes. The Māori fishing hook depicted in the landscape references the Moana as 'Te Karu o Te Ika ā Māui' (The Eye of The Fish of Māui)."

A big thank you must go to Branding and Logo Working Group Chair Leigh Hay for leading the logo development and roll-out process, and to Satellite Design for their creative design work.

Martinborough water - post-incident update

Thank you for saving water

We want to thank ratepayers for their continued efforts to conserve water. Many people are finding ways to reduce excessive use as well as identifying and fixing leaks.

Remember that for metered properties, which most urban properties are, if you use more than the threshold of 350m3 of water over the year, you will be charged an additional charge of \$1.84 per cubic metre.

Residents are responsible for maintaining the pipes that run from their house or business to the Council-owned pipe, which usually terminates at your property boundary. If you suspect a leaking water pipe, tap, water cistern etc. on your property, call a plumber. If you think there is a leaking water main, please contact the Council on 06 306 9611 (24 hours).

Community grants

The Council has a pool of grant funding to support community groups. Each year we ask community groups to apply for funding to explain how they would use their grants if their application succeeds.

Youth grants

As agreed as part of the LTP process, Council has a fund of \$75,000 per year for grants specifically to support youth training, development and recreational activities in our communities.

Recycling wheelie bins coming soon

A new wheelie bin kerbside recycling service will be rolled out to urban households across the Wairarapa in July, providing more capacity for recycling diverting waste to landfill. Participating households in the urban area who pay for the kerbside recycling will receive a 240-litre wheelie bin, starting from June with collections anticipated to start in July.



You'll keep your recycling crates but use them both for glass only. The new wheelie bin will be for recyclables, other than glass. You'll need to put out the wheelie bin and recycling crates on alternative weeks. Collection of rubbish bags will stay the same. More information will be provided nearer to roll out. Watch this space!

Rebates 2018/19

The Rates Rebate Scheme provides a rebate of up to \$630.00 for low income earners. Ratepayers must have been living in the home they own on 1 July 2018 to receive a rebate.

- 1. Your rebate will be calculated based on your gross income from 1 April 2017 to 31 March 2018, your rates, and the number of dependants you have. The income eligibility for a rebate is \$25,180-\$42,000.
- 2. You must provide proof of income from your income provider for ALL forms of income, including interest & dividends.
- Application forms have been sent to those who have received a rebate in 2017/2018 and are also available from the Featherston and Greytown Libraries, the Council office and online at swdc.govt.nz/rates-and-property.

We now have a facility to send rates invoices by email. If you wish to receive your rate notice by email contact rates@swdc.govt.nz

We encourage you to take up this option to allow Council to use the postage savings on projects to benefit the district.

Please contact us as soon as possible so we can work with you on a payment plan. Council's policy is to approach banks and legal representatives to assist us in recovering arrears at the end of the rating year.

Payment by Direct Debit

Council encourages ratepayers to pay rates via Direct Debit as this ensures the correct amount is paid and you avoid paying penalties for late payment.

Based on feedback from ratepayers, we now offer **weekly**, **fortnightly, monthly or quarterly direct debit options** to pay rates.

Direct debit is the easiest way to pay your rates as we withdraw the funds directly from your bank account at the very last minute. That way you will get the benefit of your funds for the longest possible time, and avoid penalties. If you would like your payments to be made by using this method the forms are available from the Featherston and Greytown Libraries as well as the Council office and on our website **swdc.govt.nz/rates-and-property**. All you need to do is complete the form and send it to SWDC, PO Box 6, Martinborough 5741, scan and email it to **rates@swdc.govt.nz** or drop it off at either the Council office in Martinborough or at the Featherston or Greytown Libraries.
